20th Century Change & Challenge:

We wrapped up this unit looking at the changes brought by the Nuremberg Trials and the Atomic bomb. The idea of Crimes against Humanity and genocide come from those trials. The Atomic bomb changed the thinking around wars with Mutually Assured Destruction, MAD as the Cold War began.

20th Century Conflict:



WWII is over, and the Cold War creeps in. Lessons were learned from WWI. The US and Western allies were not vindictive. The Japanese and Germans were treated humanely and fair trials of crimes helped change the minds of those in defeat. The US rejected isolationism. The Marshall Plan helped rebuild Europe and boost the American economy. Students learned how the wealth and

power of the USA in the last 80 years grew out of those choices.

The Last of Human Freedoms & Never Fail to Protest:

Our BARR presentation was on finding hope in the midst of grief. Students learned about the stages of grief, applied these stages to a true story and brainstormed healthy ways



to cope with grief.
This week we finished up our presentations about the topics we chose way back at the beginning of the trimester. Students also completed teacher evaluation surveys.

- 4. Bring the essay to the front office by May 1, 2024. Attach this form to your essay.
- 5. Staff members will read your essay, determine winners, and award winners up to \$100 in a school-wide assembly. *If your essay wins, some of your words may be shared with the whole school.*

Please note: this essay contest is about learning more about post-secondary plans - which may or may not include college, military, apprenticeship programs, additional training, etc.

Choose one of the following prompts from the 2023-2024 Common App:

- 1. Some students have a background, identity, interest, or talent that is so meaningful they believe their application would be incomplete without it. If this sounds like you, then please share your story.
- 2. The lessons we take from obstacles we encounter can be fundamental to later success. Recount a time when you faced a challenge, setback, or failure. How did it affect you, and what did you learn from the experience?
- 3. Reflect on something that someone has done for you that has made you happy or thankful in a surprising way. How has this gratitude affected or motivated you?
- 4. Describe a topic, idea, or concept you find so engaging that it makes you lose all track of time. Why does it captivate you? What or who do you turn to when you want to learn more?

Options 5-7 Maranacook Originals:

- 5. There are many injustices in the world. Gandhi said to "be the change you wish to see in the world." What changes would you make to our society and world? Why would these changes matter to you? To the world?
- 6. Think of the ideal job for you when you grow up. Now think of reasons why this would be a good job for you. Write an essay to explain why this is your ideal job and how this job will shape your future.
