




SUPERINTENDENT'S MESSAGE

We are happy to share several manufacturing opportunities for students. R-B will have five site visits to McHenry County manufacturers during the 2023-24 school year.



SGE MUSIC PROGRAM

All students in Grades K-5 attend general music classes for 30 minutes twice a week. They spend time learning how to create, perform, respond to and connect with music through song, movement, play and performance. The curriculum includes listening to and recognizing different genres of music, understanding the elements of music (timbre, melody, dynamics, etc.), and learning to recognize, perform and compose rhythms and melodies. The younger grades will be starting the year learning and reviewing rhythm. Fourth grade students will then move on to playing the recorder, and in fifth grade, students will begin learning ukulele.

Letters will be going home soon to fourth grade families about ordering a recorder for class. One of the most highly anticipated components of the SGE music program is the musical performances which take place several times throughout the year. The expectation is that all students attend these performances not only to fulfill the curriculum requirements but to support their fellow classmates, all of whom put in a lot of time and effort preparing for the

The month of August kicked off with a fantastic three-day transitional camp for the incoming sixth grade class. From 8:30 am until 11:30 am on August 1, 2 and 3 over 100 incoming sixth graders were working with current faculty and eighth grade mentors to become more familiar with NMS. They spent time touring the building, going on scavenger hunts, playing ice breaker games, and multiple "locker practice" times were incorporated into the three-day event.

It was great to see so many sixth graders begin the year with a great understanding of where they were supposed to go and what was expected of them. The first day of school anxiety was greatly reduced due to the familiarity with peers, staff and the building. None of this would have been possible without a very motivated teaching staff who put in a lot of time to organize this event. NMS is very grateful for their commitment to the students.

NOBLE KNIGHTS

NMS is excited to continue forward with Positive Behavior Intervention Systems (PBIS) tier one with the Noble Knight initiative to reward students for positive behavior. Part of the tier one initiative is to establish a foundation of proactive support while working to prevent unwanted behaviors. This schoolwide initiative is working to reward students for exhibiting behaviors that are in line with being a Noble Knight. This year a Knight "store" will be made available for students to purchase items.

The goal is to reward students who acquire multiple Noble Knight Cards. The more cards a student receives, the greater the prizes they can purchase. Prizes include lunch with a teacher, outside recess time, and maybe even lunch with the principal if students aspire to that great of a reward. The staff at NMS is constantly on the lookout for positive behaviors and issuing cards to students on a daily basis.

Welcome back! We are looking forward to another great school year. Nippersink D2 and R-B 157 strive each year to provide the best educational experience for your student. One way to provide this is through Professional Learning Communities (PLCs). Teachers from the same grade levels or content areas work together to answer four basic, yet vital questions, which are:

- 1. What do we want our students to learn?
- 2. How are we going to know they've learned it?
- 3. What are we going to do if they did not learn it?
- 4. What are we going to do if they already know it?

PLC teams continually go through a process of answering each question to ensure that students are both proficient at their current grade or course level and prepared for the next. PLC teams meet on early release days and other times of the year to make sure all students are progressing.

FOR PARENTS

Parents have asked, "What can we do at home to help our kids with school?" Here are a number of at-home study ideas that can be used even for the busiest of families:

- Create a "Time to Study"—Include your students in the decision making for a time to study.
- Ask Questions—Inquire about your student's day.
- Read daily—Just 15 to 20 minutes a day helps increase vocabulary, brain power, recall and focus.
- Eliminate distractions—Turn off TVs or streaming devices.
