Iola-Scandinavia School District takes a step toward enhanced safety, security and maintenance needs with \$2.3 million spring capital referendum question

In an effort to prioritize the safety of its students and staff, the Iola-Scandinavia School District has recently embarked on a major endeavor. With the unanimous approval of the Board of Education, the district has initiated a \$2.3 million capital referendum to enhance safety and security across the district buildings as well as updating school maintenance needs. This comprehensive plan aims to build a stronger foundation for a safer, comfortable, stable learning environment.

Community engagement and support for the referendum

The success of any referendum relies heavily on community engagement and support. The Iola-Scandinavia School District has actively sought to involve the community in the decision-making process regarding the \$2.3 million referendum with a community survey initiated this fall.

Through this survey the district has received overwhelming support from parents, teachers, and community members who recognize the importance of investing in the safety, security and maintenance of their schools. The community understands that a safe learning environment is essential for students to excel academically and emotionally. The results of this survey can be found on the district website.

The need for enhanced safety and security in schools

In recent years, schools across the country have experienced unfortunate incidents that highlight the need for enhanced safety and security measures. Acts of violence and unauthorized access to school premises have raised concerns among parents and educators alike. It is crucial for schools

to stay ahead of potential threats and take proactive measures to ensure the safety of their students and staff. The Iola-Scandinavia School District, like many others, be-



lieves that prevention is key. By investing in safe and secure entrances they aim to deter potential threats and provide a safer environment for everyone on campus. The presence of surveillance cameras, crisis planning, and safety training are already in place. Securing our entrances and providing updated interior doors will not only enhance security measures that we have in place, but will also provide a sense of reassurance to students, teachers, and parents.

The need for maintenance projects

Alongside the safety and security enhancements, the capital referendum will also address much-needed maintenance projects within the school district. Over time, wear and tear can take a toll on the infrastructure of school buildings, affecting the learning environment and overall functionality. By allocating part of the funds towards maintenance projects, the district ensures that the school facilities are well-maintained and conducive to learning. Maintenance projects will include repairing roofs, updating heating systems, and replacing inefficient windows and doors. These improvements not only contribute to the safety and functionality of the buildings but also enhance the overall educational experience for students and teachers.

Key features of the safety, security and maintenance upgrades

The safety, security, and maintenance upgrade projects proposed by the \$2.3 million capital referendum are designed to create a safe and efficient environment. The key features of these upgrades include:




- 1. A safe and secure remodel of the main entrance of the middle/high school.
- 2. New boilers at the Middle/High School and HVAC control system: The current boilers are original to the building in 1979.
- 3. Replace exterior windows at the Elementary School. Many of the windows are single pane and are original to the building.
- 4. Replace interior doors. Many doors have large windows that are not shatter proof.
- 5. Repair and replace roofs on sections of various district buildings

Addressing concerns and misconceptions about the referendum

As with any major undertaking, concerns and misconceptions may arise regarding the \$2.3 million referendum. It is important to address these concerns to ensure transparency and understanding within the community.


One common concern is the cost of the referendum and its potential impact on property taxes. While it is true that the referendum will require



funding, the school district has estimated that the tax impact on a \$100,000 property to be an additional \$25 per year. Additionally, the long-term benefits of enhanced safety and security, as well as improved school facilities, outweigh the initial investment.

What Will This Referendum Cost Me And My Family?






The voting process and timeline for the referendum

The voting process for the \$2.3 million referendum will follow the established protocols for school district referendums. The community will have the opportunity to vote on the proposed referendum on April 2, 2024

This will ensure that all eligible voters are aware of the projects and have the opportunity to participate in the decision-making process.

High School Update

It is hard to believe that one full semester has passed already. I have found that one of my favorite things about being an administrator is visiting classrooms. Sometimes my visits are scheduled, other times I just happen to be walking by. Sometimes I'm observing students, other times I am observing the teacher. Sometimes, and these are the best times, the students are in the middle of presenting information and sharing with their classmates what they have learned.

That happened to me recently when I went into Ms. Hoffman's English 10 class. Her students had completed a research project and were presenting their findings in small groups. I was particularly interested in the number of students who chose to research the effects of social media on teenagers. Jean Twenge, a research psychologist, in her book iGen, states "The teen mental health crisis is a direct result of the rise of smartphones and social media."

Knowing that statistics have linked the two, I was interested to get a teenager's take on the effects of social media sites like TikTok, Snapchat, Facebook, and Instagram.

I invited some English 10 students to share their findings with me. Caige W. found that there are some definite advantages of using social media. She mentioned that social media sites are a great way to gather information like learning a new hobby or getting tips on how to deal with a medical diagnosis or disorder. Addyson H. saw using these sites as a wonderful way to communicate and stay connected with family and friends. Emily P. spoke about how many sites help promote small businesses and can provide a source of income. The sites are an outlet for the user's creativity and can inspire others.

With all of these wonderful things happening on social media sites, how can there be a direct link to the deterioration of teenage mental health? Social media usage has a dark side. Cedarlyn

O. cited the ease with which teenagers cyberbully other teenagers. They feel like no one is watching them. It's easy to hide behind a screen. Addyson H. said that users have a fear of being left out. They get addicted and have to stay upto-date and on their phones all the time.



Cedarlyn O. agrees. Users are losing sleep and their education is at risk because they need to be checking their phone. Ariel E. shared how there is a lot of false information on social media sites. People's opinions are presented as fact. Using social media sites can be very isolating.

Social media sites are not going away anytime soon. What should teens and parents do to mitigate the negative impact of usage? Limiting screen time was mentioned by all the students I spoke with. Students do not need to be on their phones as much as they are.

To improve mental health it is necessary to interact and make connections with others face-toface. Ariel E. mentioned the research that shows that phones should be put down two hours before going to bed. Requiring that phones be kept outside of the bedroom during sleep is helpful too so that there is no temptation to check it when you should be sleeping.

I appreciate these students sharing their learning with me so that I could share it with you. Like so many other things in life, social media usage can be a positive experience when done in moderation. As the adult in a developing young person's life please take an active role in monitoring your child's social media usage.

4. The Forward Exam is an online summative assessment that measures what students know in relation to the Wisconsin Academic Standards. Our students in grades 3 - 6 will be taking the exam April 8 - 19.
