






Slick Tracy is a program from Foster County Public Health, that teaches 7th graders and

their families about alcohol prevention. Over 8 class periods in October, we discussed myths and facts about alcohol, risks of underage drinking, healthy decision making, etc. Students bring home activity books to work on and discuss with their families as well. The class was divided into four teams and earned points for their team when they turned in the activity books. Each team also completed a group project on one of the topics we learned about and presented it to the class. 

Safe Dates is a program taught to 8th graders over 10 lessons. Safe Dates equips students with the skills to develop healthy dating relationships, including positive communication, anger management, and conflict resolution, and awareness of what constitutes healthy and abusive dating relationships. The knowledge and tools taught are helpful in all relationships, including with family, friends, and dating partners. Homecoming was such a fun event and enjoyed by all. County health was at the Elementary school for immunizations. The Elementary school had a science lyceum that the kids really enjoyed. Professional development of trauma sensitive training was presented to teachers this past PD day. Elementary Boys and Girls basketball is at the Elementary school.
