2.2 Elementary Principal Report-Kindness Week went well at the elementary. We practiced intentional kindness with each other, our teachers, the high school, and local nursing home residents. The 100th Day of School was celebrated on Feb. 5th. Elementary PE students participating in Jump Rope for Heart in the month of February. Spring Parent Teacher Conferences are scheduled for Feb. 29th at Glenfield. Elementary VB will begin the first week of March. Reading Month is coming up in March. This year's theme is Read Across America. Griggs County Ag Extension Day on March $22^{\text {nd }}$. Parent Breakfast and 5th and 6th Grade Musical is on Wednesday, March 27.

Juniors attended CTE day in Devils Lake last week. Starting Sources of Strength back up to address Social and Emotional needs. DPI required student engagement survey is wrapping up. Mrs. Halvorson attended principals conference last week in Bismarck, great information on upcoming Cybersecurity Integration plans, Artificial Intelligence (IA), and many breakout sessions and networking opportunities.

School Construction Coalition: School districts have come together to develop solutions to meet school facility needs. Costs of construction have increased so fast that a school district's ability to finance projects has become a challenge. Many districts lack financial resources to replace outdated buildings or add to existing structures. This School Funding Task Force is working to convince the legislature that the state should step in to help fund school construction as many states do. They are requesting a $\$ 1000$ contribution to help them lead an effort to develop a solution.
School Calendar: Important to follow district contract days and being careful when considering required hours. This is being monitored closely so we want to make sure our calendar fulfills state and district requirements by days in school.
Good keynote speakers addressed the importance of character development and school culture.
