Three Teachers Set to Retire

As the school year ends, Yankton High School recognizes three teachers who are retiring after long careers in education. Each has contributed to the school community through teaching, activities, and relationships built with students and staff.

Mrs. Jill Mikkelsen is retiring after forty years as an English teacher. Throughout her career, she taught at Sully Buttes High School, Timber Lake High School, Wessington Springs High School, and Yankton High School.

She has been involved in several activities including yearbook for twenty-five years, newspaper for five years, one act plays, musicals, and fall plays. Her teaching assignments have included Advanced Placement Literature and Composition, British Literature, Advanced Grammar, Freshman Grammar, Sophomore Composition, Debate, Speech, and Elements of Reading Literature.

Mikkelsen has had seven homerooms during her time at Yankton. She noted that her current homeroom, the Class of 2025, has been meaningful to her. She also mentioned the Classes of 2024 and 2018 as being especially memorable, with 2018 being the year her daughter

After retirement, she plans to take a gap year to travel. Her first planned trip is a road trip to the Grand Canyon in September. She also plans to spend time with her parents in Wyoming, volunteer at her grandson's school in Mitchell, and work alongside her husband. She looks forward to reading, drinking coffee, sleeping in, not dressing up, and not being in a hurry. Following her year of travel and time with family, she plans to volunteer and visit the homes of authors on her personal list. She does not plan to return to teaching, stating that she would not want to teach anywhere other than Yankton High School.

Mr. Keith Goeden is retiring after thirty-two years as a high school teacher. He has spent eighteen of those years at Yankton High School. He also taught for eleven years in Wynot, one year in Laurel, and one year in New Castle. He spent time as a substitute teacher in New York. He primarily teaches Geography and World History, along with some Early Civilization and Play Production courses. In addition to his teaching duties, Mr. Goeden has been involved in theater, oral interpretation, and junior high football and basketball.

Over the years, he has had six different homerooms, including his current group of freshmen. He identified the Class of 1995 as particularly memorable. He took that class on a field trip to New York, and many of those students went into education or became frequent travelers. He said this group helped establish a foundation for how future years would go.

When asked about plans for retirement, Goeden said he does not have a set plan but expressed interest in the idea of becoming a pirate. He shared that his favorite part of teaching has been spending time with students and being a positive influence. He offered the following advice to future educators: "Don't take everything so seriously and just try to be a positive person and a positive influence, because we never know what students are going through and what we are teaching them might be priority number thirty-seven for them at that moment."

Mrs. Patty Kortan is retiring after thirty-six years in education. She has taught in Scotland, at the Yankton Career Learning Center, at the Human Services Center and Alternative School, and at Yankton High School. Her teaching assignments have included English I, English II, American Literature, Nonfiction, Forms of Literature, Business English, Sci-

ence Fiction and Detective Literature, World Literature, Debate, and Elements of Reading. She has also contributed to student life through work with oral interpretation and directing plays while in Scotland. At Yankton, she has

been involved with fall play technical crew, Book Club, Cellar Door, and The Woksape.

She has had five homerooms during her time at YHS. She identified the Classes of 2020 and 2024 as especially memorable. One of her favorite memories has been seeing a student who says they dislike reading find a book they enjoy and continue reading on their own.

After retirement, Kortan plans to find another job, spend time with her children, travel, and spend time with her husband. She also looks forward to reading, crafting, and working on home improve-


