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A Message from Dr. Jean-Paul

The students and staff at George Grant Mason Elementary celebrated a wonderful return to school in 2024 by officially launching our Yale RULER SEL initiative. With the guidance of teachers, students began working collaboratively in their classrooms to brainstorm ideas for the GGM School Charter. Students learned the purpose of a school charter and what it would include. The charter allows everyone in a school community the chance to articulate how they want to feel at school, then work together to agree upon behaviors that support those feelings.

As a group, students decided on what needs to happen or change for those feelings to be consistently present. Each grade level chose words and phrases that best represented their class. From there, a small group of student ambassadors in grades 2 - 5 collaborated during a lunch period to synthesize these ideas and finalize the GGM School Charter.

On Friday, January 12, GGM staff and students held a kickoff assembly to review the mood meter, have an interactive read aloud using the story *The Way I Feel* and introduce and discuss the final version of the GGM School Charter. For the culminating assembly activity, each student created their own nametag and placed their signature on the charter pledging to do their best to support the GGM School Charter each and every day.

Pre-K: Mrs. Braffett

Pre-k had a chilly and fun January! We made sure to squeeze a lot of movement breaks and dancing into our day to get our energy out when we could not go outside. Pre-k had fun playing winter freeze dance and even learned how to waddle like a penauin following a silly penguin dance shake break! We had "snow" much fun playing with our snow sensory table during centers and making our very own snow people and igloos. Pre-k really enjoyed our science experiment where we made Oobleck, a special mixture that is both a solid and a liquid. It was super messy, but we loved the different textures it created. We also practiced writing the letters in our name with a snowman name activity and traced our first initial with our snowy cotton balls that we decorated our classroom with. Pre-k learned all about clothing and labeled all types of clothes that we wear during the winter season. Pre-k used their fine motor skills to cut pictures of clothing out and sort them into warm weather and cold weather clothing categories. We also introduced hibernation and winter animals by reading the story "The Mitten" by Jan Brett and we worked together to sequence the story. Pre-k is looking forward to continuing our hibernation theme and making sweet projects for Valentine's Day this month!



Kindergarten: Mrs. Rush

It has been a cold, long winter in Tuxedo! Kindergarten students are learning all about the weather and how we adapt to the weather for each season. In science, Kindergarten will begin

learning all about hibernation. From snakes hibernating in burrows to turtles hibernating in mud, to bats hibernating in caves, students will learn why and how animals hibernate and what they do before they go to sleep for their long winter nap. Students will learn how this preparation of eating lots and lots of food helps keep the animal's bodies healthy during their winter nap so when the animals wake up in the spring, they are ready to eat and play! (We sure are ready to play in the spring weather too!) Kindergarten will use what they learn about animals hibernating in ELA. They will put together a book and share different facts about hibernating animals. Next time you see a GGM Kindergartener, be sure to ask him or her to tell you all about hibernation!

First Grade: Mrs. Matthies

February will be filled with lots of fun activities. During this month in science we will be learning about the patterns of the seasons and space. We will study the planets and learn about the weather patterns on the planets. It's all very exciting! In math we are learning how to take apart and break down two digit numbers. We are learning how to add two digit numbers using tens and ones, and number lines. Additionally, we are comparing two digit numbers and using strategies that help us to understand which is the greater number, and which number is less. In ELA we are really focused on our reading comprehension. We will use strategies such as asking questions and retelling to summarize stories we have read in class. We will also compare genres such as realistic fiction and fiction. In social studies we are learning about saving money and goods and services. We are discussing different businesses that provide a service we have to pay for, such as buying food in a restaurant or going to the shoe store. We will compare what is a good and what is a service. Second Grade: Mrs. Blume

To support our learning about trees from earlier in the year, our focus will move to specifically maple trees. Students in second grade will be taking a field trip to the Hudson Highland Nature Museum to participate in a maple sugar tour. They will learn how to differentiate a sugar maple tree from other trees, how to tap the tree and the process of converting sap into syrup. The best time to get sap

from a sugar maple tree is between February and April and a chilly walk outside among the trees will do us all good this time of year!







Third Grade: Ms. Caligiuri

Third grade has been working hard so far this year! We have been reading different folktales in ELA and working with text structures. This month, students will continue to practice their skills using different text structures. In math, students will continue learning about shapes and areas. In social studies, we will continue to talk about Ancient Egypt. In science, students have been enjoying being hands-on with magnets! We will finish up the forces and motion unit this month.







Fourth Grade: Mrs. Rota



Students will continue to develop their written response skills. Spelling and grammar continue to be a focus for us as well. In social studies, students will work on a research project to celebrate Black History Month. In math, we will wrap up division and start our unit on fractions. We are looking forward to not only learning about fractions, but also applying this knowledge in the real world. Students will learn about electricity and circuits in science. It is a fun unit! February is shaping up to be another exciting month in room 201!



Fifth Grade: Ms. Stack

February brings an exciting wave of knowledge to our vibrant 5th-grade classroom! In our science journey, we're learning about Earth's systems and human impact. In February, third and fourth grade students will be using their Chromebooks and Makey Makey kits. Makey Makey allows students to turn everyday objects into touchpads, opening the door to endless possibilities for interactive learning and exploration. From coding experiments to creating unique projects, students will embark on a handson journey that combines technology with imagination. One activity students will participate in is Human Conductive Circuit. Students will engage in a hands-on exploration of electrical conductivity by creating a human conductive circuit. Using Makey Makey, students can connect themselves to different objects, turning their bodies into interactive components. This activity not only teaches basic principles of circuitry but also encourages collaboration and teamwork as students work together to complete the circuit and to get various responses.

Multi-Subject: Mrs. Donnelly

Just in time for Valentine's Day, my 2nd and 3rd graders are learning to read and spell "Heart Words", previously known as sight words. In the past, sight words were taught by having kids "memorize" them. Some sight words have tricky spellings and sounds, so it was believed that kids simply needed to memorize what they looked like. However, the research shows that children learn sight words more effectively when they learn how to sound them out! The research based Heart Word Method teaches students to sound out the parts of irregular words that do follow phonics rules. Students then only need to learn the small portion of the word that is the tricky part "by heart". For example, most of the word "what" is decodable just the "a" sounding like /u/ is the part of the word

they need to learn by heart. I'm finding this method to be very effective in my classroom for both reading and spelling these former "tricky words". We will have a special ""Heart Word"" celebration on Valentine's Day!

Math Specialist: Mrs. Rocklin

The groups have been working so hard to accomplish their goals and I couldn't be prouder. The lower grades will continue to work on adding numbers 1 through 10 and now subtracting numbers 1-10. We will look at how these numbers relate to one another and the strategies we can use to help us. In the upper grades, we will continue to work on word problems with two steps with complex multiplication and now division. The upper grades will work on estimating sums and differences of fractions. We will be working on this for the next few weeks and begin to use more complex numbers.

Reading Specialist: Mrs. Sayles

In February, we are working hard in the Reading Room. Will the groundhog see his shadow on February 2nd? We will predict and see if our predictions were right. Students will enjoy reading different fiction and nonfiction books about Groundhog's Day. Students will also be learning about the Lunar New Year and the year of the dragon. We will explore books celebrating the Lunar New Year and we will read to find out the animal that represents the year we were born. Students will also read to learn about influential African Americans. We will also read about presidents of the United States in honor of President's Day.

In February, our school is gearing up for a diverse array of activities aimed at fostering teamwork, skill-building, and recreational fun. Adventure education sessions will immerse students in collaborative challenges, honing their abilities to work seamlessly as a team. There will be NO 4th and 5th grade Art Club during the month of February. Most students are in the musical and I will be working on set design/construction with high school students.

During this past month, the Pre-K worked on various projects using pencil, collage, painting, and cutting. Kindergarten and first grade finished their Mary Blair Castle projects and have moved onto making Pinch Pot ceramic bowls. These will be fired and glazed in the coming month. Second and third graders finished their Pharaoh-cious Portraits, combining stencil work, coloring, cutting, printmaking with printing plates and learning about Egyptian symbols. All of the students, except for the pre-K have started sketchbooks, concentrating on the elements and principles of art!

The fourth and fifth grade students stopped their project for the week to create a Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. portrait out of individual pieces they had to copy and then put together like a puzzle. They learned much like any problem, if you break down a drawing into smaller, manageable pieces and connect them, you can come up with something good. They also learned about the differences between glazing ceramics and painting paper. They are excited to be able to use their mug creations to actually drink hot beverages.
