Dear board members in the Herkimer BOCES region,

Summer is such an interesting time in education – while most people think that school slows down, it definitely ramps up for BOCES and most of our schools! First, we have the celebrations of June that start off the summer with such a clear focus on why we do all this... for student success!! Thank you to everyone who participated in the various celebrations and for all of YOU, as students cannot succeed without their Boards of Education supporting their teachers, leaders and programs. Thank you for the time and attention you give your local districts as well as BOCES so that we can do this important work.

Once those celebrations are over, we jump right into hiring and planning for the new school year, closing out the books on the last school year and offering summer school opportunities for different learners and needs. This summer, BOCES is offering Regional Summer School (7-12 grade students), Extended School Year Program for students with IEPs or 504s and who require summer programming in order to sustain their growth, drivers' education, a certified nursing assistant (CNA) program for adult learners, starting a new LPN cohort, Rescue Heroes program for 14-17 year old young women interested in first responder service (this is a new grant from the county), and many different programs in technical education. So you can see that summer is very busy at BOCES!

I hope you have followed the work preparing for the capital project at BOCES. The Facilities Advisory Committee met a few times, and all the notes and drawings are available at https://Bit.ly/2022CapitalProject. Right now, the preliminary plans and drawings are currently up at NYSED for review. This is the first big step in getting the project going!

We have also opened up the Gateway Center, which is the professional development and adult education hub located on the second floor of 420 E. German St. Instructional Support Services and LPN staff are busy setting up these new spaces. Moving these adult services out of our two main student campuses frees up space that is needed either as "swing space" during the construction phase of the project and/or to expand student programming on the campuses. It is exciting that we will be able to have all the BOCES staff in one location for our opening day in September!

The other big news at BOCES is that the Board of Education conducted a successful search for my successor. They spent many months planning for the search and then conducting the interviews including stakeholder interviews of the two finalists. The board selected D.J. Shepardson as the next district superintendent of Herkimer BOCES. Mr. Shepardson will begin right on Oct. 1, the day after my retirement. I am so appreciative of the process and time that the board gave to this important decision.

Let me end by thanking you all for allowing me to be part of this region and to experience the incredible dedication and collaborative spirit that exists within our region. It has truly been a privilege and an honor to be a leader in this region with all of you and the superintendents. While I look forward to more time with my family, I will truly miss the people and the good work that happens here! I wish you all a successful opening of the new school year and encourage you to continue your steadfast focus



The annual Herkimer BOCES Board of Education reorganization meeting always involves voting on the board leadership, but this year, it also included officially appointing the next district superintendent and chief executive officer.

Board members formally appointed Donald (D.J.) Shepardson to the district superintendent and CEO position, and Shepardson signed a three-year contract. The board then took a brief recess to hold a dessert reception in his honor.

Shepardson, who is superintendent of West Canada Valley Central School District, starts at Herkimer BOCES on Oct. 1, following the retirement of current Herkimer BOCES District Superintendent and CEO Sandra Sherwood.



The Herkimer BOCES Board of Education's reorganization meeting took place on July 6 in the new Herkimer BOCES Gateway Center on the second floor of the Arc Herkimer Business Park building at 420 E. German St. in Herkimer.

During the meeting, board members reelected Holly Pullis to a one-year term as board president and re-elected Ronald Loiacono to a one-year term as board vice president. They both started their previous terms in the roles in January 2023, after then-Board President Michael Clements passed away unexpectedly in December 2022. Pullis was then the board's vice president and was elected as president, and Loiacono was elected as vice president. On April 20 during the BOCES administrative budget and board vote, four people were elected to the Herkimer BOCES Board of Education. Loiacono and James (Bob) Schmid were re-elected to three-year terms. Michele Szarek, who was appointed by the board in fall 2022 to fill a vacant seat, was newly elected to a three-year term. Kathy Sarafin, who was appointed on Feb. 9 to fill Clements' seat on the board through April 19, was newly elected to fill the rest of the term from April 20, 2023, through June 30, 2024.

Loiacono and Szarek were sworn into their board seats by Board Clerk Shawn Maxson during the reorganization meeting. Schmid was absent and will be sworn in at a future meeting. Sarafin was sworn in immediately following the April 20 election.

Pullis represents Owen D. Young on the BOCES board, Loiacono represents Mount Markham, Schmid represents Dolgeville, Szarek represents Poland and Sarafin represents Frankfort-Schuyler.

Herkimer BOCES students win SkillsUSA national championship

Three Herkimer BOCES Visual Communications Media Arts students teamed up to win a national championship at the SkillsUSA National Leadership and Skills Conference, which took place from June 19-23 in Atlanta.

Little Falls senior Madison Battisti, Poland senior Jolene Manipole and Frankfort-Schuyler senior Corey Wohler won the SkillsUSA national championship in the Promotional Bulletin Board competition. The students qualified for the national competition by winning the state championship in the Promotional Bulletin Board competition during the SkillsUSA New York State Leadership and Skills Conference from April 26-28 at the Syracuse Fairgrounds.

The students created their bulletin board as a class project under the advisement of Herkimer BOCES Visual Communications Media Arts instructor Melinda Maycock.

The Herkimer BOCES SkillsUSA coadvisors are Cosmetology instructor Holly Rotundo Fischer and Cosmetology teaching assistant Sarah Jacquays-Alberts.

Herkimer BOCES Cosmetology student McKenzie Schuster, a junior of West Canada Valley, also advanced to the national conference by winning the SkillsUSA state championship in the Customer Service competition. At the national conference, Schuster placed in the top 10 in the Customer Service competition.

Students excel at SkillsUSA state event

Herkimer BOCES students won three state championships at the SkillsUSA New York State Leadership and Skills Conference from April 26-28 at the Syracuse Fairgrounds. Overall, Herkimer BOCES students placed in six of the statelevel competitions.

"This year's theme is 'SkillsUSA Champions at Work – Our Time Is Now," Herkimer BOCES SkillsUSA co-advisor Holly Rotundo Fischer said. "How very fitting, when we continue to hear about the skills gap in the workforce. These students rose to the occasion and stepped out of their comfort zone to showcase their vocational skills."

Herkimer BOCES sent a total of 48 students to the state conference. Herkimer BOCES had 42 students registered in 32 contests, four student delegates and two student helpers. Rotundo Fischer, the Herkimer BOCES Cosmetology program instructor, is the Herkimer BOCES SkillsUSA co-advisor with Cosmetology teaching assistant Sarah Jacquays-Alberts.

When 13 local female students recently went through the first Rescue Heroes Summer Day Camp at Herkimer-Fulton-Hamilton-Otsego BOCES, there were many 'aha' moments as the students learned about first responder careers.

MaryBeth Napolitano, Herkimer BOCES Rescue Heroes program coordinator, recalled some of those moments from the five-day camp. When state troopers came in with a dog for their canine rescue presentation, Little Falls student Aleyla Dygert said "This is my dream," and when students visited Ilion firefighter Mary Reece, West Canada Valley student MacKenzie Christiano said "This is what I want to do."

"And I tell you what: They will do it," Napolitano said. "This is what this program was for – for that inspirational encouragement that they can do it."

The Rescue Heroes Summer Day Camp took place from July 24-28 based out of the Herkimer BOCES William E. Busacker

Complex in Herkimer. The Herkimer BOCES School to Careers program and the Herkimer County Integrated County Planning initiative coordinated on the camp and received a grant from the state Office of Children and Family Services to make it possible.

The program was open to female students ages 14-17 in

school districts in the Herkimer BOCES region and had a goal of exposing students to first responder careers and volunteer work.

The Rescue Heroes participants were Central Valley students Savannah Abeling, Josephine Aney, Trinity Aponte, Cammie Callahan, Aryanna Dicob and Taylor Dicob; Dolgeville students Grace Leavitt and Alice Luquis;

Herkimer student Christiana Leal-Fowler; Little Falls student Aleyla Dygert; Mount Markham students Payton Dauchy and Taylor Dauchy; and West Canada Valley student MacKenzie Christiano.

Napolitano, who also is the Herkimer BOCES School

to Careers liaison, work-based learning coordinator and Mentor Program coordinator, was the coordinator Rescue Heroes. The instructors for the camp were Robin Polkosnik, the instructor of the Herkimer **BOCES** Criminal Justice Career and Technical Education program, and Kelly

Cave, an instructional coach for Herkimer BOCES Instructional Support Services.

"It was my pleasure and joy to work with a wonderful group of young women with similar interests in serving their community as an emergency service provider,' Polkosnik said.

Cave was also happy about the program.

"Rescue Heroes of 2023 are a dynamic and diverse group of young women dedicated to helping the world one person at a time," Cave said.

Career options

First responder career experiences that students had included the canine rescue demonstration by state troopers; visiting Ilion Police Chief Laurie DeVaul, Ilion firefighter Mary Reece and Ilion Mayor John Stephens; and traveling to Little Falls Hospital to talk with department heads

of areas including emergency, surgery, radiology, laboratory and pathology, human resources and education.


"We opened their eyes to a plethora of first responder and related careers," Napolitano said.

Students also participated in first responder trainings that not only

introduced them to more career options but also provided skills that they could put to use immediately if needed.

"What we felt was so important at their young age is to look at what's going on in the world and teach them, so they can save lives right now," Napolitano said.

Students received Narcan training from the RISE Recovery Community Outreach Center, "Stop the Bleed" training from the Albany Med Health System Trauma Program, first aid and CPR training from the Mohawk Valley Ambulance Corps Inc. (MOVAC) and self-defense training from Herkimer BOCES school resource officer Darrin Miller.

'That's your dream'

One of the highlights of the week was a trip to the Ilion Fire Department to hear from Ilion Police Chief Laurie DeVaul and

Ilion firefighter and emergency medical technician Mary Reece, who is a 2010 graduate of the Herkimer BOCES Criminal Justice program. Ilion Mayor John Stephens also visited the firehouse to provide words of encouragement for the students.

As far as anyone involved is aware, DeVaul is the first

female police chief in the region, and Reece is the first female career firefighter in Herkimer County.

DeVaul told students not to listen to anyone who says they can't be first responders.

"If you want to do it, go for it – because that's your dream," DeVaul said.

Reece agreed.

"If there is something you really want to do, push for it and be your own advocate," Reece said. "I love helping people, and that's one of the main reasons I got into this."

'Embedding all of that'

The camp was required to include daily physical fitness, so students participated in the self-defense training, did yoga with Lisa Gallagher and had various movement,

walking and stretching activities throughout the week.

"We infused physical activity every day," Napolitano said.

Students also received nutrition education from Leah McCaskey, a SNAP-Ed nutritionist for Cornell Cooperative Extension through the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP).

Overall, the program integrated daily physical activity, life skills, 21st century skills, team-building, self-care, mindfulness and social-emotional learning.

"We were embedding all of that every day into whichever activities we did," Napolitano said.

Self-care was a vital part of the camp, Napolitano said.

"In that first responder lifestyle, you see a lot of bad things," she said. "You see death, you see injury, you see situations that can be extremely traumatic."

Team-building activities also were important to the program.

"You're not alone when you're a first responder," Napolitano said. "You need to be able to work as a team."

Students also completed a characterstrengths survey and discovered how their strengths connected with first responder careers they were interested in.

"We wanted them to understand the important strengths that each of them embody," Napolitano said.

"And then we celebrated our week together and our successes," Napolitano said.

Butenschon shared contact information with students and asked them to keep in touch, inform her about what they end up doing for their careers and let her know if there is ever anything she can ever do to help them.

"I thought that was wonderful," Napolitano said



Building Construction program continues 40-plus year tradition of building houses

Herkimer BOCES Building Construction students have been building a house each school year dating back to 1982, and the search was on this spring for the recipient of the next house.

The selected homeowner pays the cost of materials and transportation of the house from Herkimer BOCES to its location. The labor is provided for free by high school juniors and seniors under the supervision of Building Construction instructor John Martin and teaching assistant Shelby Creater.

The Herkimer BOCES Building Construction program is the only BOCES program in the state that constructs a full house every school year.

"Students learn hands-on skills through our Building Construction curriculum that will prepare them for a career in the industry," Martin said. "To be able to professionally build a house every year during their

opportunity – for both our students and for the homeowner who receives the house."

Building Construction students completed the program's 42nd house during the 2022-23 school year. The 43rd house will be built during the 2023-24 school year.

During the process of getting the word out about the then-need for potential house

recipients, the Building Construction program was featured in local newspapers and in a feature story on WKTV.



Pathways Academy students record podcasts for English class, NPR competition

Herkimer BOCES Pathways Academy 11th and 12th grade English language arts students have enhanced their learning by creating podcast episodes during the 2022-23 school year.

Working with English teacher Corrie Clements and using a recording booth that was created through a collaborative effort at Pathways Academy, the students were able to record podcasts on a topic of their choosing and select the style of podcast – such as talking solo, interviewing someone or hosting a roundtable discussion. Students did writing in preparation for the podcasts and recorded and edited the podcasts.

"I just wanted to give students an opportunity for ELA that wasn't writing another essay," Clements said. "This project teaches 21st century skills. It provides practice with public speaking and research and allows students to have autonomy on what they're doing."

Pathways Academy ELA students worked on podcasts throughout April. The projects were for a grade for class, and students also had the opportunity to submit their podcasts to the NPR Student Podcast Challenge. Many students listen to podcasts, so recording podcasts helped students stay engaged with the project, Clements said.

Many people were involved with creating the podcast recording booth. Pathways Academy teacher Adam Spatto's trades students built the structure, art students created the table design and many other students and staff helped.

The end result will be fresh produce grown right at Herkimer BOCES!





Director of school services and outreach serves on Rural Schools Association panel

Herkimer BOCES Director of School Services and Outreach Zane Mahar served on a panel for a session at the Rural Schools Association of New York State Summer Conference, which took place from July 9-11 in Cooperstown.

Mahar was the BOCES and Career and Technical Education representative for the panel and was joined by two administrators from rural school districts.

"It was an honor to be asked to represent CTE and all BOCES at the state level for rural schools," Mahar said.

The panel discussed the benefits of having programs approved by the New York State Education Department, what are some of the advantages to rural students, what are some unique challenges in a rural setting versus some for suburban or urban settings, Mahar said.

One issue that Mahar brought up was poverty and transportation. A colleague on the panel stated that the director's district used Perkins funds to provide bus passes for students to help facilitate travel to internship sites, but Mahar said a local lack of mass public transit such as rail or buses means even access to that funding doesn't necessarily help our students, so that issue needs to be continually looked into.


