





From our Transportation Director:

Welcome back, students! The Transportation Department at Galesburg-Augusta Community Schools works hard each day to ensure that all bus riders arrive safely to school and back home again. We are asking our Ram Fam to support us by talking to your students about following these simple but important procedures:



- **Be on time:** Make sure your child arrives at the designated bus stop five-ten minutes early each day.
- 10 20 feet: Students should wait for the bus safely and in an orderly fashion, back from the roadway. Behavior problems at the bus stop can create hazardous conditions for children and drivers.
- Wait for the signal: When the bus arrives, your child should wait for the bus driver's signal before boarding. Children should board single file.
- Ride safely & respectfully: Teach your child to sit calmly on the bus ride to and from school. Loud noises or behaviors can distract the bus driver, and it is important that they are able to concentrate on driving safely.

NINE DAYS OR LESS FOR SCHOOL SUCCESS!

Here at G-A, ensuring regular school attendance is a top priority. Our aim is for every student in the district to miss no more than nine school days.

Research indicates that students missing 1.5 days per month could miss the equivalent of over a year of instruction by high school graduation. Regardless of the reason, excessive school absences can lead to academic, emotional, and social setbacks. Prior to the pandemic, around 8 million students nationwide were chronically absent, a number that has doubled since Covid-19.

Now, more than ever, we need your support to ensure our students attend regularly. **Please send your child to school every day,** except in cases of fever or contagious illness. We will closely monitor attendance throughout the year and offer support to families when absences become a concern.

NOTIFICATION OF RIGHTS UNDER FERPA

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) affords parents and students who are 18 years of age or older ("eligible students") certain rights with respect to the student's education records. These rights are:

1. The right to inspect and review the student's education records within 45 days after the day the Galesburg-Augusta Community Schools receives a request for access.

Parents or eligible students who wish to inspect their child's or their education records should submit to the school principal a written request that identifies the records they wish to inspect. The school official will make arrangements for access and notify the parent or eligible student of the time and place where the records may be inspected.

2. The right to request the amendment of the student's education records that the parent or eligible student believes are inaccurate, misleading, or otherwise in violation of the student's privacy rights under FERPA.

Parents or eligible students who wish to ask Galesburg-Augusta Community Schools to amend their child's or their education record should write the school principal, clearly identify the part of the record they want changed and specify why it should be changed. If the school decides not to amend the record as requested by the parent or eligible student, the school will notify the parent or eligible student of the decision and of their right to a hearing regarding the request for amendment. Additional information regarding the hearing procedures will be provided to the parent or eligible student when notified of the right to a hearing.

3. The right to provide written consent before the school discloses personally identifiable information (PII) from the student's education records, except to the extent that FERPA authorizes disclosure without consent.

One exception, which permits disclosure without consent, is disclosure to school officials with legitimate educational interests. The criteria for determining who constitutes a school official and what constitutes a legitimate educational interest must be set forth in the school's or school district's annual notification for FERPA rights. A school official typically includes a person employed by the school or school district as an administrator, supervisor, instructor, or support staff member (including health or medical staff and law enforcement unit personnel) or a person serving on the school board. A school official also may include a volunteer, contractor, or consultant who, while not employed by the school, performs an institutional service or function for which the school would otherwise use its own employees and who is under the direct control of the school with respect to the use and maintenance of PII from education records, such as an attorney, auditor, medical consultant, or therapist; a parent or student volunteering to serve on an official committee, such as a disciplinary or grievance committee; or a parent, student, or other volunteer assisting another school official in performing his or her tasks. A school official typically has a legitimate educational interest if the official needs to review an education record in order to fulfill his or her professional responsibility.

4. The right to file a complaint with the U.S. Department of Education concerning alleged failures by the Galesburg-Augusta Community Schools to comply with the requirements of FERPA. The name and address of the Office that administers FERPA are:
