

We're thrilled to have our School Resource Officer, Pickaway County Sheriff Deputy Corey Hamlin, on-site as our designated Westfall DARE Officer! With this new designation, Deputy Hamlin introduced the DARE curriculum to our kindergarten classes, making Westfall the first Pickaway

County school to do so. He presents 15-minute lessons covering unsafe situations, knowing when to call 911, distinguishing food and non-foods, and demonstrating how to recognize and be careful with medicines.

In January 2024, Deputy Hamlin will visit our 5th-grade classes to teach the foundational skills that students need to lead safe, healthy, and responsible drug-free lives.


HONORING VETERANS

BLUE RIBBON COALITION

In 2021, the Pickaway Addiction Action Coalition (PAAC) was awarded the Drug-Free Community grant with the mission of educating the public about substance abuse and reducing youth substance use in Pickaway County. Since the grant award, PAAC has been involved in three intense training conferences, the National Coalition Institute, Graduate Coalition Institute, and the Ohio Coalition Institute, which have provided information and techniques for PAAC to target our two substance reduction initiatives, tobacco/vaping and alcohol. The Coalition has been hard at work, collaborating with school districts, like Westfall, to create the Youth Prevention Ambassadors and providing resources to Pickaway County communities.

In September, PAAC was recognized as a Blue Ribbon Coalition by the Community Anti-Drug Coalitions of America (CADCA) for \their work in youth substance use prevention. Because of PAAC's achieved status, they had been asked to be a part of the Drug-Free Communities 25th Anniversary Celebration hosted by the White House Office of National Drug Control Policy in October 2023.

Westfall Junior and Youth Prevention Ambassador was selected to accompany PAAC for this event. Marianna had the opportunity to meet and discuss with Congressional leaders the importance of continued programming and funding for youth prevention. We are appreciative of our partnership with PAAC for working with our students to promote prevention.






VESTFALL COLLEGE & CAREER CENTER
