Message from the SUPERINTENDENT

Dear Mustangs,

When I was hired at Westfall, the school board gave me four areas on which to focus and have continued to be the focus during my five years at Westfall.

- Safety
- · Educating the whole child
- Permanent improvements
- Communication

While three areas might be self-explanatory, what do we mean by educating the whole child?

The Association of Supervision and Curriculum Development (ASCD) states that educating the whole child involves promoting long-term development and success by developing transitions from focusing on narrowly defined academic achievement to promoting the long-term development and success of all children.

While focusing on the state standards has benefits, educating the whole child means recognizing the specific needs of our children in the Westfall community.

ASCD states that the "five tenets" of educating the whole child are health, safety, engagement, support, and challenge. Notice that each of these tenets overlaps with the areas of focus that the board has established. To address these five tenets successfully, we realize that our students' needs are constantly changing. They change because our world and community change, and our student body changes, one student at a time. Each new student might bring a new challenge to the district as we strive to apply the tenets to the individual needs of each student.

Some of the methods used to recognize the reality of our students in this community are our agricultural program, food science classes, visual and musical arts programs, and a digital academy. Even involving our students in community service is a method of educating the whole child. By incorporating these programs and activities into our curriculum, we are not only offering our students a well-rounded education but also showing them that their interests and passions are valued.

Our agricultural program teaches students about sustainable agriculture and how to care for livestock. Our food science classes allow students to explore the science behind food and culinary arts. Our visual and musical arts programs provide an outlet for creative expression and allow students to showcase their talents. Our digital academy provides a platform for students with unique circumstances to follow the curriculum, complete assignments, and receive assistance from a certified instructor outside the traditional classroom setting.

By involving our students in community service, we also teach them the importance of giving back to their community while developing a broader sense of responsibility. Our goal is to inspire and empower our students to reach their fullest potential, preparing them for the future by equipping them with the skills and knowledge they need to succeed in their chosen paths, whether in college, a trade school, or the workforce.

STUDENT-RUN CREDIT UNION COMING TO WESTFALL



Westfall Local School District is introducing a student-run credit union to K-12 students to promote financial literacy through a hands-on academic experience. This initiative aims to empower students with practical knowledge about finances while allowing them to gain work experience as employees within a banking setup while at school.

The student-run credit union project is a partnership between Westfall Local School District and Atomic Credit Union to foster financial responsibility and prepare students for real-world banking scenarios. The credit union will provide an educational platform for students to learn about banking operations, customer service, and money management.

Starting in February 2024, students will begin financial literacy lessons to aid in the program; then, they will have the opportunity to apply for positions as tellers. Successful candidates will work once a week on Friday mornings to serve their peers under the supervision and guidance of an Atomic Credit Union employee, who will officially submit all transactions. Students interested in becoming tellers will be provided with an application to complete and undergo a selection process that includes an interview and training from an Atomic Credit Union employee.

The credit union will be set up in a common area of each building, accessible to students to visit and conduct banking transactions. Westfall Elementary will participate in the student-run credit union weekly on Fridays during breakfast, while middle and high school students will participate during their Flex period.

As a welcome into the program, when students open a savings account through the student-run credit union, Atomic Credit Union will contribute \$2 to each new student member account. Each member will also receive a money pouch to keep their transaction safe and organized. At division schools, ACU will award \$500 scholarships to qualifying seniors with established accounts. The credit union experience will serve as a platform for practical learning and encourage students to consider future careers in finance or related fields.

This is a unique opportunity for Westfall Local Schools. As the first school in Pickaway County to participate in this program, the student-run credit union is expected to become a cornerstone of the school district's commitment to providing students with the tools they need to successfully navigate adulthood's financial aspects. INTERESTED IN PRESCHOOL?



Westfall Preschool is open for the upcoming year. If you are interested in having your four-year-old child attend the Westfall Preschool program, please complete the 2024-2025 WES Preschool Interest Form at https://bit.ly/3w76pPq February 23.

If you have concerns with speech, behavior, or learning for your three-year-old child, you may also complete this form for a screening. Please include your concerns. This interest form is our first step! Completing this interest form DOES NOT GUARANTEE your child's enrollment.

Completing this interest form allows the Westfall Preschool Coordinator to prioritize the ages and needs of the children. The **second step** is when the Preschool Coordinator emails you **in March** with a screening appointment, a request for income verification, and two proof of residence documents.

Income verification is required by the state to determine the placement of your child according to state funding. Third, once the children's screenings are complete and income and residency are verified, families will receive another email about enrollment. Last, if your child is eligible for any of our three preschool units, a full enrollment packet will need to be picked up, completed, and submitted to the school secretary, and complete FinalForms by April 19. Please DO NOT complete FinalForms until you are directed by a school staff member.



Junior ASVAB Exam

The ASVAB test, or Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery, is a standardized test that assesses a student's abilities in math, science, reading comprehension, and mechanical knowledge. This test is often used by the military to determine a person's eligibility for enlistment and to identify which career paths may be best suited for their skills and interests.

For our junior class who took the test, the score reports will be available later this month and can be used as a valuable resource in helping to plan their future, whether that be in the military or the workforce. These reports provide insight into strengths and weaknesses, as well as offer guidance in selecting courses and career paths that align with interest and ability.
