Soft Sugar Cookies


Ingredients

- 3 ³/₄ cups all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- ½ teaspoon salt

- 1 ½ cups white sugar
- 1 cup margarine, softened
- 2 large eggs
- 2 teaspoons vanilla extract

Directions

- 1. Sift flour, baking powder, and salt together in a medium bowl; set aside.
- 2. Beat sugar and margarine in a large bowl with an electric mixer until smooth. Wrap dough; chill in the refrigerator for 2 hours.
- 3. Beat first egg into butter mixture. Beat second egg into mixture along with vanilla extract; add flour mixture and stir until dough is just combined.
- 4. Wrap dough; chill in the refrigerator for 2 hours.
- 5. Preheat the oven to 400 degrees F (200 degrees C). Grease two cookie sheets.
- 6. Roll out dough on a clean floured surface to 1/4-inch thickness. Cut out shapes using cookie cutters; arrange them on the prepared cookie sheets. Gather scraps and repeat this step.
- 7. Bake in batches in the preheated oven until edges are golden, about 6 to 8 minutes. Cool on the baking sheet briefly before removing to a wire rack to cool completely.
- 8. Decorate!
- 9. EAT!


