Students: Just who are you, anyway? What do you think of when I say "college"?


Parents: What do you hope and dream for your student? What kind of school? What financial parameters do you have?


Find your admission counselor on the college's website.

The College Fair



A chance to learn more about schools from the experts

Get a list before you go and highlight the schools you want to visit

Don't ignore schools you've never heard of-you might find your dream school!

So, you're at the fair. What should you do?

Introduce yourself to the rep. It's a conversation.

Use the Strive Scan app to preregister your information.

Ask the reps about what is important to you.

PS: We're usually lined up alphabetically.



The power of email

Have your student create an email that will be just for the college search.

Don't make me guess who you are.

Have a conversation with your student about appropriate communication.

A no-brainer: check your email regularly!

I love emails like this:

Dear Ms. Ritter,

Hello! My name is Sally Student and I am a junior at St. Mary's High School. Xavier is a school that interests me, and I wanted to know when the best time to visit campus would be.

Sincerely,
Sally Student
Chicagoland High School Class of '25 sallys.college25@gmail.com

This, not so much:

Hey my name is Jimmy Student and i attend Adams High School in the Chicago suburbs and i would love to attend your university. But as of now my grades are not good and my GPA is a 2.2. So i was wondering are there any admissions requirements or a certain GPA i will need to get excepted in?

Questionable:

Campus Visits 101



Summer? School year?

Pre-register!

Two types:

- Individual/"Daily Visit"
- Open House

Ask for local recommendations

Your typical campus visit

Information Session

Campus Tour

Meal in the cafeteria

Coupon for the bookstore

Extras:

- Meet with professor/coach
- View campus event



You will be walking around campus, so plan your shoes and outerwear accordingly!

Ask (and answer) questions!

Visits are your time to be a detective.

Have some prepared questions ready for each school you visit.

Personalize your questions.

We want to know about you, too!

Here are a few good questions

Are classes taught by professors?

What do students do on the weekends?

What is the placement rate?

How do I find an internship?

Can students have cars on campus?

Do students graduate in four years?

What is the profile of admitted students?

After the Visit

Debrief in the car

Take notes and photos

Determine what your student liked and what they didn't.

Follow up with your counselor.



- Talk to your school counselor and find your Rachel



- Schools can "shape" the class
- Admit rates of 15% or less.

The application itself

Gather your information before you start.

Use the student's contact information.

Complete ALL sections to the best of your ability!

Use your full name as it appears on your high school transcript.

You do not need to complete the full application in one sitting.


The Transcript



- •GPA
- Courses taken and grade trends.
- How did you take advantage of the curriculum you were offered?
- •Are there specific course requirements for the major?

List of Activities

- There are no activities that count more than others
- It's not a contest to see how many things you've done; do what you love.
- Don't forget about work or family responsibilities
- •Some schools don't even LOOK at activities as part of the process.
- •It's OK to be "well lopsided."



Letters of Recommendation

- Can give further insight into the student
- •Not just what you've done, but who you are.
- Usually accompanied by a school profile
- •Help us to see the student in the parameters of that particular institution
- •In other words, a third party endorsement

Want to be really nice? Write a thank you note!

Essays and Personal Statements

This past year, I read about 1000 applications.

Over the course of my career, I've read more than 10,000 essays.



Why do we ask for an essay?

To provide further insight into you as a PERSON, not just a STUDENT.

To allow you to highlight your ability to write clearly, concisely and critically.

To give you a forum to show us (NOT tell us) what makes you YOU.

To help the admission committee see you as a member of that community.

The Common Application

- 1. Some students have a background, identity, interest, or talent that is so meaningful they believe their application would be incomplete without it. If this sounds like you, then please share your story.
- 2. The lessons we take from obstacles we encounter can be fundamental to later success. Recount a time when you faced a challenge, setback, or failure. How did it affect you, and what did you learn from the experience?
- 3. Reflect on a time when you questioned or challenged a belief or idea. What prompted your thinking? What was the outcome?
- 4. Reflect on something that someone has done for you that has made you happy or thankful in a surprising way. How has this gratitude affected or motivated you?
- 5. Discuss an accomplishment, event, or realization that sparked a period of personal growth and a new understanding of yourself or others.
- 6. Describe a topic, idea, or concept you find so engaging that it makes you lose all track of time. Why does it captivate you? What or who do you turn to when you want to learn more?
- 7. Share an essay on any topic of your choice. It can be one you've already written, one that responds to a different prompt, or one of your own design.

No matter what topic you choose...

Stay away from the common and cliché...make it YOURS.

Your thesaurus doesn't need to be your best friend.

Read it out loud before you submit. Does it feel like something you would say?

Is it important to you? Make sure it passes the "So What?" test.

You don't have to have the biggest story ever!

Nothing is perfect... but it might come close

- •Why are you excited about this school in the first place?
- •Can you see yourself as part of the community?
- •Is this a PERFECT place? Or a FANTASTIC MATCH for your abilities, personality and goals?



Keep In Mind

- We admit far more students than we can enroll
- It's OK to tell a school you've moved on.
- •Only apply to schools in which you are truly interested!

Fun with the FAFSA


The 2023-24 FAFSA has gone through a simplification. What does this mean for you?

- The form should be simpler to complete.
- If you have completed a FAFSA with an older child, you will notice that the Expected Family Contribution (EFC) has been replaced with the Student Aid Index (SAI)
- Bottom line: we're all being introduced to the new form together. Stay in touch with your admission counselor for further guidance.

WUE

- 160+ Institutions Participating
- WUE amount and qualifications vary by school
 - Could be degree specific
- Great question to ask your admission counselor if you are looking at out of state schools in the West.



What can you do now?
