Copeland Middle School Code of Conduct

Philosophy

Copeland Middle School is dedicated to fostering a safe, inclusive, culturally responsive and productive learning community with compassionate and respectful citizens. The student code of conduct at Copeland Middle School represents a progressive discipline model, which can yield growth, behavioral changes, and personal understanding of one's responsibilities to the greater good. Through the implementation of community building, student reflection and accountability measures, students gain critical thinking skills, social-emotional capacity, and valuable life lessons that will help them become productive members of society. This process balances the needs and rights of students with the needs and expectations of the school and larger community.

A tiered code of conduct model is based on the principle that students thrive in an environment where there is structure and clear expectations. Many behavioral concerns can be mitigated through Tier I interventions, while allowing staff members and administrators the ability to provide resources and support to those students who have a harder time with behavioral expectations. Clear and concise interventions and responses reduce ambiguity and provide clarity and a common language.

Tier I Infractions Defined

Tier I infractions represent behaviors which disrupt the learning climate of the school. These infractions refer to offenses that do not result in damage to property, severe disrespect, or bodily harm. These infractions are to be addressed at the time they occur by the staff member who observed the occurrence. The interventions and responses are intended to impose a response that will affect a change in behavior and prevent minor behavioral problems from becoming more serious behavioral problems. All Tier I infractions and staff responses must be entered into Genesis.

Where appropriate, community building, student reflection and accountability measures should be implemented in conjunction with Tier I Code of Conduct interventions and responses to help promote positive social relationships and reductions in student misbehavior.

The frequency and severity of the infractions listed above will determine whether or not they are immediately escalated to Tier II or Tier III.

Tier II Infractions Defined

Tier II infractions represent serious or frequent behaviors which tend to disrupt the learning climate and require the intervention of an administrator. These infractions often result when Tier I interventions and responses are unsuccessful at correcting the behavior, or when a student's behavior is determined to be disrespectful to peers or staff, compromises academic integrity, or can result in bodily harm or property damage. Tier II infractions result in a referral to the grade level administrator. All Tier II infractions and staff responses must be entered into Genesis and parents must be notified.

Tier II Progressive Discipline Intervention & Responses

The frequency and severity of the infractions listed above will determine whether or not they are immediately escalated to Tier III. Additionally, CMS administration reserves the right to increase disciplinary interventions and responses when a student is found to have committed multiple student infractions or based on the severity of the infraction.

Tier III Infractions Defined

Tier III infractions require immediate administrator intervention and are to be reported to the administrator at the time the infraction occurs or is first witnessed. Depending on the nature of the Tier III violation, police involvement may be necessary. All Tier III infractions and staff responses must be entered into Genesis and parents must be notified.

Tier III Progressive Discipline Intervention & Responses

Out of concern for student and staff safety, all Tier III infractions may result in the immediate loss of privileges at the discretion of the administration. Additionally, CMS administration reserves the right to increase disciplinary interventions and responses when a student is found to have committed multiple student infractions or based on the severity of the infraction.
