

PBIS	Our whole school is working to earn a "Dress like a book character day." If we earn enough PAWS coins, this will be on Tuesday, October 31st. We will find out if we've earned it on Monday, Oct. 30th. We will email, post on our Facebook group, and send home a paper flier to let everyone know. Some guidelines: no masks, gore, weapons, fake blood, etc. Students are encouraged to bring the book their character is from (if we have it at school, they can borrow it for the day). Keep in mind, this is a P.E. day, so students may need a change of clothes.
К	In kindergarten we are working hard on our writing, and being able to write a letter for every sound we hear in a word. We are learning some heart words (I, am, the, like, and). We also finished up another chapter in our math and took our Reading NWEA. Next week we will take the Math NWEA.
1/2	First and second graders have had a busy week! In spelling, they have been working on the digraphs ck, sh, and th. They have been working very hard, and especially enjoy writing words and sentences on whiteboards. In addition to practicing the spelling pattern on our boards, we are also focusing on using lowercase letters unless a capital is needed. Students are really enjoying the challenge of practicing at home! Thank you for helping them remember to bring their work back after completing it!
2/3 tiger = ti ger	Oct 23: We completed NWEA tests this week, for math and reading. I will have the results from 2nd grade to share at Parent Teacher Conferences, and will share the results from 3rd grade once they are available. We continue our work on syllable division rules. This week we focused on Tiger words. These are words that have an open syllable (long vowel sound) followed by a closed syllable. Here are some examples:

4/5	This week has been very busy! We did both Math and Reading assessments for Maine Through Year Grade 3-5 which previously was called NWEA. Hopefully, I will have results to share during parent teacher conferences this coming week. We also finished learning more about igneous rocks and started sedimentary rocks in science. The fifth graders had a great time at The Gulf of Maine Institute! We are planning follow up activities and our thank you to the sponsors who support this great experience.

Title One	Title 1 is up and running feel free to stop in while you are here for conferences. Also, I will be having a make and take game activity as well as power word games to take home. Please stop by the Title 1 room and learn about the power words and how they can help your child read more fluently. I will have ready made games for families to take home featuring these words.
PE	Monroe had another fantastic week in PE - we continue to work on many different things but I'm so impressed with the effort, positive attitude and perseverance.
Agriculture	We finally met our Adopt-a-Cow, Recking Ball, this week! She is an adorable Holstein calf and was born on September 2. We will receive monthly updates on her throughout the year. Students also harvested greens, onions, and radishes from the garden. In preparation for making homemade Calendula Lip Balm, Mrs. Norgang's class steeped calendula flowers in olive oil.
SEL	This week everyone went on an emoji emotion scavenger hunt!



What are they?

High frequency words are ones that show up more frequently in texts than other words. Many of them are not decodable (sound it out) words.

Why learn high frequency words?

The first thirteen words account for more than 25% of the words in print. The first 109 make up half of all words children will encounter when reading.(Adams 1990; Blevins2017: Richman 1971)

If the child also has some basic phonics skills, the child could read up to 90% of single syllable words they see in a book. (Solity and Vousden 2009)

How can families help?

- 1. Make learning fun. See the games we have provided.
- 2. Read together.
- 3. Go on word hunts.
- 4. Practice writing high frequency words. Have your child think about the parts they do know, for example, the first sound and letter.

Come to the Title 1 room when you are here during Parent teacher conferences on October 25, or and learn about games you can play to help your child learn these valuable words. I will have games for you to take home with you!



Is my child too sick for school?

Each day many parents are faced with a decision: should they keep their sick children at home or send them to school? Often the way a child looks and acts can make the decision an obvious one. In accordance with Maine Department of Health and Human Services guidelines, a child should not attend school if he/she exhibits one or more of the following symptoms or infections:

Keep your child home if he/she has any of the following symptoms:

- Fever (Greater than 100° F)- the student may return when fever-free for 24 hours WITHOUT the use of fever reducing medication.
- Cough: A child with an uncontrolled cough should stay home until they are coughing with less frequency.
- **Diarrhea/Vomiting**: A child with diarrhea and/or vomiting should stay at home and return to school only after being symptom free for 24 hours.
- Rash- Any new onset of rash if accompanied by fever; may return after rash resolves or diagnosis is made and clearance given
- Skin Lesions (sores) A student should not be at school with any sores with drainage that cannot be contained within a bandage
- Strep Throat/Impetigo and other bacterial infections requiring antibiotics- A student
 with strep throat must remain home until they have been on their antibiotics for a full 24
 hours.
- Colds- A child with thick yellow-greenish mucous accompanied by fever, vomiting, diarrhea. or constant nasal discharge should remain home. Very few younger children can effectively blow their noses and wash their hands afterward. A child with the above symptoms will quickly spread the illness to other children.
- Other- Any symptoms or complaints that prevent the student from active participation in usual school activities

If your student tests positive for COVID-19, they must isolate at home for 5 days. After 5 days they may return with symptom improvement, masking days 6 through 10. More information can be found here: https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/your-health/isolation.

Home is the best place for a child who is ill. Students with these symptoms cannot comfortably participate in school activities and unnecessarily expose others to their illnesses.

FREE VETERANS LAW CLASS

"Who doesn't know a veteran" or "THE VA"?

One phrase rings true, the other spurs thoughts of frustration, bureaucratic double-speak; and confusion.

However, some attorneys, like Mailloux and Marden's Tyler Hadyniak (Mount View Class of 2011), are experts in navigating the VA benefits system and helping veterans get disability benefits for medical conditions they think are related to service.

Tyler's legal career began in veterans law, and he is the only veterans disability law attorney in Waldo and Knox Counties.

This course will be a basic, introductory guide to veterans benefits law. There is no charge to attend but registration is required.

Tyler will walk participants through the VA benefits process, and explain what an applicant needs to prove and how to do it. By the end of the class, participants will be able to explain to veterans, their friends, and family, what is required to get compensation through the VA.
