



К	Kindergartens are working hard on knowing 13 out of our first set of 25 words. We learned about Veterans day. In Math we learned all about comparing numbers and making sets that are equal, greater than or less than and did great on the chapter test. We are excited to kick off our "Week of Thanks" activities.		
1/2	First and Second graders have been learning about animal habitats and adaptations. Students are trying out some of these amazing adaptations and writing books about this topic. It is so interesting to learn all of the different ways animals survive in their environments!		
2/3	We started a science unit on Sound and Vibrations. We discussed vocabulary related to sound: volume, pitch, ear canal, eardrum and vibrations. We are learning from videos, nonfiction texts and simple experiments. The picture shows students communicating through a "cup phone." We also used rubber bands over different containers to make "guitars" and notice the different sounds made with different containers. Please help your student try more of these experiments at home!		
4/5	Students made birthday cards for a couple Veterans from Maine turning 103 and 104 this week! For informational writing, we are hoping to have our book ready for the publisher by Monday if all goes well and the order forms are returned. We will be wrapping up a few units before the end of the trimester on 11/24 so be prepared for students to bring home more work if not completed during class time.

Library	K-2 are going strong with Non-Fiction November! This week we read What Do You Do With a Tail Like This? by Steve Jenkins. We learned that some animals have adapted to use their tails, noses/beaks, and even their different types of feet for all sorts of things! Ms. Cianchette's class got to try out some adaptations of their own- could they use these funky gloves to pick up small items? They *could* learn how!
	Mrs. Norgang and Mrs. Haslett's classes are working on their chapter books. Mrs. Haslett's class is almost finished with Wildfire, which means we will be starting something new very soon!
Agriculture	Tis the season for falling leaves! This week, our K-3 students conducted a leaf investigation. We learned that leaves are food factories for plants. Then we drew, measured, and labeled leaves, and made leaf rubbings. Our fourth and fifth graders finished fencing in the last of the orchard trees and mulched the garlic with a thick layer of straw. We'll continue to head outside often, so have your child bundle up on Thursdays!

Is my child too sick for school?

Each day many parents are faced with a decision: should they keep their sick children at home or send them to school? Often the way a child looks and acts can make the decision an obvious one. In accordance with Maine Department of Health and Human Services guidelines, a child should not attend school if he/she exhibits one or more of the following symptoms or infections:

Keep your child home if he/she has any of the following symptoms:

- Fever (Greater than 100° F)- the student may return when fever-free for 24 hours WITHOUT the use of fever reducing medication.
- Cough: A child with an uncontrolled cough should stay home until they are coughing with less frequency.
- **Diarrhea/Vomiting**: A child with diarrhea and/or vomiting should stay at home and return to school only after being symptom free for 24 hours.
- Rash- Any new onset of rash if accompanied by fever; may return after rash resolves or diagnosis is made and clearance given
- Skin Lesions (sores) A student should not be at school with any sores with drainage that cannot be contained within a bandage
- Strep Throat/Impetigo and other bacterial infections requiring antibiotics- A student
 with strep throat must remain home until they have been on their antibiotics for a full 24
 hours
- Colds- A child with thick yellow-greenish mucous accompanied by fever, vomiting, diarrhea. or constant nasal discharge should remain home. Very few younger children can effectively blow their noses and wash their hands afterward. A child with the above symptoms will quickly spread the illness to other children.
- Other- Any symptoms or complaints that prevent the student from active participation in usual school activities

If your student tests positive for COVID-19, they must isolate at home for 5 days. After 5 days they may return with symptom improvement, masking days 6 through 10. More information can be found here: https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/your-health/isolation.

Home is the best place for a child who is ill. Students with these symptoms cannot comfortably participate in school activities and unnecessarily expose others to their illnesses.
