What an amazing week we just had. The staff and students at all of our schools came back with a lot of enthusiasm and seemed very excited to be back in school. We were all able to settle back into our routines quickly. Students were eager to continue work on learning that started before the break and even began the winter assessments. Clearly the winter weather has finally found us and I would just like to remind everyone to please send your child(ren) dressed appropriately for both inside and outside activities. We do not take the students outside for recess if the temperature is below 10 degrees, this includes windchill. However, it is always our plan to get students outside during the day when the temperatures allow, so sending students to school with appropriate outside gear including a warm jacket, boots, ski pants, mittens, etc. Please don't hesitate to let the office or me know if you need any of these items.

RSU 3 recently sent out a public notice and I wanted to make sure you all had the opportunity to see it.

On Tuesday, January 9, 2024, and Wednesday, January 10, 2024, RSU 3 Superintendent Paul Penna and Assistant Superintendent Lisa Roux will host brief conversation opportunities to brainstorm some of the potential pros and cons of school consolidation in RSU 3. Currently, we are focusing on Morse School in Brooks and Walker School in Liberty. 

One of the ways students practice spelling is with "orthographic mapping." Two students are shown here using picture cards to give them words with long vowels to spell. They use the pop-its to count how many sounds are in a word.

then match letters to each sound. Partners help each other fix mistakes before they write the word a second time. Our class is working on phonics and spelling with CVCe words (make, drone, chime) and CVVC words (rain, float, peach, boil). It takes a lot of time and practice for students to know which spelling to use for a long vowel sound, which is why we sometimes see words spelled like this: fighn (fine), bote (boat), boyl (boil).

Tried any roots or stems lately?! Our K-1 students have! We ate our way through six different plant parts this week: roots (carrots), stems (celery), leaves (spinach and red leaf lettuce), seeds (popcorn), flowers (wild violet jelly), and fruit (pineapple)! Team Norgang expanded their knowledge of the three main grains grown around the world: wheat, corn, and rice. We sampled some corn! Students in Mrs. Haslett's class used maple leaves we collected this past fall, as well as a leaf identification book, in a quest to identify the specific species of maples in our woods. Do we have any sugar maples amongst the trees we tapped last year? Stay tuned!

#### Is my child too sick for school?

Each day many parents are faced with a decision: should they keep their sick children at home or send them to school? Often the way a child looks and acts can make the decision an obvious one. In accordance with Maine Department of Health and Human Services guidelines, a child should not attend school if he/she exhibits one or more of the following symptoms or infections:

#### Keep your child home if he/she has any of the following symptoms:

- Fever (Greater than 100° F)- the student may return when fever-free for 24 hours WITHOUT the use of fever reducing medication.
- Cough: A child with an uncontrolled cough should stay home until they are coughing with less frequency.
- **Diarrhea/Vomiting**: A child with diarrhea and/or vomiting should stay at home and return to school only after being symptom free for 24 hours.
- Rash- Any new onset of rash if accompanied by fever; may return after rash resolves or diagnosis is made and clearance given
- Skin Lesions (sores) A student should not be at school with any sores with drainage that cannot be contained within a bandage
- Strep Throat/Impetigo and other bacterial infections requiring antibiotics- A student
  with strep throat must remain home until they have been on their antibiotics for a full 24
  hours.
- Colds- A child with thick yellow-greenish mucous accompanied by fever, vomiting, diarrhea. or constant nasal discharge should remain home. Very few younger children can effectively blow their noses and wash their hands afterward. A child with the above symptoms will quickly spread the illness to other children.
- Other- Any symptoms or complaints that prevent the student from active participation in usual school activities

If your student tests positive for COVID-19, they must isolate at home for 5 days. After 5 days they may return with symptom improvement, masking days 6 through 10. More information can be found here: https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/your-health/isolation.

Home is the best place for a child who is ill. Students with these symptoms cannot comfortably participate in school activities and unnecessarily expose others to their illnesses.
