Public Notice

Due to the storm day on the originally scheduled meeting for Wednesday, January 10, we are rescheduling this meeting for Wednesday, January 17, 2024, at Walker Elementary School in Liberty from 5:30 to 6:30 pm.

At this meeting, RSU 3 Superintendent Paul Penna and Assistant Superintendent Lisa Roux will host brief conversation opportunities to brainstorm some of the potential pros and cons of school consolidation in RSU 3. Currently, we are focusing on Morse School in Brooks and Walker School in Liberty. This is an initial conversation to generate feedback to help the school board make an informed decision about school consolidation in RSU 3. The school board values this opportunity to collaborate with stakeholders in the best interest of all students in our school community.

A few important Reminders this week include:

- At this time, we are still asking that students be dropped off at the main entrance where a staff member will greet them and escort them inside.
- Daily dismissal time will begin with parent pick ups at 3:00, followed by bus dismissals beginning at approximately 3:15. Parents are asked to pull up to the entrance and your child will be brought out to meet your car. During drop off and pick up, if you plan to walk your child to the door, please park in the parking lot across the street so as not to interrupt the flow of traffic. Thank you!

Check out what's happening at Morse School ... Week Of: 1/8


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This week, we have been excited to work on writing narratives. Right now, we are focused on drawing a detailed picture of what happened, labeling the picture by stretching out the sounds in words, and writing sentences that match the picture. We had a lot of fun this week, and students were very proud to put what they know into practice and see their own growth!



1/2 B Math is everywhere! We are continuing to work on understanding numbers. Place value understanding is important and students continue to build, manipulate, and use their new understandings to help each other grow. Morning centers this week will focus on skip counting within 1,000, reading written numbers, number bonds, and adding to 20. Phonics continues to be an important part of our daily routines. Understanding the sounds letters make when put together helps us to read unknown words. Seesaw continues to show our learning. Last week, students unscrambled sentences and read them to improve reading fluency.

1/2 P	Our class shows off their math skills every week on IXL during math centers and several students are even practicing at home as well. Most recently we earned certificates for answering 2,000 language arts questions and mastering 10 first grade skills. Earlier in the year I sent home login information for your child to practice at home. If you would like this information again please let me know. In writing, students are working on editing their teaching books to publish and share with the class. I can't wait to hear all the interesting topics that students know a lot about. We chose to spend our PAT time this week having a dance party with popcorn in the gym. What full

This week we will begin our research on historical figures and students will choose the historical figure they want to learn more about. 3/4 R	Most students completed their writing assessments this week. I am so proud of their growth and confidence as writers! I'm looking forward to seeing growth in reading as we complete those assessments over the next few weeks. We will also take math assessments. I appreciate all your help to have your child at school by 8:15 in the morning in order to eat breakfast and prepare for the day.

Is my child too sick for school?

Each day many parents are faced with a decision: should they keep their sick children at home or send them to school? Often the way a child looks and acts can make the decision an obvious one. In accordance with Maine Department of Health and Human Services guidelines, a child should not attend school if he/she exhibits one or more of the following symptoms or infections: **Keep your child home if he/she has any of the following symptoms:**

- Fever (Greater than 100° F)- the student may return when fever-free for 24 hours WITHOUT the use of fever reducing medication.
- **Cough:** A child with an uncontrolled cough should stay home until they are coughing with less frequency.
- **Diarrhea/Vomiting**: A child with diarrhea and/or vomiting should stay at home and return to school only after being symptom free for 24 hours.
- **Rash** Any new onset of rash if accompanied by fever; may return after rash resolves or diagnosis is made and clearance given
- Skin Lesions (sores) A student should not be at school with any sores with drainage that cannot be contained within a bandage
- Strep Throat/Impetigo and other bacterial infections requiring antibiotics- A student with strep throat must remain home until they have been on their antibiotics for a full 24 hours.
- **Colds-** A child with thick yellow-greenish mucous accompanied by fever, vomiting, diarrhea. or constant nasal discharge should remain home. Very few younger children can effectively blow their noses and wash their hands afterward. A child with the above symptoms will quickly spread the illness to other children.
- Other- Any symptoms or complaints that prevent the student from active participation in usual school activities

If your student tests positive for COVID-19, they must isolate at home for 5 days. After 5 days they may return with symptom improvement, masking days 6 through 10. More information can be found here: https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/your-health/isolation.

Home is the best place for a child who is ill. Students with these symptoms cannot comfortably participate in school activities and unnecessarily expose others to their illnesses.
