


Fine Arts Credit

- Landscaping and Turf Science






New Fine Arts Opportunity

This year we are pleased to be able to offer Landscaping and Turf Science as another way to earn the required Fine Arts credit.

Course Activities: Students participating in the course will have the opportunity to gain experience in the daily tasks associated with maintaining various turfgrass fields on the campus of South Gibson County High School. These students will be trained on the proper safety procedures to operate the various pieces of equipment used in the daily operations. In addition, they will have the opportunity to operate these pieces of equipment once they have passed their safety certifications. This course will also incorporate the use of drone technology. Students will be given the opportunity to see how drones are used in the daily practices in the agriculture industry and learn to operate them as well.



Types of Diplomas


- Regular Diploma (meet the requirements set forth by the State of TN)
- **Honors Diploma** (meet all 4 benchmarks on ACT, English=18, Reading=22,Math=22, Science=23)
- **Hornet Scholar** Students who meet a minimum of 1700 points (no rounding) using their ACT score and GPA will qualify for the Hornet Scholar Diploma. The ACT score is super scored. This is the highest recognition that you can receive at South Gibson County High School.

Formula: GPA x 250(max 1000) + ACT x 27.7777(max1000)

Ex: 3.9 x 250 + 28 x 27.7777= 1752.7756 pts.

Ex: 3.9 x 250 + 25 x 27.7777=1669.4425 pts.

Types of Recognitions



TN Scholar

- 80 hours of community service
- No more than 9 days absent per year
- Maintain a "C" average
- Can not be suspended
- Certain Academic Coursework Required


Tri Star Scholar

• Earn a 19 on ACT and earn a capstone industry certification.

Work Ethic Certificate

• A point system based on the work ethic certificate standards. Students must demonstrate they possess employable skills, as identified by local industries.

Types of Recognitions Continued




Distinction

There are a number of different ways a student can be recognized as a Distinction graduate (a full list is listed on page 45 of the handbook). Here are a few examples:

- Earning 12 hours of postsecondary credit
- Earning a nationally recognized industry certification
- Making a 31 on the ACT
- Attending a Governor's School
- Etc.

The ACT

- The higher your ACT score, the better, especially in terms of \$\$ and acceptance into college.
- There are 7 National Test Dates throughout the year. Your child is responsible for signing up online for any of those that he/she wants to take. We announce each of those about a week before the deadline to register. F/R lunch 2 fee waivers.
- There are 2 State Test Dates. One in the Spring for Juniors and one in the Fall for Seniors.
- Students typically take the ACT 3-5 times.
- Your child will be taking a practice Pareto test here at SGCHS on TBD. Basically, it is a retired ACT test. It will be administered online.
- A lot of students will start taking the ACT the summer after their Sophomore year.


- To get busy!



Financial Aid Terms



- Cost of Attendance The total amount of college expenses before financial aid. Cost of attendance includes money spent on tuition and fees, room and board, books and supplies, and living expenses.
- FAFSA Free Application for Federal Student Aid
- Grant and Scholarship Money that does not have to be paid back, some might have criteria you have to meet
- Student Loan Unsecured student loan is backed by federal government, it does have to be paid back, but typically at a low interest. Do not borrow more than you need.

TN Promise and HOPE



- TN Promise You can go to a 2-year college, TCAT Schools, or an Associates program at some 4-year universities tuition free. You must meet admission requirements and TN Promise requirements.
- Hope/Lottery Scholarship Students must have a 3.0 or 21 on ACT to receive this scholarship. At a 4-year university, students receive \$4500 per year for their Freshman/Sophomore years and \$5700 per year for their Junior/Senior years.

 Foreign Language 2 units (same language)





AP and Dual Enrollment



- AP Advanced Placement courses are hard but worth it. We offer AP HG, AP Psychology, AP Lang & Comp, AP US History, AP Computer Science Principles, and AP Calculus. There is an exam at the end of the course. If you make a 3 or higher, most colleges will accept that course as college credit. If you make a 3 or higher, our district will reimburse you the cost of the exam. Students get +5 added to their course grade.
- Dual Enrollment Can start as a Junior. Must have a 3.0 high school GPA. All DE courses are taught online with the exception of some CTE DEs. If your child's DE is taught online, that means that no one at this school is making sure your child is doing his/her work. Make sure your child is self disciplined and self motivated. The student takes the course for one semester. One block is dedicated to the DE course. Pass the course, get the college credit. Most colleges accept DE classes. Must maintain a college GPA of 2.75 to remain eligible for these.

Statewide and Local Dual Credit



• We offer **Statewide Dual Credit** in Pre-Calculus and Statistics. Students take the course here at SGC just like they do any other course and at the end of the course students take a challenge exam. If they pass the challenge exam, they get college credit at any public university in the State of TN. There is no cost for the course or the exam. Students receive +4 points to their grade.

• We offer Local Dual Credit in Wellness and Personal Finance. Students take the course here at SGC and at the end of the course there is a challenge exam. If the student passes the challenge exam, they get credit at JSCC. Students receive +4 points to their grade.



Honors/CLEP Courses

 Students can take the CLEP exam and earn college credit in Spanish III Honors/CLEP, Biology II Honors/CLEP, Chemistry II Honors/CLEP and Accounting II CLEP.

• Students take the course here at SGC with a teacher and at the end of the course they take the CLEP exam here at SGC. If they pass the exam, they earn college credit for an equivalent course.

• When students take the exam, they get +5 to their grade.



Incentive for Taking Rigorous Coursework



- Students can earn a maximum of 5.0 (versus 4.0 points) for the following courses:
 - Any AP course
 - Any DE course
 - Any Statewide Dual Credit course
- Students can earn a maximum of 4.5 (versus 4.0 points) for the following courses:
 - Any Honors Course





Incentive Continued

Examples:

- Algebra I Honors = A, 4.5 points vs 4.0
- Geometry Honors = A, 4.5 points vs 4.0
- Algebra II Honors = B, 3.5 points vs 3.0
- Pre-Calculus SDC = B, 4.0 points vs 3.0
- AP Calculus = A 5.0 Points, B 4.0 points, C 3.0 points, D 2.0 points
- If you made an A in AP calculus, your math average will be 4.3 average. If you made a B, 4.1. On a 4.0 scale if you made an A, your average is a 3.6, B is a 3.4.



How is my GPA calculated?



• Your GPA is calculated 3 ways – on a 100-point scale, a 4.0 scale, and a 5.0 scale.







ISM Work Program

What: An extended Work Based Learning Program allowing seniors to use school time to gain career-based experience

Regular WBL vs ISM WBL: Regular WBL takes place during 4th Block Spring semester for general work experience. ISM WBL works around the student's schedule one or both semesters to allow multiple blocks of WBL for <u>career-based</u> experience



Requirements: Strong grades and strong attendance are crucial in showing a dedication to work. Students also complete an ISM Application before being accepted into the program.
