# NCA

Perryville High School has been a member of the North Central Association (NCA) of Colleges and Schools since 1969. The purpose of NCA is the improvement of education through evaluation and accreditation. As a member of the North Central Association, Perryville High School must undergo reevaluation every seven years. The three phases of reevaluation include a self-evaluation conducted by the staff, an evaluation conducted by a visiting committee of educators, and implementation of recommendations made by the visiting committee. The self-evaluation of the total education program of PHS was completed by the staff during the first semester of the 1982-83 school year. The NCA Visiting Committee was on campus March 6, 7, 8, 1983. Dr. Sanford Pridy, principal of Lindberg High School in St. Louis, served as chairman of the visiting committee.



A school-wide banquet to honor the NCA team was held at Ray's Rustic Hall and featured the PHS Jazz Band and Concert Choir. Mr. Hughey acted as Master of Ceremonies with Dr. Chasteen and Mark Miget making welcome speeches. Faculty and board members had an opportunity to meet with the visitors during the meal.

an event which occurs each fall in Perryville involving the students of PHS, past and present. There is a parade of beautiful floats, an exciting football game and an evening of dancing for the finale.

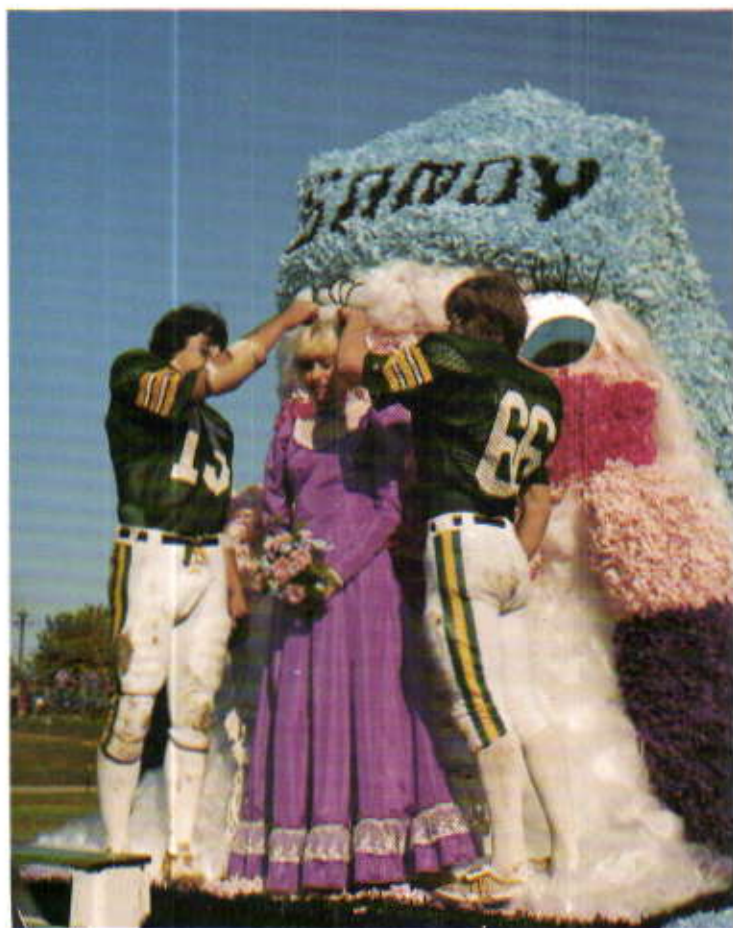
Classes vie for the top award in float construction, and students sell football game tickets to determine which class has the Homecoming Queen.



The week prior to the big event is frantic, busy and great fun ... who would trade it for anything?





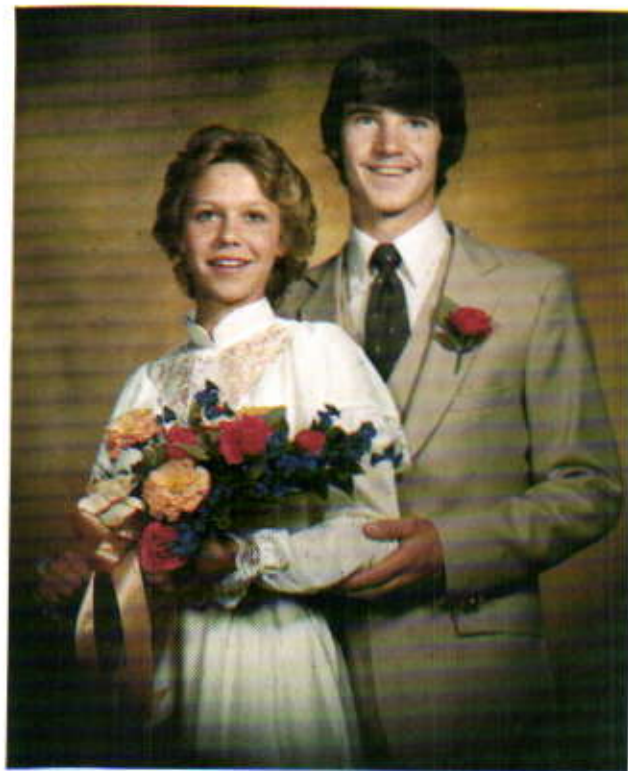

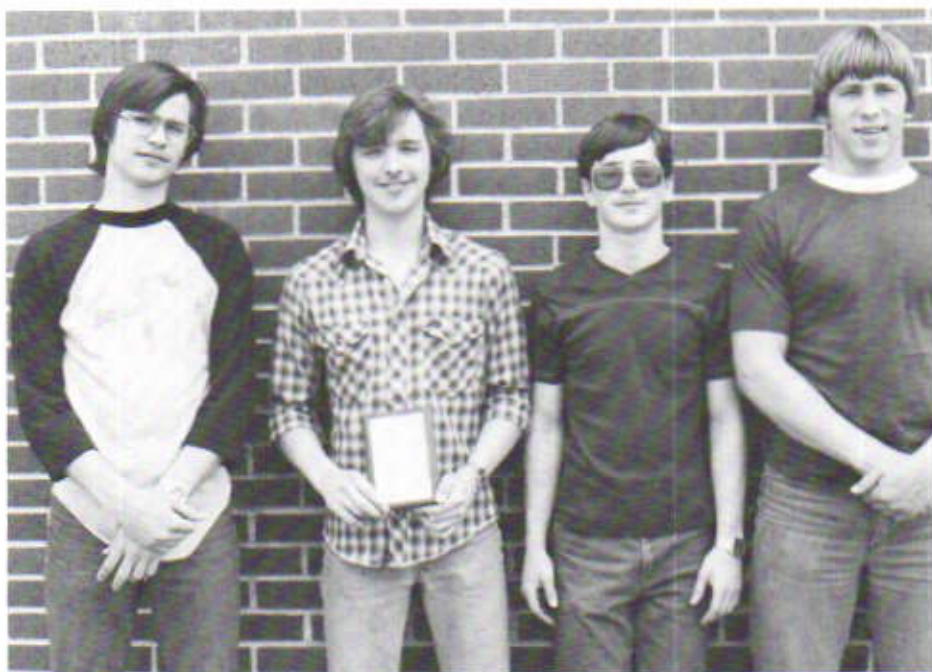

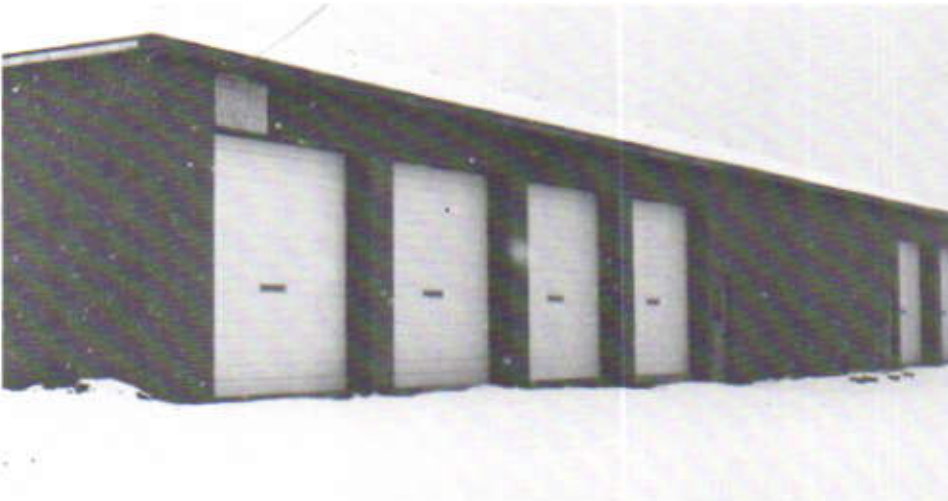




## Vocational Students At Work ...

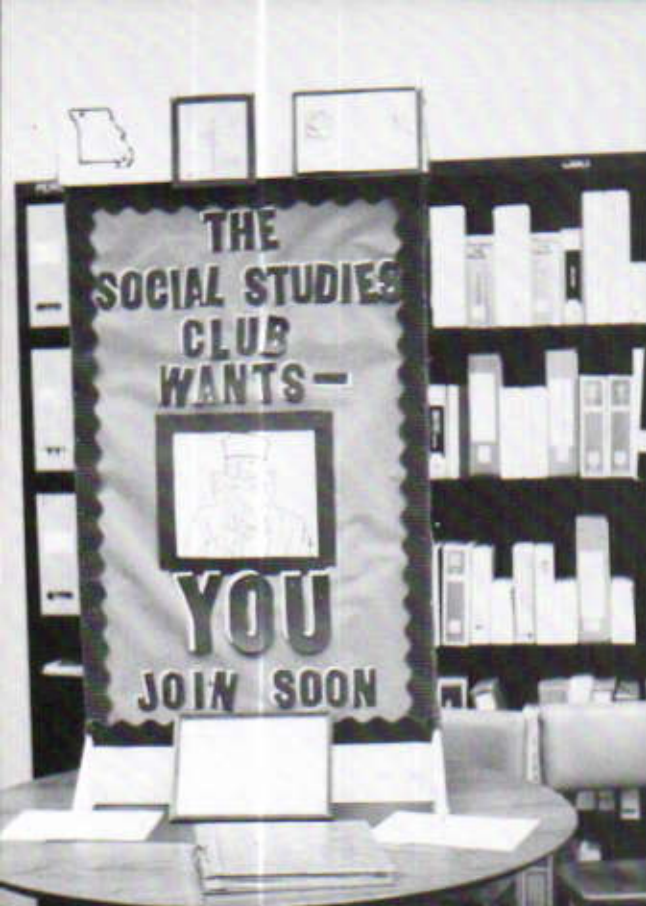

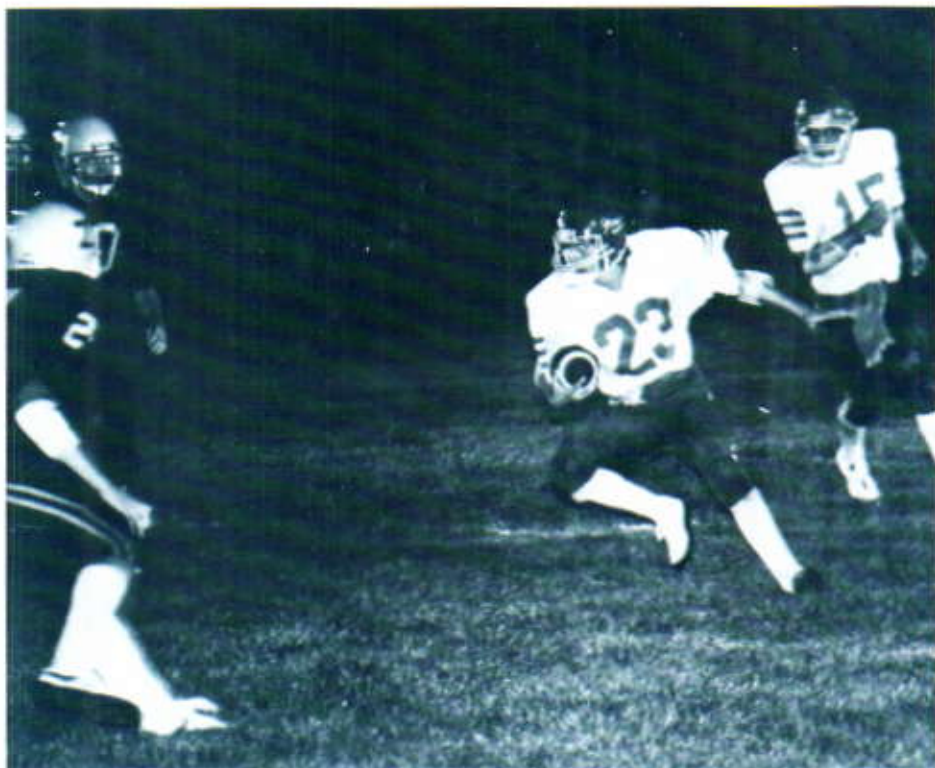

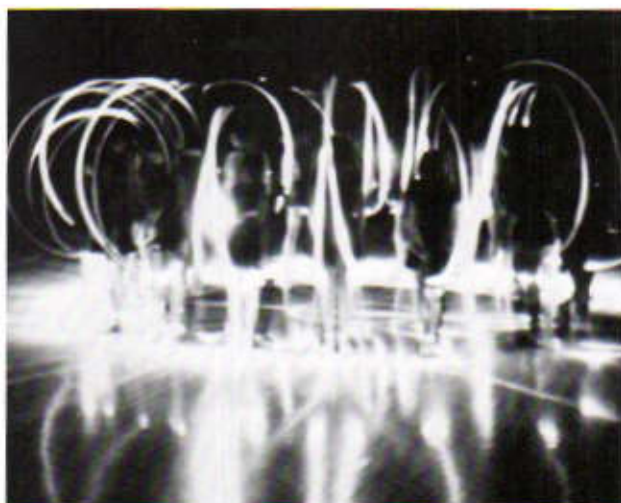

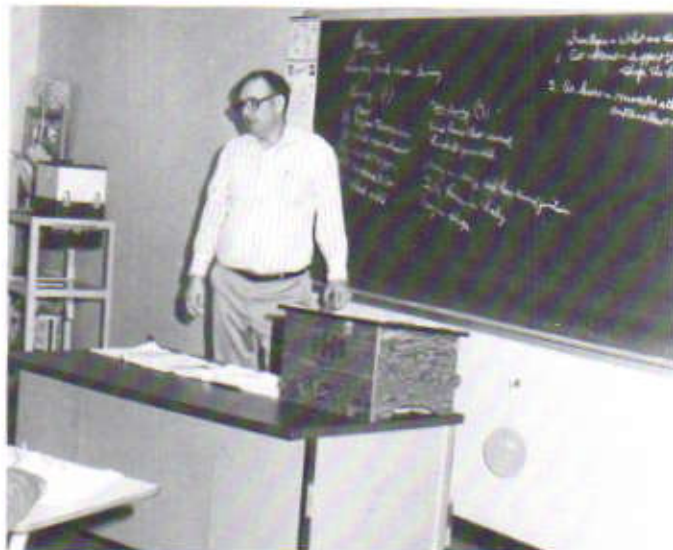
