Overview

The White River School District implemented several mitigation strategies as outlined in the 2020 Return to Learn Plan. The White River School District's mitigation strategies consisted of: practicing of social distancing to the greatest extent possible, post signage and provide lessons to strongly encourage frequent hand washing and hygiene practices, provide hand sanitizer throughout the campus, increased cleaning protocols throughout the campus, including frequency and foggers, limited group gatherings where possible, strongly encouraged the wearing of an appropriate face covering while on campus and at school activities, symptom screening for all staff and students and visitors were excluded.

The White River also offered distance learning as an option for the 2020-2021 school year.

As a further mitigation strategy for the 2021-2022 and beyond the District will use ARP/ESSER funding. Options include but are not limited to:

The White River School District uses Title I and Federal REAP funding to focus on student achievement and students from multiple backgrounds such as: the homeless, low socio-economic status, and children with disabilities. The White River School District has used previous ESSER funds and Coronavirus Relief Funds to purchase technology to address learning loss.

Overview

99% of students in the White River School District attended in-person instruction during the 2020-2021 school year. At times during the year, students missed due to being identified as a close contact or contracting the virus.

Our district outlined strategies for remote learning based on the phases correlated to the White River COVID plan. White River is a 1:1 laptop district K - 12th grade. The district utilized online platforms such as Google Classroom, Zoom, and the district website.

Missed Most In-Person

The White River School District communicated with families to monitor student attendance and documented reasons for absences. Very few students were in violation of the attendance policy. For those students that did miss numerous days teachers worked closely to provide online or paper copies of work to stay on track.

Did Not Participate in Remote Instruction

1% of our students participated in remote instruction. One certified teacher at the elementary and one certified teacher at the MS/HS checked in on these students weekly and monitored their process.

At Risk for Dropping Out

Any student that was behind schedule based upon semester grades met with administration and teachers. Students who were behind were invited to attend Tiger Support tutoring program paid for by REAP dollars.
