- A. ZeroEyes-Firearm Detection Software: Ryan Pendelton from ZeroEyes joined us via Zoom to go introduce the Board to the software program and answer questions. The program would provide an extra layer of safety for the district buildings and is integrated with the CrisisGo App that we already use. We would need to purchase new and updated cameras for the software to work as intended. Mr. Lindy will come back to the Board with a proposal for cameras. There are minimal instances of false positives in identifying weapons. ZeroEyes has a monitoring team that works 24/7/365 and will quickly alert our local law enforcement if a weapon is detected. They are willing to train at the school with Lee County officers over summer break to get them familiar with the program.
- B. Student Accident Insurance Renewal: The cost per student has not changed. The cost to the district will be \$3,956 for the upcoming school year. The district is required to carry Student and Athletic Accident Insurance.

AFC CUSD #275 Superintendent's Report March 17, 2025

- Budget Progress- As of the end of March, the Education Fund stands at 65% of expenditures and 87% of revenues. The Operations & Maintenance (O&M) Fund is at 65% of expenditures and 93% of projected revenue. The Transportation Fund is at 58% of expenditures, primarily due to the annual lease payment, and 84% of projected revenue. Total fund balances have reached \$12.3 million, with \$10.7 million invested across a mix of Certificates of Deposit (CDs), Treasuries, and Money Market Funds.
- Facilities- The Junior High/High School chair lift is now fully operational following its successful installation and inspection.
- Spring Legislative Session- There are currently hundreds of bills awaiting action in the
 legislature. While the volume of bills is not unusual, what stands out is that little progress has
 been made so far. Much of the legislative session has been consumed with hearings focused on
 the uncertainty at the federal level.
- U.S. Department of Education (DOE)- The current administration is actively pursuing the elimination of the DOE, taking its first significant step last week by dismissing one-third of the department's staff. The potential impact on funding streams for programs like IDEA, NSLP, and Title is still unclear. While it is suggested that these funds may be transferred to another department, the details remain uncertain. The situation is evolving rapidly, and the landscape could look very different in six months, but the current level of uncertainty is challenging.

Earlier this week, the USDA eliminated funding for the Local Food for Schools program, which provided fresh, locally-produced food to low-income students. This cut includes allocations for the current fiscal year, resulting in a \$27 million loss for Illinois. While program terminations are common, it's highly unusual for funding to be cut mid-year after the funds were already allocated. Hopefully, this is not indicative of future federal funding trends. In the past year, total federal revenue for AFC was \$661,000, which included one-time ESSER funds; typically, federal revenue is closer to \$400,000.

AFC Elementary School Improvement Goals

- AFC Elementary School will increase the total percentage of students who meet or exceed on the Math IAR
 by 3-4 percentage points on Spring 2024 IAR (Y1), 5-6 percentage points in SY 24-25 (Y2), 7-8 percentage
 points in 25-26 (Y3), and 9-10 percentage points in SY 26-27 (Y4), resulting in a 24-28 percentage point
 increase in meets or exceeds by 2027. This will prepare students to be college or career-ready.
- AFC Elementary School will increase the total percentage of students who meet or exceed on the ELA IAR
 by 3-4 percentage points in SY 24-25 (Y1), 5-6 percentage points in 25-26 (Y2), and 7-8 percentage points
 in SY 26-27 (Y3), and 9-10 percentage points increase in SY 27-28 (Y4), resulting in a 24-28 percentage
 point increase in meets or exceeds by 2028. This will prepare students to be college or career-ready.
- AFC Elementary School will decrease the number of major discipline referrals by 5% per school year, resulting in a 25% decrease in major discipline referrals that result in disciplinary action by 2027. This will prepare students socially and emotionally to meet academic expectations.
