A Panther's History

Imagine that it is 1938, 85 years ago. The average annual income in America was \$1,731, a gallon of milk cost 42 cents, a gallon of gas cost a dime, and a loaf of bread was 9 cents. The Great Depression was ending, and WWII was just beginning. Amidst the tumult in the world, St. Mary's School in Pittsburg was expanding and growing. Just two years prior, in 1936, Fr. McCullough inaugurated the high school starting with 26 freshmen. The third floor, the high school, was added to the elementary building. The expansion didn't stop with the brick and mortar, and a bus route was initiated. A young boy in Capaldo, Frank Montemurro ('42), was one of those riders. "It was cold waiting for the bus, and cold on the bus," Frank recalled. "I was born into a Catholic family and when they started sending the bus that made going to the Catholic school available." Riding the bus to and from school each day changed the course of many lives, as an education steeped in the Catholic faith taught by the Sisters of St. Joseph will do. After graduation in 1942, Frank joined the Navy where he became a Radar Man 2nd Class. He served in the South Pacific on the destroyer escort, USS Hilbert 742, with 200 other men. Frank was in the military for two years and eight months. After returning to Pittsburg, he attended Kansas State College (Pittsburg State University) on the GI Bill earning a Business degree. Frank met Shirley Hofer at a Polka dance at Ringo Corner. She was 15 and he was 22. After she graduated from high school, they married on June 3, 1950, at St. Alice Catholic Church in Capaldo. Before they married, Shirley joined the Catholic Church. Frank and

Shirley passed on Catholic education to the next generation as all three of their children graduated from Colgan High School: Marilyn (Nelson '69), Tommie ('71) and Danny ('76). Marilyn's children attended St. Mary's grade school until the family moved and they continued their Catholic education at Kapaun Mt. Carmel. Frank and Shirley were blessed with seven grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren. Frank worked for Pittsburg Ready Mix on North Broadway in Pittsburg for over 70 years, working his way up to owner and retiring at age 75. Shirley passed away in July of 2013, shortly after they had celebrated their 63rd wedding anniversary. Tommie passed away suddenly in December of 2013. Marilyn and her husband Mike live in Texas. Frank lives with Danny in the same house on Joplin street that he has lived in for over 70 years, where clocks line every wall; a reminder of a hobby he pursued in his retirement years. At 98 years old, Frank's memory is strong as he still recalls being a young boy playing on a baseball team in Capaldo, a student at St. Mary's High School where Sister Paula was a good teacher of Math and Accounting and that she was a gentle woman, a Sailor in the Navy and 20 years of ship reunions of which he is now the only one still living, and his wonderful 63 years married to Shirley. Frank shared his life stories with joy and a periodic twinkle in his eye when he started a story that was often followed by him or Marilyn saying, "but you probably shouldn't print that."

The SMC Family & Consumer Sciences classroom is undergoing a transformation! New courses offered this year include: Career & Life Planning, Lifespan Development, Foods & Nutrition, Culinary Arts, Personal Finance, and Family Studies.

The 1960 high school building featured a Home Economics classroom lab (see photo below), initially taught under the direction of Sister M. Sara. This room has since been transitioned during the 1990's and used as a Pitsco Synergistics Lab and Technology/Multimedia Classroom over the years. The traditional "Home Ec" classroom no longer existed.

Last year, Family & Consumer Sciences classes (formerly called Home Economics) were integrated back into the course schedule but students would walk to Guadalupe Hall on our campus for their foods labs. Thanks to recent grant funding and the generosity of the HOPE Auction Giving Board donors, a few minor renovations have been made and the students are now able to use their in-classroom kitchen within our high school once again!

This work is funded through grants from both the Pritchett Trust and CFSEK (Community Foundation of Southeast Kansas) Women's Health Fund, General Fund, and Future Fund Giving Circle as well as support from the HOPE Auction Giving Board donors.

Some of the new additions include: sewing and embroidery machines, electric ranges, refrigerator and dishwasher, tower garden for year-round indoor growing, infant simulator, and more! The kitchen also boasts an amazing 8' custom island,

made and donated by SMC Alumni VJ Van Becelaere ('03) of VJ's Custom Cabinets.

The majority of this work is being led by our SMC Maintenance Department: Eric Wilson, Stephen Herman ('65), and James Johnson.

...70 Years

MARGARET ANN (SHAW) FORSYTH

Margaret Ann (Shaw) Forsyth joined St. Mary's grade school in the second grade. By the 7th grade she was regularly playing the pipe organ for funerals, weddings, Requiem High Mass and Benediction. "I watched mass in the rearview mirror." She said, explaining that Our Lady of Lourdes had a pipe organ and when playing it, you sat with your back to the altar in the choir loft and watched the priest in the mirror. "I still recall playing for Fr. Stremel and giving him the first note to try and get him on pitch." Sometimes she would play for the 6:30am High Mass with her friends singing and they would walk to Crowell's for breakfast. "We thought we were so grown up." Margaret graduated from St. Mary's High School on a Sunday in May of 1953. "Then I thought, well, I guess, I need to get a job." She laughed. Two days later Margaret applied to KOAM radio, on the top floor of the Commerce building at 4th and Broadway and went to work the following day. Three girls worked there, doing the typing, bookkeeping, answering the phone and everything that needed to be done, except for being the DJ or engineer. After four years, Margaret had an offer at a new radio station in Kansas City, but her friends Carolyn and Jo Ann were moving to Wichita. To Margaret's surprise, her mom encouraged her to join her friends. After less than a year in Wichita working at an Insurance agency, she moved to Kansas City to work for KBKC then moved to KMBC as the traffic manager. A new radio station opening in Indianapolis beckoned her to move east. After about a year, the station began playing only religious programming on tapes, and there wasn't much for Margaret to do so it was time to move on...this time to Chicago. Her colleagues in the radio business encouraged her to talk to the Rep Firm, PGW in Chicago. The firm represented radio stations selling ads, including KMBC where Margaret had worked. She was able to put names and voices from phone conversations to faces. She was, once again, hired immediately. After a few weeks as a "floater" she attained a permanent position serving the stations west of the Mississippi. There were five desks covering the West stations. In 1967, the winds of change blew west, and Margaret was persuaded to drive to Los Angeles, this time to KTLA TV Station, Channel 5. She arrived on a Thursday, went to lunch on Friday with her colleague and was told to report to personnel on Monday to start work. "After my job at KOAM, I never had to apply again." Margaret said. "I always knew someone." Within

six weeks, Margaret had worked her way up to secretary for the General Manager. One of her many responsibilities was to send flowers or memorials to employees after a death. This small task changed Margaret's life. She was asked to organize the money collected for the Cancer Society for Gene Forsyth in memory of his wife. Margaret counted the wadded-up bills she was handed, and it totaled \$222. She added \$3 to make it an even amount and added her name to the donor list. "Gene asked someone, who is Margaret Ann Shaw and why did she donate?" Margaret laughed. He stopped by Margaret's office to thank her and a few weeks later asked her to dinner. They married in 1969. Margaret's role in life changed as she became a stepmom to Gene's three children, two teenagers and a ten-year-old. Together they raised the children and Gene continued to work for KTLA as a technical director until he retired in 1987. Their son, Michael was tragically killed in a motorcycle accident in 1975. His wife was pregnant with their grandson at the time of the accident. They also have two granddaughters, one from each of their daughters. Their oldest daughter Jessica died in 2014 and youngest daughter Trina lives in Virginia. They also have 5 great-grandchildren. Years earlier when Margaret had worked for KBKC, she was offered a free weekend at Hot Springs, Arkansas, at the Traveler's Boat convention, including access to the boats on Lake Hamilton. Gene owned several boats over the years and the family enjoyed trips to Catalina Island and Lake Havasu on the California-Arizona border. Margaret's experience at Hot Springs piqued Gene's curiosity and they would often make a trip to Hot Springs in conjunction with a trip to Pittsburg to visit Margaret's mom. In 1988, the winds of change moved Margaret one last time, as she and Gene moved to Hot Springs. They became very involved in the local community theater where they shared their radio and tv experience. Margaret once again worked her way up to doing just about everything. "I always said I would do anything except get on the stage." But that changed in August of 2023 when she was persuaded to play "Heart and Soul" on the piano during the performance of "Forever Plaid." After 49 years of marriage, Gene passed away in November of 2018. At age 88, Margaret hasn't slowed down much. She is an active member of St. John's Church, keeps in touch with several of her classmates and still takes care of her house and yard... and shares great memories.




