Jim and Ethel (Sullivan '41) Brown Family

Why did you choose to send your children to St. Mary's Colgan Catholic Schools?

When Ethel (Sullivan '41) Brown finished elementary school at Eugene Fields in Pittsburg, her dad, Patrick, insisted that she go to St. Mary's. From 1915 through 1935, St. Mary's school had ended after 8th grade, but Monsignor McCullough started adding a high school grade each year. As a result, Ethel was in the second graduating class of St. Mary's High School in 1941. Ethel married Jim Brown, who was the brother of a fellow 1941 classmate, Tom Brown. When Jim and Ethel lived in Abilene, their oldest child Kathleen, remembers being fascinated by the nuns in habits at the orphanage where their family took clothes to donate. Halfway through Kathleen's kindergarten year, the family moved to Pittsburg and had to choose where to send her to school, the neighborhood elementary or driving her to St. Mary's. Kathleen had lobbied to go where the Nuns were. She is not sure if that weighed in her parents' decision, but Kathleen and her five siblings all went K-12 to St. Mary's Colgan: Kathleen Brown-Cecora ('65)

Theresa Hubbard ('66), Liz Stine ('70), Elaine Hoque ('74), Jim ('76) and Leo ('83). The excellent religious foundation, education and rich tradition were what drew the next two generations to SMC. Kathleen raised her family in Pittsburg, so sending them to SMC was natural. Elaine and her family lived in western Kansas, returning to Pittsburg when their oldest, Becky, was in 7th grade. "My grandma used to sell religious gifts for the Church from her home," Becky wrote. "She told her friends and anyone who came to her house that we were moving back. The community at St. Mary's immediately made us feel at home." Six of Kathleen's grandchildren are now fourth generation SMC graduates, with the last two in school, a sophomore and a 5th grader.



He said that it wasn't the fact that we have crucifixes in all of our classrooms, a church across the parking lot, or the SMC cross on our school uniforms, it was all the Catholic traditions that we have made a part of our daily, weekly, and yearly school routine. We live and breathe the Catholic faith. The Catholic faith is who we are at our core. We are Catholic through and through.

We process with the Eucharist to the front of the high school, the front of the junior high, and the front of the elementary school and do a special prayer and blessing at each, and then we return back to the church where we reconsecrate our school and our students to the love, mercy, and spiritual protection of the Sacred Heart and the Immaculate Heart. It is simply powerful!

I have also loved offering a special Memorial Mass. Each November, within a few days of All Souls Day, our JH/HS Mass is offered for all of our deceased SMC alumni. The lights in the church are turned off to allow for a somber and solemn setting, following the homily, the names of each deceased alumni are read



The senior and eighth grade boys lead the Litany of Loreto, and then, the beautiful hymn of Our Lady of Perpetual Help is sung. It truly is a fitting and glorious way to honor the Blessed Virgin Mary!

Living the Stewardship Way of Life

It is safe to say most SMC students and parents don't know the name of SMC's Athletic Director. It isn't like he's not around, or at the games...they know him, but not his real name. He is affectionately called "Coach Gramps". "When I helped coach SMC basketball several years ago with Abby Farabi, my granddaughter Grace was on the team." He explained. She would call me 'Gramps' at practice, and I would tell her 'call me Coach'." After correcting her several times, Grace's friends gave him the name "Coach Gramps" and it stuck. At 78 years old, Coach Gramps, aka Mike Carson, is the oldest AD in the state of Kansas.

His Path to SMC...

Mike is from Parsons and is the oldest of four kids. He went to St. Pat's Catholic Elementary school where he was taught by Nuns every year. Growing up, Mike was deeply influenced by the Passionist Monastery in St. Paul. Each summer a new group of young men would spend a novitiate year at St. Paul. It was 366 days, a year and a day, at the Monastery. These young men had graduated from high school and were planning to go to seminary. "These were great guys and I wanted to be like them," Mike recalled. These feelings were cemented when Mike attended the St. Bosco Club at St. Paul on Saturdays during his junior high years. So, after eighth grade, Mike went to the Passionist Minor Seminary, Mother of Good Counsel High School in Warrenton, MO, just outside of St. Louis. The Church was bursting at the seams with vocations. There were 350 boys in his school with probably a dozen other seminary high schools in the region. Enough schools that they competed against

each other in football, basketball, baseball, and track. Mike graduated in 1964. Now it was his turn to be a Novice. His year and a day. "It was very austere, rigorous spiritual training," Mike said about being a Novice. "Total silence, 24 seven, except maybe a little in the evenings, and we didn't even look outside. We wore long wool cassocks and sandals that we made. We slept on straw mattresses." They knelt every day in front of the director of students and confessed their faults. You might then be assigned to say a decade of the rosary while kneeling on your hands. "It was like a Spiritual Bootcamp," he said.

This prepared Mike for the next step, which was college. He went to the Passionist Monastery in Louisville, Kentucky, across the street from Bellarmine Seminarians wore white shirts and University. black ties and walked over to classes at Bellarmine. Of the few majors that were allowed, Mike chose two and double majored in Medieval History and Philosophy. Although Bellarmine had sports teams, the seminarians were not allowed to participate. Mike asked permission from the Provincial but was turned down. He became acquainted with the basketball coach, who offered to ask again. This time, the answer was yes, but he had to be back at the monastery by 5:30pm prayers. Mike would leave practice early, shower, run across the street and into

the choir loft to make it just in time. He was then also allowed to play baseball. The next basketball season, the coach suggested he may be a better fit as a coach than a player. Although disappointed, he found that he really enjoyed being a student coach. He fared better in baseball and played all four years. The same man was Bellarmine's freshman basketball and head baseball coach, and a very good Catholic man. Mike began to see his vocation in him and recalled, "He was a daily communicant going to daily Mass. He had a great family, and kids that I got to know. I began to think maybe that's what I was called to be." Mike began to struggle with his decision to become a priest. After he graduated from Bellarmine, he went one year to Theology Seminary, before he decided that was not what God was calling him to do. "There was a lot of spiritual direction and prayer that led me to that decision," Mike said.

But now what? Mike was hired to teach at St. Pat's high school in Parsons, back where it all started, but unfortunately the high school closed the following year. He took a job at Parsons State Hospital doing recreation, while taking classes at Pitt State to get his teaching credentials. He was asked to lead a tour of the hospital, which included a young woman from Fredonia, Janell Smith, who was an Olympic athlete. "I said sign me up," he laughed. Oddly, Mike





had heard of Janell when he was in Kentucky. Some

evenings, the seminarians were allowed to watch TV. One such evening, the other sems told him there was a girl on TV from Fredonia, Kansas, running in the Mason-Dixon Games against a world champion from Poland. "They said, she's from Kansas, do you know her? I said, 'sure I do'," Mike laughed even though they had not yet met. But after dating for a year, Mike and Janell married in 1970. Mike had been hired by PSU basketball coach Bob Johnson as a Graduate Assistant coach in the first year of the Weede Gymnasium. Ironically, the young couple lived in a duplex across the street from St. Mary's Elementary and Colgan High Schools. Doctors had told them that Janell could not have kids, "But," Mike said, "the Holy Spirit works in its own way." And in that little duplex they welcomed their first son, Brian. With the encouragement of his parents and in-laws, Mike realized that it was time to get a real job. St. Paul High School had a mid-year opening and he was hired to teach and to coach just about everything. He even started the first girls volleyball team coaching it concurrently with football. His teaching and coaching career took the family to St. Joe in Shawnee and St Thomas Aquinas in Kansas City then to Ark City. Mike took over a struggling basketball program at the 5A school that was having success in most other sports. Halfway through his fourth season and without a win, he was told his coaching contract was not going to be renewed the following year. From that point on, the team was undefeated and made it to the State tournament, losing by one point to Kapaun. Although the school offered to renew his contract, Mike had already moved out of coaching and on to farming. He farmed with his uncle and eventually his brother




OLL/SMC Revenue 2022-2023



As a parish school, funding for programs and payroll for St. Mary's Colgan comes from weekly gifts to Our Lady of Lourdes, tuition from non-Catholic students, school fees, grants and the SMC Annual Appeal. The Memorial Fund supplements the school income as necessary.

OLL/SMC Expenses 2022-2023

Our Lady of Lourdes is a thriving parish with over 1,000 active families. The largest ministry of OLL is St. Mary's Colgan Catholic school which educates over 450 students annually and employs over 80 faculty and staff. Expenses for Our Lady of Lourdes Church, St Mary's Colgan schools and other ministries for the fiscal year 2022-2023 totaled \$4,996,927. Just as we ask each parishioner to be a good steward, we in turn pledge to be good stewards of the contributions we receive.

From the Halls of SMC

Therese Misasi Jones ('71) had her career aimed in the direction of English, Literature and the Arts. After completing a Master of Arts in English from Pittsburg State University, she and her family moved to Boulder, Colorado, where she began the PhD program in English at the University of Colorado. She wrote, "I had the good fortune to experience the most creative and meaningful career in academia than I ever imagined. St. Mary's Colgan prepared me for it with a strong educational foundation." Her studies spanned 1982-1990. "A time when a mysterious, terrifying, and lethal disease emerged: HIV/AIDS." Therese recalled. "The artistic response to this catastrophe was immediate and intense. Plays, films, poetry, novels, and the visual arts stepped in to educate the public about the disease and to address the stigma around those suffering and dying from it." Therese's interest was piqued as to the importance that the arts could and should play in the medical field. Therese had never heard of the field "medical humanities" and applied for a three-year postdoctoral fellowship in a medical school in Ohio. She wrote, "In the classroom, I could bring the human, often messy and mysterious experience of illness, patient-hood, suffering, and dying to medical students through literature, film, and the arts as a crucial balance to their scientific and clinical knowledge of disease."

Following the post-doc, she remained in health professions education for the remainder of her career. She was still teaching the Arts and Humanities, but her focus had changed to teaching it to future doctors. Therese developed humanities and arts curricula in several medical schools including the University of

Colorado, University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio, and University of Utah. "I eventually returned to the University of Colorado Anschutz Medical Campus in 2009 to design and implement the Arts and Humanities in Healthcare Program at the Center for Bioethics and Humanities where I taught courses to medical, pharmacy, and graduate students," she wrote. At Colorado she created degree programs, published the first major textbook in the field and co-founded an international professional organization, the Health Humanities Consortium (HHC). The skills imparted to medical students as a result of Therese's work are vital. Among other things, it helps instill listening and observational skills and increase empathy and compassion in the future doctors and pharmacists...skills always appreciated as a patient. Therese's work was recognized with several awards including the Thomas Jefferson Award from CU, the Bonfils-Stanton award in science and the arts known as "Colorado's Nobel Prize," the Visionary Award from the HHC, and the President's Excellence in Teaching Award in 2022.

Therese expressed her sincere appreciation to St. Mary's Colgan for her foundation. "My deepest gratitude to Sister Mary Patrick who drilled me in Latin (I actually used it!) and to Sister Lynda who gave me classic paperbacks to read from her secret stash. Finally, to my classmates (many of us met in kindergarten) in the great class of 1971. I retired in 2022 to paint and live in the mountains with my husband of nearly fifty years, Chris Jones, and hang out with our daughter, Sara Elizabeth Cooper, who lives near Denver."

on the Neosho River near Parsons. By now, Janell and Mike had added sons Scott and Tim to the family. They ran a large, successful cattle and crop operation until the flood of 1986 ended their farming. Mike turned back to coaching and teaching and the family spent the next five successful years at Springfield Catholic. After Janell's dad passed away, she wanted to move back closer to family, so they returned to Southeast Kansas. But with no teaching and coaching jobs to be found, Mike opened a Life Insurance Company in Parsons. Although his business venture was very successful, "I hated it," Mike said, and returned to teaching. In 1996, he was hired by Southeast High School. It was then that Fr. Tom Stroot reached out to Mike looking for a coach for SMC. Unfortunately, he had already committed to Southeast. Mike attained his master's in educational leadership and was hired as principal at Galesburg and worked his way up to Superintendent at Erie USD 101. He retired in 2007, working for a time after retirement as a consultant for Crossland Construction. Fr. Tom Stroot and Chuck Smith reached out again looking for some coaching help, but it didn't work out. Twelve years later, Dennis Burke, who was President of Schools at SMC, once again approached Mike about helping with the girls basketball team. This time there was the added benefit that his three youngest grandkids, the children of Tim and Autumn, were going to SMC. Third time's a charm and he agreed. Mike drove daily from Parsons for practices and games. Mike and Janell liked Pittsburg and bought some land to build a house the following year. But tragedy struck and Janell was diagnosed with cancer. Just 10 days shy of their 50th wedding anniversary, she passed away. "Everybody from the school was so supportive." Mike

said. "Abby (Farabi) was one of the leaders. It was during COVID, and people brought food too." Mike is very happy that before Janell died, they were able to donate a crucifix that now hangs in the SMC Fieldhouse. Mike decided to still make Pittsburg home, sold the land and bought a house. Coach Gramps, as most of the kids now knew him, became more involved in the school becoming Fr. Labenz's substitute teacher on Mondays and helping coach junior high boys basketball. "And the next thing you know," Mike said, "you are just a part of it." Coach Gramps is such a good influence on SMC. "Since I go to 6:30 am Mass, I thought it would be cool to instill in the kids to go to a weekday Mass, that they don't have to go to." Mike said. And so, the 630 Club began. The simple reward of donuts, or breakfast or a t-shirt has brought 20-30 kids to daily Mass each week. Last May, SMC was looking for a new AD as the current one, Cody Spencer, was moving. That's when Cody asked Mike if he would take the job. That is not what Mike expected. "I'm pushing 80 and dragging 70," he laughed. Mike has remarried and his wife, Debbie, was very encouraging of the AD job. He had been looking into a possible job at Joplin Catholic School, but SMC seemed to be the right fit for him. Mike said, "This is a way to give back and help out. I love being around the kids and the coaches are great to work with and the administration is terrific, and the priests are wonderful. Debbie said that maybe this is where God wanted me to be."

What's in a Name?

Identity? Unity? The truth is both. The unfolding of our name...

St. Mary's High School,

For 20 years, from 1915 through 1935, 8th grade was the end of a Catholic education at St. Mary's School. In 1936, under the direction of Monsignor McCullough, the first freshman class was formed. They graduated in 1940 as the first graduating class of St. Mary's High School.

In late spring of 1966, there were discussions of establishing a regional Catholic high school in Southeast Kansas, with the possibility of building a new school or converting St. Mary's with its six-year old school building, to a regional school. A local committee was selected to do an extensive study. Fr. Thomas Colgan served as Executive Secretary of the committee, with Our Lady of Lourdes parishioner Joe Keller as the Chairman. The remaining members of the committee were parishioners Kenneth Burbach, James Buche, Robert Caldwell, Charles Dellasega, and Paul Wachter. They were charged with conducting an extensive feasibility study into creating the Regional High School, and presenting it to Bishop Byrne within six weeks, on or about July 29, 1966. In a letter from Fr. Colgan to Bishop Byrne, he states "The public high schools in the regional high school area are starting to consolidate this year. Some of these schools have already closed

and the students have been transferred to other schools. The Committee feels we have an excellent opportunity, since the students of these schools are making a move, to attract some of these students to the Regional High School. We have very little time to do this before the school term starts in September." After a great deal of research and study, the decision was made to convert St. Mary's High School into a regional school. On July 24, 1966, Fr. Thomas Colgan was tragically killed in a car accident in Chicopee, just south of Pittsburg. A letter from Joe Keller to Bishop Byrne dated July 25, 1966, says, "For your information, Father Colgan and myself finalized the cost portion of this report Sunday afternoon about two hours before his death. If we build a Regional High School, we recommend this school be named in honor of Father Colgan." On August 4, 1966, Bishop Byrne officially designated St. Mary's High School to become a Regional High School for a period of three years. It was determined that the facilities and staff at St. Mary's were adequate for the regional school. Pastors in the Pittsburg deanery were encouraged to invite parents to send their children to St. Mary's Regional High School. The following letter was to be read at all parishes and or missions on Sunday, August 7, 1966.

Dearly Beloved in Christ:

I am pleased to tell you that beginning in September, 1966, St. Mary's High School in Pittsburg will officially become a regional high school for the Deanery both in support and attendance. A school board will be appointed from among the most capable people in the region.

As Bishop of this diocese it is my duty to remind you of the moral obligation on the part of parents and pastors to make every effort to guarantee the religious education of children under your care. This regional high school is the best possible facility we can offer to fulfill this purpose. The obligation has always been in force; moreover, it has been emphasized by the recent Vatican Council.

Even at this late date with the new school term approaching so rapidly, I ask you to make every effort to send your children to St. Mary's Regional High School. I have found the laymen of this area most helpful and most capable in promoting this program. They are working diligently and effectively to make the regional school one of the highest quality.

Asking your cooperation and begging God's blessings for this project, I remain

A Name, cont.


In a January 1967 letter from Bishop Byrne to Father Linnebur, regarding the renaming of the St. Mary's Regional High School, he offered these options:

- 1. Colgan High. It would be a fitting memorial for a great priest universally loved in the Pittsburg area.
- 2. Roncalli High. Probably the members of your Board never heard of Pope John XXIII (i.e. the family name of Pope John)
- 3. Hennessey High. The first bishop of this diocese who labored long and lovingly for the foundations of education.

Vickie (Herbeck) Waltrip was a senior in 1967, and said the girls were trying to figure out how to adapt their cheers and chants with these new, seemingly awkward names. Tom Compton, a freshman at the time, said the students were allowed to vote on the new name and were encouraged to choose a name other than Colgan. "But it was just too close to his death." Tom wrote. "Emotions were still running high. The students voted overwhelmingly for Colgan High School." It officially became Colgan Regional High School on March 1, 1967. Around 1971, with Fr. Steinberger as pastor, Colgan High School was returned to being a parish school and Regional was removed from the name.

The new name was embraced by high school students and the "Power C" became the shorthand symbol representing Colgan, proudly displayed on football helmets and jerseys. Cheers were adapted and "We are (clap, clap) Colgan," would ring out from the pep club. As the years moved further away from Fr. Colgan's death and without any connotation of a Catholic identity in the name, many people outside of our community did not know we were Catholic. Fr. Ivan Eck arrived as pastor in 1981. He wrote, "Around the year 1984 we hired a charter bus from Erie to transport our football team for a game a long distance to the North. I asked the bus driver, who was from Erie, only about 30 miles from Pittsburg, what he thought Colgan school was. He replied, 'Is it not a private school for rich kids?' I knew immediately that something needed to be done." Fr. Eck talked to teacher and football coach Chuck Smith and Principal Pat Forbes and they agreed that St. Mary's needed to be back in the school name. As loudly as the name was changed to Colgan in 1967, was as softly as St. Mary's was included back in the name... so much so that it's hard to find a definitive date that it happened. For a short period of time, the school was called Colgan St. Mary's. Stephanie (Waltrip) Forbes '91, recalled that during her senior year the students heard that they were going to change the school name. "All I could think about was how weird it was going to be to cheer for 'SMC/St. Mary's Colgan' after growing up doing cheers for Colgan and CHS." Ironically, that was her mom Vickie Waltrip's concerns when she was a senior in 1967. "I remember writing a long letter which I presented to Mr. Forbes (her future father-in-law), and he did at least entertain my thoughts, and then gave me a sly smile and I figured it probably wasn't going to make a difference. But at least he knew how I felt about it." By 1995, it was switched to be St. Mary's Colgan as it remains today. Plan Regional High School

Pittsburg - St. Mary's high school, for 30 years a parochial institution, will mark its 30th anniversary year by expanding into a re-gional high school.

Bishop Byrne officially designated St. Mary's a regional high school for the parishes of the Pittsburg deanery as of Sept. 1, 1966.

In his letter Aug. 5, he noted that it "will officially become a regional high school for the deanery both in sup-port and attendance."

The late Msgr. Patrick J.

McCullough, pastor of Our
Lady of Lourdes parish from
1928-48, began the high
school in 1936 when 26 freshmen enrolled.

Staffed by the Sisters of St. Joseph and serving as a par-ish school, Msgr. McCullough ish school, Msgr. McCullough actually opened its doors to all in southeast Kansas who wishes to study there. The practice became a tradition which has continued to the

In 1940, shortly before the June commencement exercises

when 23 seniors man class of 1936 – were graduated, the State of Kansas granted accreditation.

Ground for the present fa-cility, which was constructed under the direction of Msgr. Alex G. Stremel, was broken in 1959. Bishop Mark K. Carroll blessed the building

Oct. 2, 1960. Tragedy struck the school Tragedy struck the school and parish July 24 of this year when Father Thomas H. Colgan, the high school's administrator since 1964, was fatally injured in an automobile accident in Chicopee, four miles southwest of Pittsburg. An alumnus of the Catholic University of America where he received his master of arts degree in educational administration, Father Colgan had laid the groundwork for the expansion of St. Mary's from

expansion of St. Mary's from the parish to regional level. The 36-year-old priest was to

have served as administrator of the new school.

Bishop Byrne explained that "a school board will be appointed from among the most capable people in the region."

"Their responsibility," Bishop Byrne added, "is mine also. The regional high school in Pittsburg is the best pos-sible facility we can offer to fulfill this purpose."
