All of this is supported by our ELA curriculum adoption in the 2022-23 school year.

Yes	All 6th-7th-8th graders are required to take a year of Social Studies; at the HS level students are required to obtain 3 Social Science credits to fulfill their graduation requirements.

Yes	All 6th-7th-8th graders are required to take a year of Social Studies: at the HS level students are required to take American Government to fulfill their graduation requirements.
	Yes	At RCJSHS we have 1 1/2 full-time counselors that are available to mee with individual students or groups. We provide several lyceums each year that offer insight into the students well-being. All 6th-7th-8th graders are required to take a year of PE; at the HS level all students are required to obtain 1 credit in physical education/health. All HS students can take several other physical education classes, but are not required. Every student has a 25 minute seminar period every day that focuses on individual well-being.

The majority of our 6th-7th-8th graders participate in band. The 6th graders are introduced to Art and all 7th-8th graders receive nine weeks of Art each year. At the HS all students are required to receive 1 credit in the Arts, many students take 4 years of band, are involved in choir, and take numerous art classes.

Yes	We provide field trips to tech colleges for our 8th-9th-10th graders; we offer a number of various pathways for our HS students and we encourage college visits and job shadowing for our 10th-11th-12th graders. We also offer work based learning for our 11th and 12th graders. Lastly, we offer a very relevant FFA program that has been awarded the gold standard the last few years. Our Seminar periods have offered our students 7th-12th grade a chance to create an IPS to help guide them through many of these opportunities listed above. All 6th graders receive a semester of STEM.

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
