Disclaimer

Schools are legally required to contain a dress code. School staff and administration have tried their best to create one that is age appropriate and gender-equal while addressing current fashion trends.


Shirt Length

Shirts should be at least long enough to reach the top seam of your pants when worn in a neutral stance/position. Using sweatshirts cover garments that do not meet dress code guidelines are NOT a solution.




Necklines on shirts

The neckline of shirts must be no lower than the crease of your armpit.







Tanks tops and straps on tops

Tank tops are allowed - including those with spaghetti straps - but must have two straps (strapless tops are not allowed) and may not have excessively large or modified arm holes.



Sagging and Ripped Pants

Jeans or pants should fit to the waist or hip area and not be excessively ripped, and the rips shouldn't be higher than the start of a pants inseam.









Short/skirt length

Shorts/skirts should be sufficient in length to cover a student's backside at all times, never exposing a student's undergarments







Material should be low enough to cover the inside pockets.



Hats, hoods and other headwear

Per Education Code all hats are allowed to be worn outside provided they are free from writing and/or images that violate the dress code. Baseball caps, visors, headbands, or hoods are not allowed in classrooms.
