

#### **ATLAS INTERIM 1**

#### September 9-12, 2025

As we enter the month of September, ATLAS Interim I is right around the corner. **ATLAS (Arkansas Teaching & Learning Assessment System)** is an assessment program for Grades 3-10 that utilizes adaptive tests to assess students' understanding and mastery of grade-level standards in English language arts, mathematics, and science.

Blytheville School District began using the ATLAS testing system in the 2023-2024 school year, and this year, Blytheville High School will conduct two interim assessments, in September and January, and one summative assessment in April/May. ATLAS Interim I begins on Tuesday, September 9, with the 9<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup> grade ELA Reading assessment, and will continue through Friday, September 12, assessing students in ELA Writing, Algebra 1, Geometry, and Biology. All students who are enrolled in any of these courses will be assessed regardless of their grade level.

The District Test Coordinator (DTC) is Amanda Haynes, and our BHS Building Test Coordinators (BTC) are Candice Groves and Kim McGehee. In preparation for testing, students are advised to get a good night's rest, eat a good breakfast, and not to stress, but to simply do their best! It is also important for students to arrive at school in plenty of time to get to their assigned testing room before testing begins.


#### STUDENT COUNCIL

#### WHAT IS GAME TIME?

#### **Intervention Through Technology**

G.A.M.E. is an acronym for "Goals Are My Everything." Every student at Blytheville High School has a 30-minute dedicated intervention time between fourth period and lunch where they work in online educational programs including Lexia and IXL.

Lexia is a program that focuses on Word Study, Grammar, and Comprehension to help students build their literacy skills through personalized lessons and assessments. As students progress, they can earn completion certificates for their mastery.

IXL relies on diagnostic testing to create a personalized learning experience for students in math, language arts, science, and social studies. IXL pinpoints the skills that are lacking, and then differentiates lessons and activities that will be most beneficial to the student. Teachers can also use the data they gather in IXL or in the classroom to help them assign extra help or enrichment activities in the platform.

"We need [GAME] interventions to provide extra support for students who are struggling, close learning gaps, and ensure all students can meet gradelevel standards."
