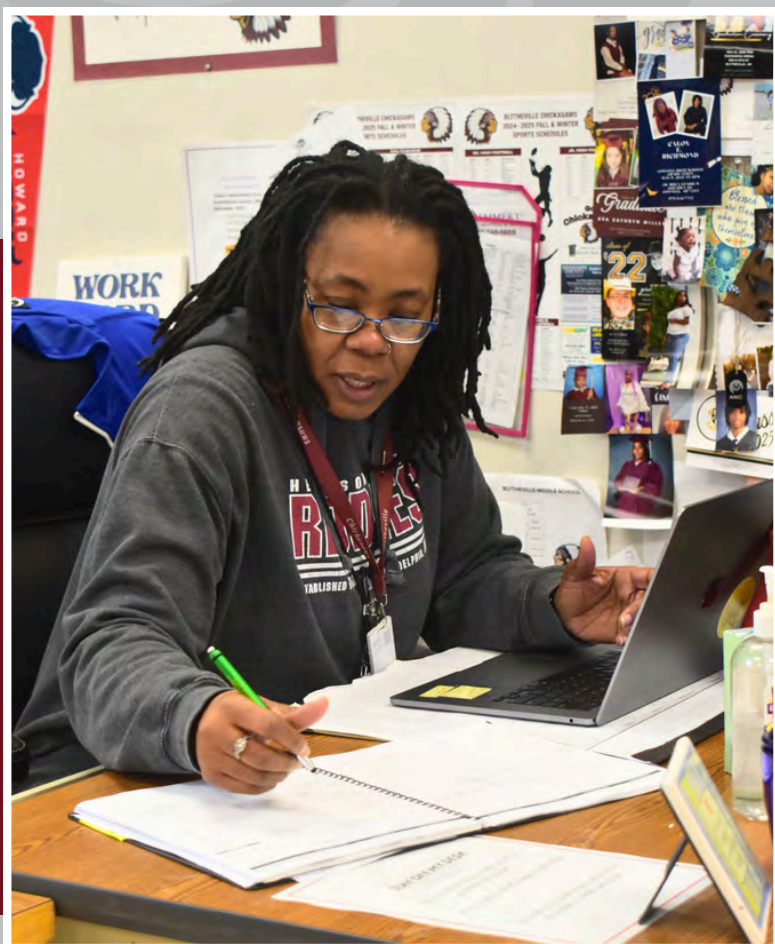


CAREER COUNSELOR SPOTLIGHT

"Stay focused in class, encourage one another, and don't be afraid to ask for help."

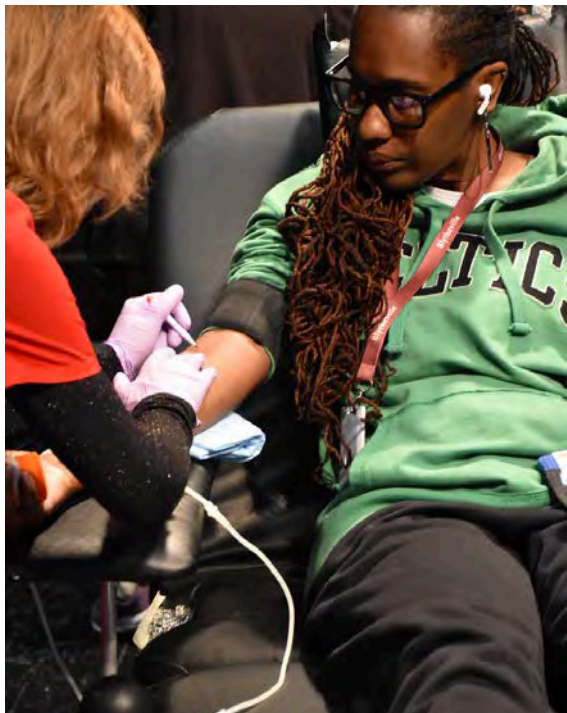
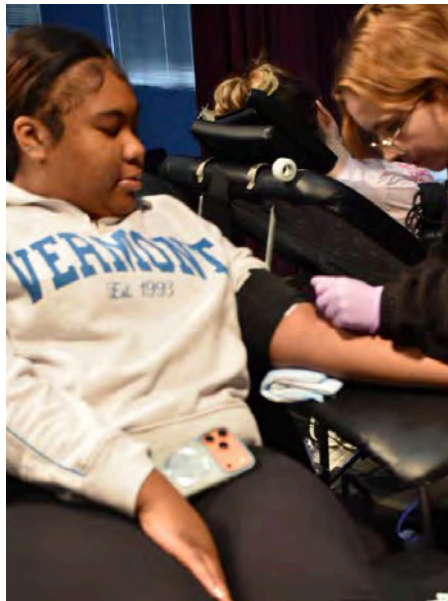

THE PERFECT GIFT!

Students and staff at Blytheville High School participated in the bi-annual Red Cross Blood Drive, sponsored by FBLA, on December 4, 2025. Of the 36 participants who signed up, 13 were first-time donors. FBLA's goal was to collect 15 units, but they exceeded their goal by 40% with 21 units donated, including four Type-O donations. According to [RedCrossBlood.org](https://www.redcrossblood.org):

Every two seconds, someone in the U.S. needs blood. Blood is essential to help patients survive surgeries, cancer treatment, chronic illnesses, and traumatic injuries. Only about 3% of age-eligible people donate blood yearly.

FBLA sponsor, Candice Richardson, said that donors received a pair of PacMan socks as a thank you. Students are also eligible to receive a graduation cord if they give (or try to give) in addition to earning community service hours. Seniors who donate will also be put into a drawing for a scholarship at the end of the year. To be eligible to give blood, people must be 17 or older and weigh at least 110 pounds. Students who are 16 years old may also donate with parent or guardian consent.

KE'NIAYAH DAVIS

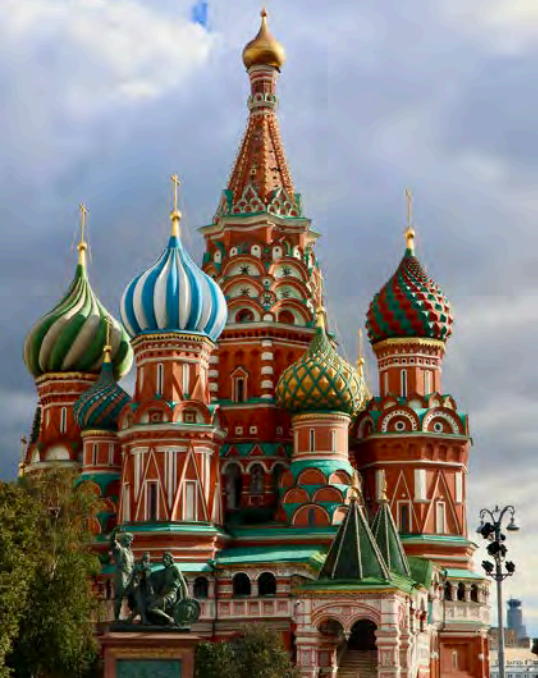

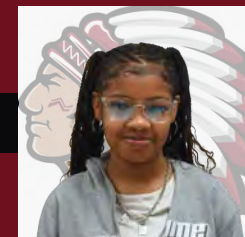
