Superintendent's Message



Dear USD 251 North Lyon County School Community,

The 2023-2024 school year is off to a great start. It's great to see all of the students back in the classrooms learning again. Thank you for choosing North Lyon County Schools!

USD 251 Budget Basics 2023-2024

Budget Estimates: The school budget is built on ESTIMATES in July based on the previous school year student count, the current school year student weighting estimates, assessed valuations, projected revenues, and projected expenses.

Student Full Time Equivalence (FTE): This is the number of students enrolled in our school district on a full time basis on September 20th of the previous school year. The student FTE is used in calculating our general fund budget amount.

The budget formula uses the highest student FTE from either of the previous two years. The budget formula also includes additional estimates for "weighted enrollments", for low enrollment, Career Technical Education, At Risk (free lunch), Transportation, and Special Education. Our final operating budget amount will not be determined until the Kansas State Department of Education (KSDE) audit and final legal max calculations in June 2024.

Estimated Assessed Valuation: The County Appraiser determines an appraised value for all property in the North Lyon County School District. Our district's assessed valuation for the General Fund Budget is \$98,694,424; the assessed valuation for LOB and Capital Outlay is \$104,741,603.

General Fund: This is the main large operating budget that can also transfer money to other funds. Our estimated maximum General Fund Budget is \$3,753,939. This amount is determined by the BASE State Aid amount of \$5,088 and the student weighting factors determined by the Kansas Legislature. Our FTE is 333, including 9 preschool FTE, multiplied by the BASE student aid amount of \$5,088 = \$1,694,304. The following weighting factor estimates are then calculated:

\rightarrow Low Enrollment (enrollment below 1,622)	\$801,363
\rightarrow Career Technical Education	\$46,640
\rightarrow At Risk (students qualifying for free lunch)	\$280,735
\rightarrow High Density At Risk (over 35% free lunch)	\$1,061
\rightarrow Transportation (students 2.5 miles or more)	\$257,635
→Special Education	\$649,800
Total Estimated Revenue from weightings	\$2,037,235

By adding the BASE Aid, \$1,694,304 + the weightings revenue, \$2,037,235 + Virtual State Aid, \$22,400 = \$3,753,939 - Estimated General Fund Legal Max Budget. General Fund expenses are for: Instruction, Student Instructional Support, Administration, Operations & Maintenance, Student Activities, and transfers to other funds. The General Fund revenue is generated by the 20.0 mills required by Kansas Statute.

Supplemental General Fund (Local Option Budget – LOB): This is a supplemental or additional budget to the General Fund. The maximum LOB authority for our school district is 33% of the LOB Base General Fund of \$3,774,001. By multiplying \$3,774,001 by .33% = \$1,245,420 - Estimated LOB Legal Max Budget. LOB expenses are for a portion of the instructional salaries, insurance, utilities, fuel, transportation expenses, transfers to Driver Training, and At Risk.

Capital Outlay Fund: This fund allows school districts to levy taxes for equipment, property, or facility needs. Currently, our school district pays our maintenance salaries out of this fund. The capital outlay mill levy of 8.0 mills will generate an estimated \$837,933 for 2023-2024.

Mill Levy: The Assessed Valuation and the required local tax dollars combine to calculate mill rates for the county to process school taxes. Our total mill rate estimated for taxes is 39.132 (General Fund – 20 mills, LOB Fund – 11.132 mills, Capital Outlay Fund – 8 mills), which is 0.667, or 2/3 mill above the previous year's tax rate and 0.33, or 1/3 mill above the Revenue Neutral Rate (RNR). The RNR means budgeting the exact same amount of property tax revenue in dollars for the current school year as for the previous school year using the current year's to-tal assessed valuation.

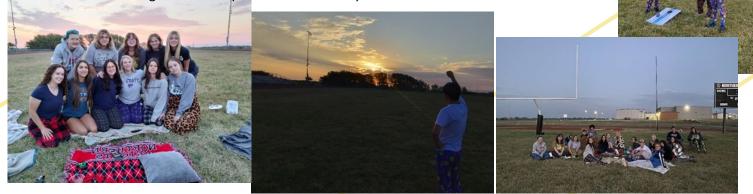
