
Angie Gray, principal What Teaching Actually Is:

Understanding the reality of teaching is crucial for parents and guardians. Moreover, debunking misconceptions surrounding teaching helps society value and support educators appropriately.




How Parents Can Support Teachers:

Many years ago I connected online with Mme DesCroix, which lead to classroom pen pals. For several years now, Superior students have been writing to students in Ballan-Miré, France. Mme DesCroix's students are 9th graders learning English. They write to us in English and we respond in French. It's a great opportunity to have some real world exposure to French and also see that they make mistakes just like we do. It's a favorite of students and they are right now waiting (not so patiently) for their letters to arrive. Each student is matched randomly to at least one penpal. We do try to match genders if possible and we both know our students fairly well so we can attempt to match skill level, too. DesCroix has larger class sizes than I do, so I typically have to double up my students or in some cases match them with three pen pals. But the goal is that they write to the same person for the school year. We try to send letters about every month or so. I have more flexibility in my curriculum to make that happen than she does. We exchange cultural stuff about our community and our schools like the school schedule and menus. She has even made part of her classroom decor a montage of Superior and Montana.




