What is the NCAA Eligibility Center?

- Formerly known as the NCAA Clearinghouse
- Determines academic and amateurism eligibility
- Required for Division I & II college sports



Why It Matters

- Required for scholarships and participation
- Helps with recruiting and compliance

- Avoids eligibility issues later



When to Register

- Ideally at the end of sophomore year
- No later than beginning of senior year

Must be done before official college visits or

offers



How to Register

- Visit: eligibilitycenter.org
- Create a Certification Account (DI/DII) or Profile Page (DIII or unsure)
- Pay the fee (fee waivers available)



Academic Requirements (Division I)

- 16 core courses required (4 cores x 4 years=16)
- Minimum GPA in core courses: 2.3
- Sliding scale: GPA vs. SAT/ACT scores



Academic Requirements (Division II)

- 16 core courses required (4 cores x 4 years=16)
- Minimum GPA: 2.2
- SAT/ACT requirements based on GPA



Amateurism Requirements

- No professional contracts
- No pay to play
- Must maintain amateur status



Role of the High School Counselor

- Submits transcripts and proof of graduation
- Can help track core course progress
- Assists with fee waivers



Common Mistakes to Avoid

- Missing core courses
- Not submitting test scores directly from
 - testing agency
- Delaying registration
