MULTI-TIERED SYSTEMS OF SUPPORT - (MTSS)

Multi-Tiered System of Supports (MTSS) is a comprehensive framework used to provide targeted support to all students. MTSS is designed to address academic, behavioral, social, and emotional needs through a tiered approach:

- **Tier 1**:** **Universal Interventions** - These are high-quality instructional and behavioral strategies provided to all students to promote successful student outcomes. This includes general classroom teaching and school-wide positive behavior supports.
- **Tier 2**:** **Targeted Interventions** - These supports are provided to small groups of students who need additional assistance beyond what is offered in Tier 1. Interventions may include supplemental instruction or targeted behavioral strategies.
- ****Tier 3**:** **Intensive Interventions** - This level of support is individualized and provided to students who require more intensive assistance. These interventions are tailored to the specific needs of each student and often involve one-on-one instruction or specialized programs. MTSS relies on data-driven decision-making to identify students' needs and monitor their progress. The goal of MTSS is to ensure that every student receives the appropriate level of support to succeed academically, socially, and emotionally.

PROMOTION AND RETENTION POLICY

The following local promotion criteria will be used for the 2025 - 2026 school year. Students in each grade must pass the following requirements in addition to any state requirements: While there are five subject areas - Reading, English Language Arts, Math, Science, and Social Studies - only three of these subjects will be considered as Core Subject Areas. Those three Core Subject Areas will be Reading, English Language Arts, and Math. There is a Promotion & Retention (P&R) Committee led by the Principal and/or designee to make decisions about the retention and placement status of named students.

Grades 6-8

- To be promoted to the next grade level, students in grades 6th—8th must pass at least three of the four Core Subject Areas (ELA, Math, Science and Social Studies) with a cumulative grade of 70% or better. This would result in the student passing at least three of the four subject areas for the year. In addition, students must meet all attendance requirements as specified by the Chattahoochee County School District.
- If a student is **retained** in the current grade level, he/she will have failed at least two of the three Core Subject Areas. This decision will be reviewed and agreed upon by the P&R Committee.
- If a student is **placed** into the next grade level, he/she will have failed more than two subject areas (includes all five subject areas), but there are factors that would exclude the student from being retained. This decision will be reviewed and agreed upon by the P&R Committee.

ACADEMICS

PROMOTION AND RETENTION POLICY - continued

The State of Georgia sets clear expectations for student performance to ensure all learners are prepared for success in high school and beyond. Promotion and retention decisions in the middle grades (6–8) are guided by a combination of state law, Georgia Department of Education rules, and local district policies.

Georgia law, under **Official Code of Georgia Annotated (O.C.G.A.) § 20-2-282 through § 20-2-285**, outlines the state's promotion, placement, and retention requirements. These laws are further detailed in **State Board Rule 160-4-2-.11**, which requires school districts to adopt policies that identify performance levels for promotion and provide opportunities for students who do not meet grade-level expectations.

In grades 6 and 7, promotion is typically based on a student's academic achievement in core content areas. While the state does not mandate automatic retention in these grades, most local districts require students to pass a majority of their core academic subjects—typically English Language Arts, mathematics, science, and social studies—with a grade of 70 or higher (outlined above). Failure to meet these requirements may result in retention or the development of an intervention plan.

In **8th grade**, the requirements are more specific. According to Georgia state law, students must demonstrate grade-level proficiency on the **Georgia Milestones End-of-Grade (EOG) assessments** in both **English Language Arts and mathematics** to be promoted to high school. If a student does not meet the required performance level on either of these assessments, they may be given additional instruction and the opportunity to retake the test.

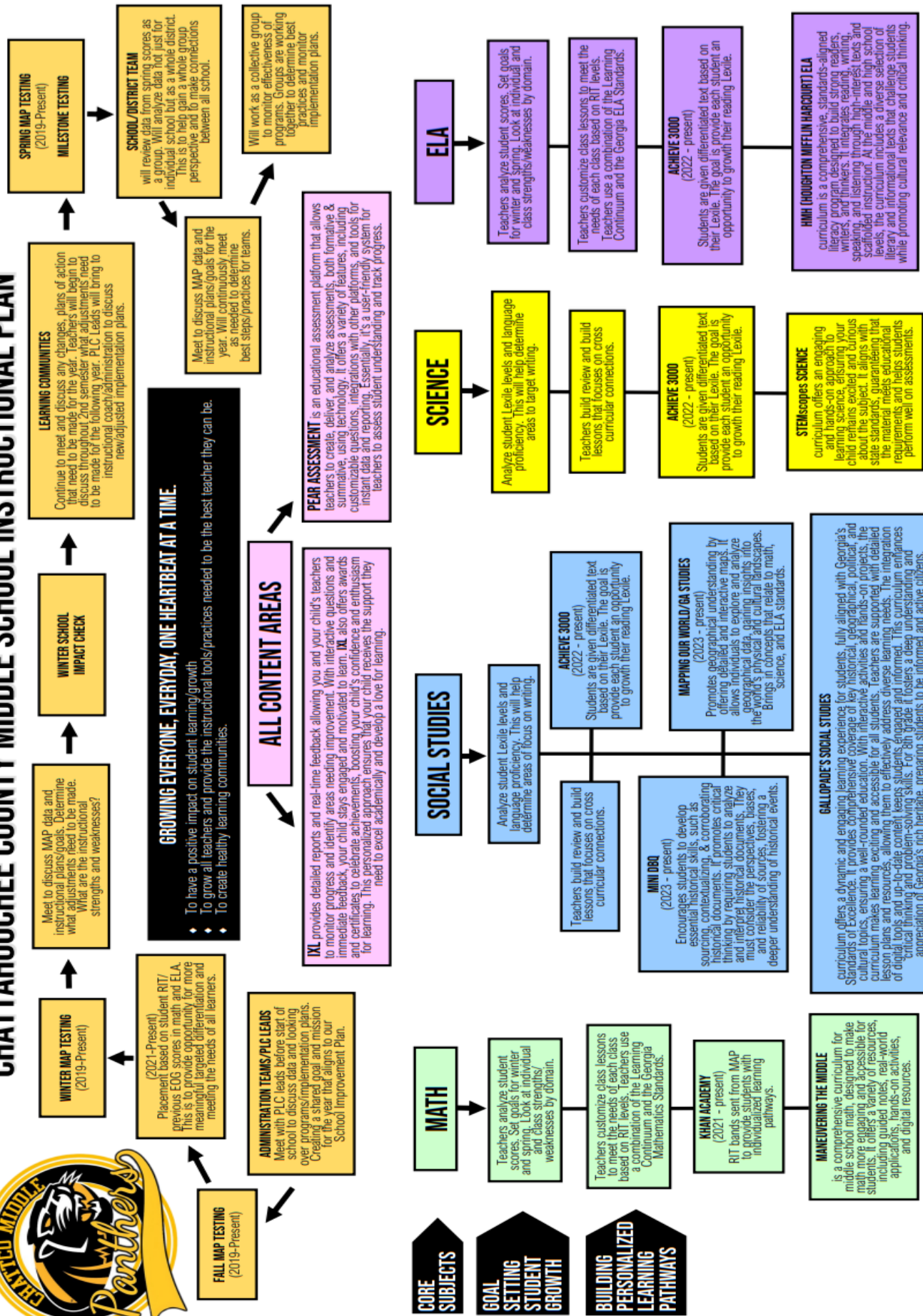
If the student does not meet the standard after the second administration (if given) of the test, a Placement Committee must be formed. This committee includes the principal or designee, the student's parent or guardian, and the teacher(s) of the subject(s) in which the student did not achieve grade-level proficiency. The committee may decide to promote the student based on additional evidence of achievement—such as classroom performance, assessments, and progress monitoring data—but this decision must be **unanimous**. If the committee cannot agree, the student will be **retained**.

Furthermore, when a student is promoted through this placement process, the school must place the student in a multi-tiered system of support to address the areas of deficiency. This ensures that students are not just passed forward without the tools they need to succeed at the next level.

Georgia's retention policy is designed to ensure that students are academically prepared for the challenges of the next grade. The goal is not to punish students for struggling but to provide **the time, support, and resources** needed for them to master essential skills. School systems are encouraged to communicate regularly with families, provide timely interventions, and consider the whole child—academically, socially, and emotionally—when making promotion or retention decisions.

REACH GEORGIA

REACH Georgia is administered by the Georgia Student Finance Authority (GSFA), a companion student finance entity of the Georgia Student Finance Commission (GSFC). GSFC is the state agency that administers the HOPE Scholarship and Grant Program as well as other state- and lottery-funded financial aid programs. GSFC also manages the career and college preparation website, GAfutures.org, and provides educational services such as free financial aid consultation and FAFSA completion assistance to high schools and postsecondary institutions across the state.

REACH Georgia is a need-based mentoring and scholarship program providing promising students the support to graduate from high school and achieve postsecondary success. Rising 8th graders are identified by teachers and other staff as potential applicants for the REACH Georgia scholarship. Students are required to complete a formal application as well as participate in an interview process if they meet all requirements. At the conclusion of the scholar selection process, three 8th grade students have the opportunity to be selected as REACH Georgia scholarship recipients. Those students selected will be paired with a mentor and academic coach that are there to support the student through their high school years. Students selected must exhibit and maintain academic promise, consistent attendance, and acceptable behavior in order to maintain REACH eligibility. LEAD SCHOLAR I AND II

To be eligible for Lead Scholar honors, a student must enroll no later than the first day of his or her 8th grade year. Military transfers will be excluded from this enrollment date requirement. The Lead Scholar I shall be the student who has met all curriculum requirements and has earned the highest cumulative grade average in the class (based on a 0-100 grade scale, core classes only). The Lead Scholar II shall be the student who has also met all curriculum requirements and has earned the 2nd highest cumulative grade average in the class (based on a 0-100 grade scale, core classes only).. The calculations will be determined at the end of the 3rd nine weeks during their 8th grade year. If there is a tie, all ties will be named as Lead Scholar and/or Lead Scholar II accordingly. However, if scholarships or financial grants are to be awarded based on class ranking as Lead Scholar I and/or Lead Scholar II, and the scholarships or grants cannot be shared among the students tied for Lead Scholar I and II, the following applies:

1. The higher overall Spring MAP Achievement score (achieved by March of their 8th grade year) will be the determining factor. If students are still tied then,
2. The higher overall Spring MAP Growth score (achieved by March of their 8th grade year) will be the determining factor.

REPORT CARDS

Report cards are available online via the PowerSchool Portal. The school counselor and/or teacher will be happy to discuss the report card if necessary. Also, you may call the main office if you need to schedule a conference with any single one or all of your child's teachers. **Outstanding debts or non-payment of debts may result in report cards and/or school records being withheld and/or restriction from participation in future school-sponsored activities until all debts are settled.**

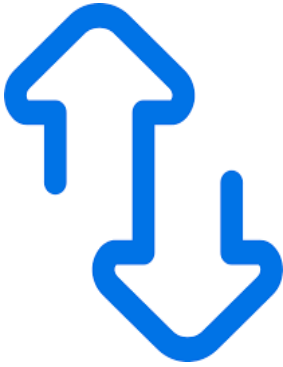

PANTHER EXPECTATIONS - THE MIDDLE WAY

DRESS FOR SUCCESS-Obtain the Vision

Chattahoochee County emphasizes that the business of school is student learning. Appropriate dress and grooming standards should support this purpose, promoting a positive learning atmosphere and a safe, orderly environment free from disruption.

These standards should be easily enforced by teachers and administrators and self-monitored by students and parents before arriving at school.

Tops:

- Must cover the chest, back, and midriff/stomach.
- Must be long enough to reach below the waistband of bottoms.
- Sheer/see-through tops are not permitted.
- Crop, halter, racer-back, tube, camisole, spaghetti straps, excessive armhole, or muscle tops are not permitted.
- Undershirts cannot be worn as tops.

Bottoms:

- Must be made of solid material and reach mid-thigh or longer. **We do not use the fingertip rule.**
- Excessively tight pants (e.g., yoga pants, leggings/jeggings) are permitted.
- Distressed bottoms are allowed, but holes or rips above mid-thigh are not permitted.
- Must be worn at the natural waistline; sagging is not permitted.
- Pajamas/fleece bottoms are not permitted.
- Fishnet clothing/stockings are not permitted.
- Volleyball, biker, and cycling shorts are not permitted.

Other:

- Proper undergarments must be worn and not exposed.
- House shoes/slippers are not permitted.
- No headgear (caps, hats, toboggans, visors, bandannas, scarves, headbands)
- Rollers, combs, picks, and brushes worn in the hair are not permitted.
- Sunglasses are not permitted inside the building.
- Hoods are not to be worn on the head inside the building.
- Trench coats are not permitted.
- Tattoos and clothing may not display or promote inappropriate content, including racial slurs, profanity, sexually suggestive language or representations, violence, alcohol, tobacco, drugs, or gangs.

Enforcement:

- Students who violate the dress code are subject to disciplinary action according to the discipline policy.
- The principal or designee has the authority to make final determinations regarding compliance with the Dress for Success Code Policy.
- It is crucial that students and parents use good judgment based on the school's mission.

CCMS DISTRACTION FREE POLICY

The "**Distraction-Free Education Act**" aims to minimize distractions and improve focus in the classroom. This means that **cellphones and smartwatches will no longer be allowed in the classroom during instruction time.**

Policy Details

During the school day, students are expected to remain focused on learning with minimal distractions. To support this goal and in compliance with the **Distraction-Free Education Act-HB 340**, the use of personal electronic devices—including **cell phones, smartwatches, and earbuds or headphones**—is not permitted during instructional time. Headphones are allowed in the classroom only when explicitly permitted by the teacher for academic or instructional use.

All devices must be turned off and given to the student's homeroom teacher. The teacher will place all cellphones in a locked box. Cellphones will be returned at the end of 5th period. When students arrive to their connection class, they must then give their phones to the connection teacher. The connection teacher will keep all phones in a locked box. All cellphones will be returned at the end of the class period.

Violations & Consequences

Responsibility:

- Students are **fully responsible** for any loss, damage, or theft of personal devices brought to school.

******CCMS is not responsible for lost, misplaced, or damaged items brought to school by students voluntarily.***

Unauthorized Use:

- There is no authorized use during the school day.
- Taking photos or videos of students or staff **without permission is strictly prohibited.**
- Sharing or posting unauthorized content may result in **short- or long-term suspension.**

Repeat Offenses:

- Students who break the device policy will have their device placed on **administrative hold for parent pickup** or be assigned **In-School Suspension (ISS).**

Violation Progression for Teachers (if a student is caught with a personal device)

- **First Offense:** Warning documented in PowerSchool (so other teachers can see if first offense has occurred). Collect device and inform parents.
- **Second Offense:** Office referral. Collect device and turn in to an administrator. Admin will follow disciplinary progression from here. The disciplinary progress is found on the next page.

These consequences are designed to encourage responsible behavior and ensure that all students can learn in a distraction-free environment.

PANTHER EXPECTATIONS - THE MIDDLE WAY

COMMUNICATION/ELECTRONIC DEVICES OR RELATED PARAPHERNALIA

1. PHONES/DEVICES

- Students shall not use, display, or turn on cellular phones or electronic devices during class time without teacher authorization. The teacher will confiscate any electronic device (including the battery) during class time without prior approval. Refusal to turn over cell phones or other electronic devices to the teacher and/or habitual/continued use of cell phones or electronic devices without prior approval will result in the student being guilty of insubordination (I. 9).
- Teachers will not be interrupted to retrieve an item that has been taken.
- **STOLEN ELECTRONIC DEVICES ARE NOT THE RESPONSIBILITY OF ADMINISTRATION.**
- Administrators/Law Enforcement will not conduct classroom/area searches for missing items.

DISPOSITION:

- **1st Offense:** The teacher confiscates the device and returns it at the end of the day. Parents will be notified & made aware of the consequences of the next offense.
- **2nd Offense:** The teacher confiscates, and the parent is required to pick up the device. 3 Days ISS
- **3rd + Offense:** The teacher confiscates, and the parent is required to pick up the device. Student referred for Insubordination (see I.9)

2. HEADPHONES/ EARBUDS/ SMARTWATCHES

- Headphones/Earbuds can be used during class time with teacher approval.

DISPOSITION:

- **1st Offense:** Teacher confiscates and device is returned at the end of the day. Parents will be notified and made aware of consequences for the next offense.
- **2nd Offense:** Teacher confiscates and parent is required to pick up the device. 3 Days ISS
- **3rd + Offense:** Teacher confiscates and parent is required to pick up the device. Student referred for Insubordination (see I.9).

3. FILMING FIGHTS

- No student shall film a fight or any encounter between students.

DISPOSITION:

- **1st Offense:** 3 Days ISS
- **2nd Offense:** 5 Days ISS
- **3rd Offense:** 3 Days OSS

PARENT & GUARDIAN SUPPORT

We value the partnership between home and school in promoting a successful and focused learning environment. In support of the Distraction-Free Education Policy, we respectfully ask parents and guardians to reinforce these expectations at home. Please encourage your child to keep personal devices such as cell phones, smartwatches, and headphones turned off and stored in their locker or backpack during the school day.

To minimize disruptions to instruction, we also ask that families refrain from calling or texting students during class hours. If you need to reach your child in an emergency, please contact the front office, and we will ensure your message is delivered promptly.

We understand that there may be unique circumstances that require individual consideration. If your child has a medical need or other emergency-related concern that necessitates access to a personal device during the school day, we encourage you to contact school administration to discuss an appropriate plan.

Your support is essential to maintaining a safe, respectful, and distraction-free learning environment for all.

SCHOOL FOODS

Breakfast:

- Student price is \$1.75.
- SY 25-26 all students receive free breakfast under provision II.
- Students must eat in the cafeteria or designated area.

Lunch:

- Eating is allowed only in designated areas.
- Students may not leave the lunchroom during lunch without permission from the teacher on duty.
- No food/drink is to be removed from the lunchroom; failure to comply may result in disciplinary action.
- Lunch costs \$3.00 for CCMS students unless they qualify for free/reduced lunch.

Meal Charges:

- **Students are not allowed to charge meals.**

- Students, parents, or guardians must pre-pay a student account.
