

FARMINGTON MUNICIPAL SCHOOLS - DISTRICT REPORT CARD

Farmington Municipal Schools (FMS) is a public school district in Farmington, New Mexico. The District covers an area of approximately 808 square miles in the beautiful Four Corners region of San Juan County. The District serves close to 11,000 students in 20 schools: 1 Pre-K Academy, 10 Elementary Schools, 4 Middle Schools, 4 High Schools, and 1 Technical & Career Center. The District has two National Blue Ribbon Schools: Mesa Verde Elementary School and Ladera Elementary School. The District serves 4,321 Native American students, 66 Nations/Tribes/Pueblos represented, 24 languages, 2,742 students registered in Career & Technical Education classes, and 4,000 students in grades 6-12 are involved in visual, performing, or media arts classes. The District employs more than 1,500 staff, including 711 teachers and 36 National Board Certified educators.

BOARD OF EDUCATION TRAINING

Board of Education members must complete a total of five hours of training annually. All FMS Board members have met the requirement in 2023-2024, including a training course developed by the State Public Education Department (PED) and sponsored by the New Mexico School Boards Association (NMSBA) for members who have been in office for less than a year. Please note that the requirements have changed starting in July 2024.

SCHOOL DESIGNATIONS

School designations are assigned by the New Mexico Public Education Department (NMPED) for support in categories aligned with the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) requirements:


- Targeted Support and Improvement
- Additional Targeted Support and Improvement
- Comprehensive Support and Improvement escalated from Additional Targeted Support and Improvement
- Comprehensive Support and Improvement for low graduation rate
- Comprehensive Support and Improvement for overall low-performance
- More Rigorous Interventions escalated from Comprehensive Support and Improvement
- Additionally, New Mexico has two state-established designations: Spotlight Schools and Designations of Excellence. Spotlight Schools are those with ESSA overall scores above 75% of schools statewide.

Graduation cohorts include all students who were ever enrolled during the four years, including withdrawal due to a move within the state (119 students), move out of state (118 students), to obtain GED (72 students), and drop-out/exit to be homeschooled (11 students).
