


to spend their lunch with Mr. Cleary. He even signed their poems!

High School Counseling Dept News

Academics: The first semester will be coming to an end on January 17, 2025. Students need to check with their teachers to be sure all of their assignments are

turned in and make-up work is completed.

Remember, in order to receive credit for the semester, the semester percentage (average of Q1 and Q2) must be at least 62%. We do not administer semester exams. Grade Point Average (GPA) is calculated every semester, so students need to take the end of the semester very seriously and put forth their best effort.

- If a student fails a course for the first semester, then it will be necessary to work out credit recovery in order to be on track for graduation. We will be meeting with students who have failed courses to discuss credit recovery options. Please be sure both parents and students are checking PowerSchool to check student's grades. If you need login information, please contact the school counseling office.

College Credit Plus Second Semester Schedules: If you are taking a CCP course (or courses) during the second semester, please submit a copy of your college course schedule to the school counseling office right away!

Sentinel Applications: All Sophomores, any Freshmen interested in cosmetology, and any Juniors interested in a senior only program who wish to apply to Sentinel Career Center for the 2025-2026 school year must have their applications submitted online by the February 6, 2025, priority deadline. All applications received by this date will be processed for acceptance and determination of program eligibility. Applicants will be accepted after this date on a “space available” basis. Please understand that an application does not guarantee acceptance into the desired program. Applicants can help their chances by making sure they are caught up on their credits and achieve junior status. Good attendance also should be a priority.

College Credit Plus (CCP): The College Credit Plus Information Meeting for the 2025-2026 school year is now live and ready for viewing. This can be found on the USHS website by clicking “Menu” and then “College Credit Plus (CCP)”. Students (AND their parents/guardians) wishing to participate in College Credit Plus for this upcoming summer and the 2025-2026 academic year are required to do the following:

1. Watch the recorded presentation that is available on the school counseling website. This presentation reviews the CCP program as a whole, including the benefits and potential ramifications of the CCP program.
2. Complete the "Intent to Participate" Google form (also available on the USHS CCP website) after both the student and parent/guardian watch the recorded CCP Presentation. This is due by **APRIL 1st, 2025** and is a state mandated requirement, so **late intent forms will not be accepted.**

3. If you are planning to take a University of Findlay course held AT USHS next year, applications must be submitted by **June 1st, 2025 for priority consideration**. Please note that for the 2025-2026 school year, all CCP courses held AT USHS will be through the University of Findlay. These courses and their course descriptions are listed within our 2025-2026 Course Selection Guide.
4. If you are planning to take a class on a college campus or online, you must abide by that college's specific application deadlines. It is the student's responsibility to obtain admission requirement information, submit materials, and meet application deadlines. Regardless of individual college deadlines, all application materials must be submitted before summer break.
5. Stop by the school counseling office if you have any questions.

Scheduling: Students have started selecting their courses for the next school year. Your student has access to an online copy of the 2025-26 Course Selection Guide that outlines the requirements for graduation, as well as other pertinent scheduling information. Students looking to attend college after graduation, play a collegiate sport, earn college credit during high school or receive an honors diploma should thoroughly review those topics in the course selection guide. Careful course selection is extremely important for these particular goals. We would be happy to answer any questions that you or your student may have about scheduling.

Scholarships: The 2025 Scholarship Handbook was sent electronically to all senior email accounts and paper copies were made available in the school counseling office. For your convenience, we have also posted the Scholarship Handbook on our website! This can be found by going to the high school website, clicking on "Menu" and then clicking on "Guidance", and then clicking "Local Scholarship Handbook" and "Scholarship Applications." In addition to the Scholarship Handbook, students and families will also find uploaded copies of the Unified Application, W-9 tax form, and all of the Special Scholarship Applications on this page. Please keep in mind that all scholarships are due into the school counseling office by February 3rd, 2025, at 3:00 pm-- no exceptions! Students can also utilize www.fastweb.com and www.goingmerry.com to search for scholarships, and we highly encourage students to check with their particular college(s) for additional scholarships.

ACT Prep: Using the website, www.ohiomeansjobs.com, students have access to free career interest inventories, ACT prep and practice tests, job and scholarship searches, interviewing practice and much more! This is a very valuable resource for all students to explore. ACT Academy also provides free

ACT practice and preparation and can be accessed at: <https://academy.act.org/>

Clinical Counseling: USHS has contracted with Courtad-Holman Counseling LLC to offer free counseling services during the school day. This service is funded in part by Wyandot County levy funds from the Mental Health and Recovery Services Board of Seneca, Sandusky and Wyandot Counties. Mrs. Erika Holloway will be available to work with students who require counseling beyond what is available through the school counseling department. Interested students should speak with their school counselor so that a referral can be made.

*Growth Mindset

Ways to build a Growth Mindset:

- Turn off the fixed mindset voice that tells you you're going to fail.
- If something doesn't turn out the way you want, instead of getting frustrated or giving up, think about how you can do it differently.
- Understand the power of the word "yet."
 - ◆ I don't understand it....yet.
 - ◆ I don't know how to do that....yet.
 - ◆ I'm not good at this....yet.

USMS Students Experience the Reality of Life & Finances

USMS 7th & 8th grade students participated in the Reality Store on November 22nd. . The real-life personal finance simulation began with students being assigned a job based on current career interests. Each job came with a monthly paycheck ranging from approximately \$2,000 (Social Worker) to over \$7,000 (doctor or lawyer) including many from skilled trades. Students then visited 16 life expense tables to practice budgeting and spending on life responsibilities such as childcare, insurance, housing, and entertainment. Throughout the morning our local law enforcement representative “arrested” those for unfortunate life circumstances, such as speeding tickets.

Through this simulation students learned the importance of budgeting their money to pay their bills and expenses. Many found it difficult to survive on their salary and picked up second jobs. They realized they needed to choose items that were affordable for them, not necessarily what they ultimately wanted.


This event required the participation of our entire community and over 30 community members graciously volunteered their time to work the life expense tables. We would like to thank the following:

Update from Upper Sandusky FFA

Welcome to 2025! In this new year we give thanks to everyone who has provided support and encouragement over the past year. On behalf of the FFA, we want to thank the community for your support of our fundraisers, our activities, and our students. We want to thank the parents for coordinating fundraisers, picking up students from activities, and running out at the last minute for a needed item that you were just told about. We also want to thank the students for working hard at competitions, community service, and FFA activities. Here is an update on some of our activities...

Both the advanced and novice parliamentary procedure teams qualified and competed in the state contest in December. The advanced team placed in the top 15 teams in the state and the novice team placed 5th overall in state competition. It is an honor to advance to the state contest and be not only one of the top 20 teams in Ohio, but one of the top 5. The novice team competed in the semi-finals and finals, learning valuable lessons in public speaking, how to run a meeting properly, and how to think on their feet during debate. Members of the novice team were: President McCoy Boes, Vice President Raelyn Morris, Secretary Lyla Rall, Treasurer Adriane Yeater, Reporter Carson Rowland, Sentinel Karisanne Reile, Student Advisor Emmett Kilbride, and Member Paige Vehrs.

The FFA motto is Learning to Do, Doing to Learn, Earning to Live, and Living to Serve. FFA members are Living to Serve the community during the holiday season this year through various activities. FFA members oversaw and set up an area for the Fantasy of Lights display. Members also worked greeting people as Frosty and Rudolph. 38 members worked 22 different shifts, providing 90 hours of community service to Fantasy of Lights. 24 students also volunteered to ring bells for the Salvation Army out at Wal-Mart and provided 33.5 hours of community service to the Salvation Army. In addition, members coordinated a food and hygiene drive for the Open Door Resource Center. A total of 890 items including diapers, toilet paper, body wash, cereal, fruit snacks, etc. were collected and donated along with 4 boxes of fresh citrus. Thank you to our FFA members, teachers, and students at East Elementary for supporting this collection.

As we head into this new year, the FFA is busy preparing officer books and award applications for district and state evaluation. The reporter will submit the Reporter's Scrapbook, the secretary will submit the Secretary's Book, and the treasurer will submit the Treasurer's Book to be evaluated at the district level. In addition, we have numerous students applying for State and American FFA Degrees and submitting

Proficiency Awards to be evaluated at the state level. We've started planning for our upcoming FFA Week and Chapter Degree Ceremonies as well as preparing for public speaking competitions, Greenhand Quiz, Farm Business Management, and Ag Power CDEs, and various spring CDE teams. We have FFA members involved in Equine Management, General Livestock Judging, Dairy Cattle, Agronomy, Poultry Management, Nature Interpretation, and Wildlife Management during the spring CDE season. We wish good luck to all students as they begin the competition season!

Twenty-seven first year FFA members will be receiving the bronze pin of the Greenhand degree at our Greenhand Ceremonies in late January. The novice parliamentary procedure team will begin the evening with opening ceremonies, the officer team will conduct the Official Greenhand Ceremony, five members will recite the FFA Creed, and a state FFA officer will speak to the Greenhands. The Greenhand Degree is the first degree a member can earn in the FFA and we welcome our newest FFA members to the Upper Sandusky FFA Chapter.

Strawberries go on sale on January 15. We will be selling various cheese packs, beef sticks, beef jerky, and summer sausage along with the strawberries and candy from Coon's Candy. 
