Philosophy Statement

It is our expectation that the philosophy and objectives of Schenck High School will be an integral aspect of the daily operation of the school. We expect that the curriculum will reflect the changing needs of the local, state, national and global communities. We expect to challenge all students to maximize their intellectual abilities, realize the lifelong utility of education, learn to accept responsibility for personal decisions and actions, and to develop the skill and willingness to work cooperatively with others. We encourage all students to be active participants in the "joy" of attaining knowledge and skills.

Graduation Requirements:

Community Type: Rural/Industrial

Population: Approximately 3,000, comprising communities of E. Millinocket and Medway.

Location: Approximately 65 miles North of Bangor, Maine's third largest city.

School Type: Four-year public comprehensive high school.

Enrollment: 107 students from the communities of E. Millinocket, Medway, and Woodville.

Class Enrollment: 36 seniors, 24 juniors, 20 sophomores, and 27 freshmen.

School Year: Two semesters with two marking periods per semester.

Class Rank: Non-weighted and determined on a 0-100 numerical grade scale.

Scheduling/Class Periods: Five periods per day in 62 minute blocks. Courses meet every other day for a total of ten block periods. All students are required to take a minimum of eight courses per year. Region III Vocational in Lincoln offers 4 hours of a technical instruction per day for students enrolled in a tech prep program of study.

Course Selection: Students have a choice of two programs of study to choose from: **College Preparatory** is for students who plan to apply to a selective four-year academic institution upon graduation, and who have demonstrated superior academic work throughout their scholastic experience. **Technical Preparation** is designed for students planning to apply for admission to either a two or four-year college or technical school. **Advanced Placement:** Schenck High School is involved in an articulation agreement with Eastern Maine Community College to offer college level classes to qualified juniors and seniors. The Early College Program enables qualified juniors and seniors to earn 24 college credits from the community college upon high school graduation.
