



EARLY CHILDHOOD

We had a busy week in 3 year old preschool this week. We worked on our colors: blue, purple, white, and black, our numbers: 8, 9, and 10, and our shapes: rectangle, crescent, and rhombus. The letter names and sounds we covered this week were LI /l/, Nn /n/ Bb /b/, and Uu /u/. During phonics time we worked on rhyming words, words that have the same beginning sounds, and compound words. We worked on gross motor skills through songs in the room and playing with four year olds in the gym. We have been meeting some new people and enjoying this time with them. During our social emotional times we reviewed our attent-o-scopes from last week and how we can still use our imaginary ones to focus on what we are supposed to be doing during class and make the good choice. The students have been doing agreat job of using our problem solving skills we have learned so far this year and are showing great improvement on using their words and the timer during centers time. We were able to finish our matman project from the end of last week and we have proudly displayed them in our hallway. One of the last things we did this week was start a study about trees. We read two stories about trees. One called a Tree Named Steve and another named Abiyoyo. We examined a piece of real bark and then went on a trip outside to see if we could find parts of trees for our discovery center as well as future projects. The students built trees with unifix cubes and compared their sizes (small and tall) and worked on item counting. We also learned a new poem together about trees with motions and started to work on writing our own poems about trees. The best part of the week was hearing the students say preschool is so fun. Thanks for a great week and see you all next week.

EARLY CHILDHOOD

This week in science we learned more about forces and motion. We experimented with different ways to move Cheerios. We also did some bumper bowling. In reading we have been working learning about characters and how sometimes the characters are animals that act like people. We continue to learn our letter sounds. In math we have been finding hidden partners in 5. - Mrs. Westwater

In religion this week, we made preparations for our first kindergarten service project. We will be opening An Apple a Day Cafe during the month of October! We worked on advertisements this week, including posters for our hallways and a commercial to inform our customers of what will be available when they come to the apple stand. All profits from the stand will be used to purchase items to make Jared Boxes for pediatric patients at MercyOne in New Hampton. Our read-aloud collection this week was about families and taking care of each other. We read about a little sister wanting to be like her big sister, a mama bear taking care of her little bear, and a boy and his mom going on walks together. In phonics this week, we continue our work with beginning sounds and blending 3 sounds together to make words. We worked with the phonemes for k, c, t, b, and w this week and learned to write those capital letters as well. We have been playing some fun games in math this week to help us remember what the words "more" and "fewer" mean. More pizza please, but fewer poisonous snakes! In writing we are working on writing simple poems about ourselves, and of course, remembering to start with a capital letter and use ending punctuation. - Mrs. Flugum

We had an awesome week in first grade. We have been working on our mass parts for our first mass on October 4th. (A special thank you to those parents who are working on this at home. It is not going unnoticed!) We have also been focusing on being a member of our catholic community and what that looks like. In math we have been working on finding missing parts using both addition and subtraction. We are also using the words difference and sum, which are the answers when we subtract and multiply. We have worked with our number lines as well to help us add or subtract. In social studies we are continuing our unit on about Families and Schools and how we get along with others. In reading we are continuing to learn about different stations, finding good fit books, transitioning, etc. We are also reading some stories about getting along with others and ones that have rhyming in it. Be sure to ask them about the Goose Getting Loose story! This was one they loved. In writing we have been working on adding more details to our sentences. One activity they had to pick their favorite food, toy, and activity. After that they wrote a sentence about each one. Finally, we added more details to those sentences and drew a picture to go along with it. Thank you to those who are practicing the letter packets at home as well. MIDDLE SCHOOL

The past few weeks students have been exploring the scientific method, the metric system, and calculating different measurements through a variety of labs and experiments. If you drop a slinky from a distance which end will fall first? Based on this question, students formed and tested a hypothesis in a "slinky drop" experiment. They manipulated the slinky in different ways to see if they could change the outcome. Students analyzed their data after experimenting and theorized why the slinky falls they way it does. Another lab conducted was measuring mass, volume, and density of different objects to work on calculations and using the metric system. The metric system is used around the world by scientists to have consistent measurements in order to duplicate experiments. The great debate that all of this sparked was; "why doesn't the United States use the metric system?". What are your thoughts?
