

3 YEAR OLD PRESCHOOL HIGHLIGHTS: A FUN WEEK OF LEARNING!



THIRD AND FOURTH GRADE:

It was a quick but busy week in 3rd and 4th grade. We continued our unit on the Titanic. We watched 2 videos where they digitally mapped the Titanic wreck and created 3d images that allowed us to explore the wreck like never before. Our I.R.A's books this week focused on different cultures.
