

#### **Navigating Definitions**

#### What is Deficit Spending?

Deficit Spending takes place when expenses are greater than Revenue.

#### What are Fiscal Oversight Cash Balance Deficits?

The Ohio Department of Education will examine forecast submissions for the potential to incur cash balance deficits in the first three years of the forecast. Cash Balance Deficits are your "savings account predictions."

#### What is a Forecast?

According to the Ohio Department of Education, "the preparation of a meaningful five-year forecast is as much an art as it is a science and entails many intricacies, it is recommended that you contact the Treasurer/Chief Fiscal Officer or Board of Education (BOE) of the individual school district with any questions you may have." It also says, "A forecast is somewhat like a painting of the future based upon a snapshot of today. That snapshot, however, will be adjusted and the further into the future the forecast extends, the more likely it is that the projections will deviate from actual experience. A variety of events will ultimately impact the latter years of the forecast, such as state budgets (adopted every two years), tax levies, and salary increases. The five-year forecast is viewed as a key management tool and must be updated at least twice a year. In Ohio, most school districts understand how they will manage their finances in the current year. The five-year forecast encourages district management teams to examine future years' projections and identify when challenges will arise. This then helps district management to be proactive in meeting those challenges. School districts are encouraged to update their forecasts with ODE when events take place that will significantly change their forecast or, at a minimum, when required under statute."

### **Explore Our Milestones**

The last year for Felicity Franklin Local Schools has been a year of change, but it has helped us get to where we are today, which is not on the ballot. Let's review what got us there:

We approved an **Expenditure Reduction Plan** due to two failed levy attempts. This expenditure reduction plan included consolidating our Middle School into our High School and our Elementary School & eliminating staff.

When schools are unsuccessful in passing operating levies, it is not uncommon that teachers seek other employment elsewhere. Unfortunately, there is a teacher shortage right now so finding replacement teachers is not easy. <u>Usually</u>, a **savings** occurs when we hire new teachers depending on the grade level and/or subject they are teaching. However, this is not always possible during a teacher shortage.

### Financial Update

#### **Explore Our Milestones (continued)**

The Governor's budget that passed in July **increased state funding**. We have been "On the Guarantee" meaning we have been getting the same funding since 2020, but with this budget bill we will no longer be "On the Guarantee." We will now be funded based on the State's funding formula. This means we will see small increases each year.


#### Peruse Our Financials

#### Prior Year (Fiscal Year End 2023)

With our changes made in the last two years, we closed the last fiscal year with an excess of revenue over expenditures of \$582,248. To put that into perspective, that is less than one month's expenditures. It takes \$1,000,000 per month approximately to pay all the bills for the district.

### Current & Future Year Forecast Prediction (Fiscal Year End 2024-2028)

We are also predicting a positive excess revenue over expenditures for this fiscal year end due to the expenditure reduction plan and savings mentioned above. It is our predictions that the savings only provided a two-year reprieve from the previous forecast deficit spending.



#### **Unknown Changes**


From the moment the Forecast is published, it is immediately outdated. The question is, to what extent, and is it significant enough to need a revision or resubmission. For example, the day after the forecast is submitted, a student could move in the district causing a required contract to educate a special education student in an out-of-district facility. These facilities can be costly but are the best placement for the student's education. Over a five-year forecast, the cost of one student in this scenario could exceed 0.5 million dollars.

#### **Enrollment Changes**

We have also seen a decrease in students in our district, but as you will see in the chart below, it is a statewide issue. Enrollment is down across the state. With online schools being so popular and an easy option and just the economy in general causing parents to have less children, we are seeing very few districts having increases (shown in green below).

#### **Legislation/Negotiation Changes**

One of the changes that was included in the Governor's budget was a minimum 12 step salary schedule for teachers. When we compared it to our salary schedule, it was determined that our salary schedule was below the state minimum. This is going to cause a future impact to our forecasted salary and salary-based benefit expenses once we finish negotiations in the spring and know exactly all other impacts to include.

### **Legislation/Negotiation Changes (continued)**

There is also Property Tax Legislation that is currently being discussed in the House and Senate. Once those are finalized, we will determine the impact to our forecast and future revenue.

### Glimpse of Our Plans

Your current administration has always had an eye on where we've been, where we are, and where we will be, both if we financially stay status quo and if the "what ifs" happen. We are really good at thinking through the "what ifs." We have colleagues and we have forecast software experts we bounce thoughts and ideas off of (we even have them look at the forecasts when new budget bills are adopted, or new laws are implemented to ensure accuracy). We have professional organizations like OASBO, OSBA, & BASA that provide us with information to keep us up to date, and we use all of this when preparing the forecast to share with our Board of Education and the public to keep everyone informed.

Since 2016, the current administration has saved our district over \$8.4 million dollars. We have been fiscally responsible with the district's finances and will always be as long as this team is in place. The plan for the future is to continue to teach students every day, monitor expenditures, communicate with the community when the budget bills change state funding, and save for those large unknowns.





### Felicity-Franklin FFA Earns Top Honors in 2023

#### The Felicity-Franklin FFA attends the 96th National FFA and Expo

In October 2023, 25 students left to compete in the National Knowledge Quiz at the National FFA Convention. There were 117 teams and 391 individuals who competed in this competition. The Felicity-Franklin FFA Middle school team was named the Reserve Champion Team. On the team was Lydia Hamilton who was 2nd, Braydon O'Hearn who was 3rd, Brayden Hazelbaker who was 4th, and Lilly Lane who was 7th in the entire nation. The Junior team A was 4th in the nation. On the team was Hailey Wendling who was 9th, Olivia Liming who was 18th, Abigail Masterson who was 19th, and Katelyn Brandenburg who was 34th in the nation. The Junior Team B was 8th in the nation. On the team was Lucia Taylor who was 21st, Liz Brumbach who was 29th. Jaxxon Johnson who was 34th, and Bre Idlett who was 56th in the nation. The Senior Team was 12th in the nation. On the team was Emma Brandenburg who was 29th, Andru Preston who was 37th, Eden Myers who was 40th, and Faith Jennings who was 60th in the Nation.

Felicity-Franklin FFA had 3 proficiency finalists who competed at Nationals. Audrey Pinger was in the top 4 in the nation in Agricultural Sales. Joanna Hamilton was in the top 4 in the nation for Integrated Agriscience. Mattilyn Griffith was also top 4 in the nation for Veterinary Science. They each won \$500 for their efforts.

The Milk Quality & Products Team worked and studied hard for months for the national competition. They placed first at the Ohio FFA State competition qualifying for Nationals. These four amazing members put in the work with the help of Larry Lokai who helped prepare them for this competition. The team competed at Nationals and were 9th in the nation out of 40 teams earning a Gold rating. These members were Joanna Hamilton, Kaylee Jennings, Ben Bracher and Lucjan Grider.

The Felicity-Franklin FFA had four members who competed with their Agriscience Fair projects at the national level. Kaylee Jennings and Joanna Hamilton were named National Champions in the Food Products and Processing Division 6 of the Agriscience Fair each earning \$1000. Elizabeth Lindsey and Briley Idlett placed 8th in the nation in Animal Science Division 6 of the Agriscience Fair.

The Felicity-Franklin FFA Chapter the greatest honor of having 2 students selected as Star American Degree Finalists. Luke Jennings was an American Star Farmer finalist and Audrey Pinger was an American Star in Agriscience finalist. Congratulations Audrey Pinger and Luke Jennings on this great honor. The dedication to your SAEs and all things FFA have not gone unnoticed. They each earned \$2000 for this honor.

We also had 8 members who received their American FFA Degrees. Less than one percent of FFA members achieve the American FFA Degree. This is the highest degree that a member can be awarded in the FFA. These members are Emily Hardewig, Emma Laubach, Landen Tull, Tate Liming, Connor Ninichuck, Luke Jennings, Audrey Pinger and Chase Jarman. We could not be more proud to add your names to the list of members that have achieved the highest degree in the FFA.

#### Focusing on Student Engagement

All K-12 teachers have been actively engaged in the five-day Kagan training in all academic subject areas to boost student engagement and learning. We completed Days #1 and 2 during the 2021-2022 school year and Days #3 and 4 during the 2022-2023 school year. We completed Day #5 in October 2023. We know that when students are engaged, they pay attention, they're motivated, they learn more, and the learning sticks. The biggest difference between the Kagan approach and traditional teaching methods is the ability to engage every student. Traditional classroom teaching captures the minds and attention of some students, but not all. Good teachers engage more students. But, even the best teachers who use traditional instruction don't necessarily require every student to participate. With traditional instruction, there is likely a subset of students who will fall through the cracks because they know other students will take care of engaging with the teacher and the content. As brainresearch is proving, meaningful engagement is just a better way to reach and teach all students.

# Instructional Coaching Focus

English Language Arts and math teachers in grades 5-12 and science and social studies teachers at the high school level have been benefiting from instructional coaching through the Hamilton County Educational Service Center. Instructional coaching is a professional development approach that involves one-on-one support for teachers. It is designed to help teachers improve their instructional practices and enhance student learning. This approach allows coaches to focus on the specific areas where the teacher needs improvement. Ultimately, the goal of coaching is to improve student learning outcomes. By providing teachers with the support they need to enhance their instruction even more, instructional coaches help to create an environment where students are more engaged, motivated, and successful.



The Felicity-Franklin School District is excited to announce that our Felicity-Franklin PTO, has applied for and received a generous grant from Connect Clermont. Due to the grant award, the PTO has been able to purchase many items to use in the classrooms for indoor recess (or other events).
