


experience, a good future for Harrington Park is guaranteed!

Music

One of the most memorable classes for students at Harrington Park School is music. Whether their teacher is Ms. Woods, Ms. Park, or Mr. Daleus, kids always remember learning about the history of it and some even remember playing musical instruments, such as the 3rd graders with recorder. I asked these three teachers what the curriculum is for their designated grade levels.

Ms. Woods teaches kindergarten and 3rd grade general music. In kindergarten, students learn how to feel and move to the beat, and how to sing music. To add a fun element to it, they get to listen to music as well! As mentioned before, 3rd graders get to learn how to play the recorder. Ms. Woods also said: "We...study the families of the orchestra and prepare for our field trip to NJPAC [New Jersey Performing Arts Center] for an interactive concert with the NJ Symphonic Orchestra." She said that she loves working with students musically and academically, along with social interactions. Students will have lots to look forward to with Ms. Woods.



Ms. Park teaches 1st and 2nd grade and 4th-7th grade general music. The lower grades will learn to "...understand and appreciate music, ...read notes, and grasp simple rhythms and music production." To keep her class engaging, she incorporates instruments and technology to provide a fun environment for the students. The upper grades learn more about the history and culture of music so that "students not only gain a deeper understanding of music but also develop a broader cultural awareness and appreciation for the global diversity of musical traditions." They also get to work on projects for Ms. Park's class. She said, "Music has a unique ability to inspire, connect, and create memorable learning experiences. My passion for sharing the joy of music with my students will continue to ignite their curiosity and creativity." Just like Ms. Wood's students, Ms. Park's students will learn about music and further their love for it.

Mr. Daleus teaches 8th grade general music. The eighth graders will learn about John Cage and have a "music debate" on whether or not his musical arrangement, "Water Walk" should be considered music. Students will also learn about what music is and how to make their own using software such as Soundtrap. Through this website, students will learn the basics of online music composition. Mr. Dalues said he's most excited for one of the projects that involves Soundtrap. Eighth graders have a lot to learn and will have fun in Mr. Daleus's general music class.

Whether it's listening to or playing music or learning about the history of it, Ms. Woods, Ms. Park, and Mr. Dalues will introduce students to new aspects of this art form while still engaging in a fun environment. The teachers can't wait to show students how interesting music can be.



Art

As art teachers, Mrs. Pidane and Mrs. DeBellis are the best. This fall the HP students are working on all different types of art design like Tim Burton style self portraits, Folk Art printmaking collage, painting, sculptural projects, and much more. Mrs. Pidane says, "I chose the projects because they are all really fun to make while learning some interesting art facts. Whether learning about Folk Art, Tim Burton or collage

techniques, all students were creative in making some beautiful work." Both Mrs. Pidane and Mrs. DeBellis have specifically found these special projects for each grade, and they are so excited for the outcome.

Kindergarten - Second Grade



Kindergarteners have been acquainted with the Bent, Straight and Curved lines who are a part of the very important "Line Family". Without these categories, we would not be able to make art at all. They have created giant initials putting the line family to work in a beautiful way!

First graders are completing a Halloween inspired silhouette project just in time to decorate the halls of our school for the holiday! They discovered just how much detail can be shown through a simple but carefully drawn outline.





Second graders just finished exploring the lifecycle of the endangered loggerhead sea turtle. After drawing the creatures from observation, they provided a layered collage environment with mixed media including tissue paper, oil pastels, and fluorescent paints.

Third - Fifth Grade

Third graders discovered that many famous painters were avid gardeners. Inspired by Gustav Klimt's flower paintings, they created painted pollinator gardens and then provided a superstart pollinator: the bee.





Fourth grade is busy working on the concept of space and form in artwork, focusing mostly on the idea of creating positive and negative space. Students have been working hard on making autumn themed collages to clearly use positive and negative space in these beautiful pieces.

Fifth graders talked about the idea of contrast and created a brightly colored background with oil pastels. Then they used black and yellow paper to create a silhouette of a house on the background. The finishing touch was Jazz gloss to paint a frame.



Sixth - Eighth Grade



Sixth graders are working on a Folk Art printmaking collage. After learning about the simplistic style of art called Folk Art, they created a drawing of a house on printers foam. They then rolled printers ink on the foam and stamped it on various papers. Lastly, they cut out the houses and attached them to a collaged background to create our Folk Art scenes.

Seventh graders are working on Tim Burton style self-portraits. The students are having fun learning about the quirky style of artist, animator and film director, Tim Burton. They drew self-portraits in the style of Tim Burton and finally, shaded their work with chalk to stay with a grayscale theme.





Eighth graders are currently working on representational self-portraits using drawn collage techniques. A representational self-portrait is when the artist tells us about themselves without drawing their face. They first sketched ideas of what they wanted to represent them, then they traced a silhouette and drew all their images into a collage format inside the silhouette. Finally, it was outlined and colored with colored pencils.

Wrapping up, the art department has been working extremely hard with all of the students. This month's projects are going to turn out great!



Maybe you like to travel like Ms.J? Maybe you love the book Little Prince like Ms.Park? Maybe you like poetry like Senora Lewis?








BOOK REVIEWS

Creepy Carrots! by Aaron Reynolds




Frog and Toad are Friends By: Arnold Lobel




Sixth Grade Book Recommendation: The Lost Hero Author: Rick Riordan Genre: Dystopian/Fantasy

Looking for some delicious and cozy fall recipes? Well in this article, you will learn how to make 1 dessert recipe, a dinner recipe and one for a cozy autumn drink. So are you ready?

The first recipe is for dinner. This recipe can be made all year round but I think it will especially be good to make during the Fall season.

Spaghetti & Spinach with Sun-Dried Tomato Cream Sauce

Makes 4 servings

Total time: 20 minutes

Ingredients:

- 5 ounces baby spinach, coarsely chopped
- 8 ounces whole-wheat spaghetti
- ½ cup slivered oil-packed sun-dried tomatoes, plus 1 tablespoon oil from the jar
- ½ cup halved and thinly sliced onion
- 3 cloves garlic, minced
- 1/4 teaspoon crushed red pepper
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- ½ teaspoon ground pepper
- 1 cup low-sodium vegetable or chicken broth
- ½ cup sour cream
- ¼ cup grated Parmesan cheese
- 1 tablespoon unsalted butter

Directions:

Section 1:

- Place the spinach in a colander in the sink.
- Bring a large saucepan of water to a boil over high heat (when water boils, it has bubbles coming and popping).
- Once water has boiled, add spaghetti and cook according to package instructions.
- Drain the spaghetti over the spinach and toss to wilt the spinach.

Section 2:

- Heat sun dried tomato oil in a large skillet over medium heat.
- Add the onions and sun dried tomatoes.
- Then cook, stirring until it's soft (about 3-4 minutes).
- Now, add garlic, crushed red pepper, and salt and pepper cooking and stirring for about one minute.
- Now increase the heat to medium-high and add the broth (veggie or chicken your choice).
- Cook and stir until liquid is reduced by about half (about 2 minutes).
- In another bowl, stir sour cream, parmesan and butter. .
- Add in spaghetti and fold the mixture to coat well!

Cinnamon Cupcakes

Servings: 12 cupcakes

Ingredients:

- 1 1/4 cups of all purpose flour
- 1 1/4 tsp of baking powder
- ½ tsp of salt
- 1 stick or ½ cup of unsalted butter (if you use salted butter, skip the salt)
- ³/₄ cup of granulated sugar
- 2 large eggs
- 2 tsp of vanilla extract
- ½ cup of room temperature buttermilk (To make buttermilk, simply take ¼ cup of curd and ¼ cup of water and mix those together)/ (The measurements of the DIY buttermilk are according to the recipe).
- Cinnamon (depending on your taste, put a little or a lot)

- Preheat your oven to 350°F.
- First in a mixing bowl, combine the flour, baking powder, and salt.
- Whisk those and set it aside.
- In another large mixing bowl, cream together the butter and sugar. Mix it until it is fluffy.
- Next add the eggs. Add one and mix then add the second egg.
- After mixing the eggs add the extract.
- Finally when all the wet ingredients are creamed together, add flour in THIRDS alternating with the buttermilk. Once your batter is batter, add in the cinnamon. (You can put in little or a lot depending on your taste.)
- Now put it into cupcake pans which are filled with cupcake liners.
- Bake for 20 minutes or until a toothpick comes out clean. Let the cupcakes cool and now we'll make frosting.

Section 2:

Frosting:

- 1 stick of unsalted butter
- 3 cups of powdered sugar
- ¼ cup of milk
- 1 tsp vanilla extract

Directions:

- In a medium bowl, use an electric mixer to beat the butter until smooth and light.
- Beat in the sugar, milk, and vanilla until whipped, fluffy and creamy.
- Now pipe on the cupcakes and dust the top with cinnamon and add cinnamon sticks (optional).






