

SCHOOL DISTRICTS OF GREENWOOD & LOYAL CONTINUE TO WORK TOGETHER

Greetings Greenwood Families! Spring is a busy time of year for our students and staff. Important work is yet to be completed to finish this school year strong and to build the start of the coming year!

At the high school, students have started the scheduling process for the 2023-2024 school year by making class requests. Students will be looking at courses that are required for graduation as well as the electives that help broaden their experiences and give our students exposure to different fields of study. This year, we have a handful of students that are working through virtual courses offered through RVA, Start College Now and Early College Credit Programs that give them experiences with coursework tied to future occupation interests. We have a number of seniors that are taking advantage of our School to Work, Youth Apprenticeship, and Senior Privilege programs to gain valuable work experiences as they prepare for their futures. I am so proud of their commitment to learning!

The School District of Greenwood and Loyal continue to work together to maximize resources for all of our students. We have aligned our school calendars and bell schedules to allow opportunities for expanded course offerings across districts. Both districts have agreed to a middle



school baseball cooperative program that will help build a stronger program. We now have a number of athletic co-ops, creating a need to share an identity for these programs while also maintaining our own identity. We asked our middle and high school students for suggestions about a shared mascot for our co-op teams. From those suggestions, the mascot options were narrowed to the three most popular. They were the Eagles, Patriots, and Wolves. The middle and high school students were asked to vote for one, and in a landslide, the Wolves was the winner! Again, this will be the mascot for our shared teams only. We will use the colors of gray, white, and black, with highlights of red. Our partnership with Loyal is growing stronger and the collaboration is really putting both school districts in a better position to provide higher quality academic and co-curricular programs for our students!

Weather has been a challenge so far this year. Although Spring is approaching, we are still not in the clear from inclement weather. Decisions for any make-up time will be made in the coming weeks. Our district has a robust school calendar, allowing extra time to meet the required hours of instruction set by the Department of Public Instruction.

We are close to that limit and the importance in learning and the time needed to meet learning targets is valuable. I certainly hope there are not any more inclement weather days, but the safety of our students and staff will guide those decisions.

SCHOOL CLOSINGS MAY LEAD TO MAKE-UP DAYS

This winter has definitely brought some crazy weather, causing multiple days of closing the district down. To date, we have had seven inclement weather days. Fortunately, our school calendar and bell schedule allow us great flexibility in meeting the instructional minute requirements set forth by the Department of Public Instruction. However, we are extremely close to that limit due to the amount of cancellations.

Some have asked about virtual learning as you may have seen various districts list their snow days as virtual learning days. For the most part, these virtual learning days are used because district calendars do not have the flexibility to absorb a number of closed school days. The learning that happens during these virtual learning days does not compare to the rigorous learning that takes place face to face, thus, virtual learning is a tool used to meet required minutes. The School District of Greenwood is not prepared for robust and rigorous virtual learning. This was made clear during Covid times! We have a large percentage of families that do not have adequate internet access, especially in the midst of winter weather, to sustain connections needed for tools such as Zoom and Google Meet.

Finally, please know that the safety and security of our students and staff is our first responsibility. We don't take the responsibility of canceling school lightly. Student learning is always a priority and we need to ensure our staff and students have adequate time for rigorous learning.



SCIENCE NEWS

The Physics class just finished competing in the annual Purdue University Bridge Bust Competition where they competed with 10 other

schools to design and build a bridge to stand a test of weight. Contestants are given a set amount of materials and specific dimension parameters to design and build a bridge. Bridges are then torture tested to see which ones will support the most weight in the center span. They placed favorable among the schools. They also gave a virtual presentation on their research and development of the bridge and were also judged in an aesthetics category.

The Anatomy & Physiology class visited UW-Stout where they participated in the Cadaver Lab experience and explored the parts of the human body on a real cadaver. They also participated in an experiment in the electrophysiology/psychology

activity.

The Science Club recently traveled to Duluth, Minnesota, where they visited the Great Lakes Aquarium facility. Here they participated in a limnology class and they learned about seasonal lake temperature stratification, trophic status, diel vertical migration of microflora and micro fauna and the effects through the food chain. They also heard a presentation by Dr. Joel Hoffman, a nationally recognized research scientist with the Environmental Protection Agency, Duluth office, who spoke about the status of exotic species in the Great Lakes and the use of cutting-edge DNA based research to identify new exotic species.

In Math, we've been working really hard to memorize doubles facts, decade numbers, and ten sticks. We have used this newly acquired knowledge to add, subtract, and represent numbers up to 100. Now we are onto adding 1 digit and 2 digit numbers.

2ND GRADE NEWS

MRS. DORWALDT & MS. JACOBY

Triangles, pentagons, squares, rectangles, quadrilaterals, and rectangular prisms. The second graders started off the year learning about shapes and their attributes. They learned the number of angles 2 dimensional shapes have and the number of faces 3 dimensional shapes like a cube have. The students have also been measuring the side lengths of geometric figures with centimeters and longer lengths with meters. In math the students also discovered something new to them "line plots". The students used line plots to visually display data.

During the second grade writing workshop time the students are writing nonfiction books about topics they are experts at. The students found that they have a lot of expertise. They know a lot about horses, how to care for cats, gaming, wrestling, how to make pizza, gymnastics, and more. The second graders are also continuing to learn how to write the letters of the alphabet in cursive. They are proving to be very neat cursive writers. The students really enjoy writing in cursive.

3RD GRADE NEWS

MS. HODOWANIC & MRS. HORVATH

It is hard to believe it is March! In math, the 3rd graders continue to work on mastering their multiplication and division facts. They have flown through multi-digit addition and subtraction and are working with fractions, time, measurement, graphing, and area/ perimeter. In reading and writing, the 3rd graders have finished up their research on weather, where they read through informational texts to research a question related to their weather phenomenon, completed notes on a graphic organizer, and wrote informational paragraphs using their research, including an illustration, diagram, or photo to support it. They displayed their research at Literacy night, compiled it into their own informational book, and they even recorded their own

weather report! They are currently reading and learning about traditional tales, including fairy tales, folktales, legends, and more!

4TH GRADE NEWS MRS. KOLANO

We are keeping warm in class by working hard in writing our own informational book. Students each researched a topic within our Animal Adaptations unit to become an expert o n their animal of choosing. Students will continue to work on their own informational books. Along the way, we learned about the different tiers of vocabulary, main ideas, finding details, and how to cite our sources. In math, we are currently finishing our Unit in division and moving onto studying how to solve different kinds of word problems and learning the properties of math. Our social studies unit we are currently learning about the native people that lived in Wisconsin for thousands of years. Our science unit is talking about how animals survive in their ecosystem. Students have become quite the experts on animals, especially since they have researched an animal for their informational book.

5TH GRADE NEWS

MS. KLEIN & MRS. JOHNSON

It's hard to believe we are over halfway through our school year. The Fifth Graders have been working hard learning some rigorous material this quarter! In reading (which is combined with science), the students have been working to become experts on an ecosystem through researching informational text. Each student has chosen an ecosystem and are collecting research to learn everything they can about their ecosystem. Through this unit, they are learning about the features of informational text, how to find main ideas and supporting details, and especially how to prove their opinions with text evidence. They are working hard at learning to write high quality constructed response essays that prove their

thinking. By the end of this unit, each student will have written their own informational book about their ecosystem.

Another big goal of ours is independently reading in multiple genres. Being widely read is essential to success in school and in the career world. Reading books from many genres helps us build the academic and technical vocabulary needed in high school and beyond. We continue to strive to read independently for at least 30 minutes in class and 30 minutes at home. It has been proven that the more time children spend engrossed in books, the higher their academic achievement. Many of our classmates have read more than 300 steps (75 hours) of reading this year! What an amazing accomplishment!

In math, we have been working hard on everything fractions: adding, subtracting, comparing, multiplying and now dividing! It was a challenging ride but we are learning that with proper practice and careful work, anything can become easier! We are now working on understanding the multiplication of whole numbers and decimals.

In this next semester, we will continue to raise our expectations in all areas to get us ready for the Forward Exam at the end of March and into April.

6TH GRADE NEWS

MR. MOSELEY & MS. SCHOENFUSS

The sixth graders are learning about finding the area of various shapes in math class during the second quarter. We have had discussions about applying this skill to complete house improvement projects such as replacing carpet and knowing how much it will cost based on square footage. We currently are studying ratios and rates such as miles per gallon or cost per pound. In science class we are learning about ecosystems and biomes and all the factors that impact the animals and plants that live there. These factors include hunting pressure, disease, and amount of precipitation. In Social Studies the sixth graders are completing their lesson on Ancient Rome. They have been working on becoming experts on the history of the Roman Empire and what led to its downfall. Next, they will be starting a new lesson on Ancient America. In ELA the sixth araders have been working hard on their American Revolution projects. They have also been working on their writing skills through the process of writing constructed responses based on American Revolution texts, as well as completing different organizational graphs.





How do I refer a student for services? Your guidance counselor and school psychologist have referral forms that can be completed and sent to our scheduling team.

What to consider when making a referral? I work with students with a wide range of concerns, including life changes, stressful home life, withdrawn from school or activities, anxiety, students who put unnecessary pressure on themselves, unusual behavior for

development, etc. If you are questioning if a student is appropriate for a referral, please reach out to me and we can discuss whether a referral is appropriate.

Is there any follow up after a referral? Our goals is to work in coordination with school staff to help the student be successful. Like traditional outpatient counseling, information shared during appointments is confidential; however, student and/or guardian can sign a release of information for us to be able to communicate openly. We do ask for teacher feedback through assessment and teachers can come in for consultation and follow up related to a student.

When are you available to consult? I have time built into my schedule for consultation at the end of the school day and on Friday's. Additional, times can be arranged on an individual basis, as needed. The best way to arrange a consultation is to call me directly. My contact information is below.
