WHY DOES THIS MATTER TO US?

- According to the CDC, fentanyl is involved in more deaths of Americans under 50 than any other cause of death, including heart disease, cancer, and all other accidents.
- Fentanyl is an incredibly potent opioid, and takes extreme medical precison to dose. Illicit fentanyl is not properly dosed, and usually isn't dispersed evenly throughout batches, meaning one bad pill can be fatal.
- Just 2 milligrams of fentanyl can be lethal, and on March 11, 2024 the OCSO released details of two seperate fentanyl related arrests in which they found eight grams of fentanyl, methamphetamine residue, and marijuana residue.
