WORLD CANCER DAY

MARTIN LUTHER KING JR DAY


The third Monday of January is Martin Luther King, Jr. Day, which celebrates the life and contributions of the civil rights activist. King was a Baptist minister who supported using nonviolent approaches to end racial segregation and to promote equality for all.

Possibly the greatest significant achievement of Dr. King's life came in 1963 when he led more than 200,000 people to the Lincoln Memorial. Dr. King, together with representatives from labor unions, civil rights organizations, and religious organizations, planned the march to demand economic and civil rights for African Americans. There Dr. King delivered his famous "I Have a Dream" speech, demanding an end to racism. The Civil Rights Act, which prohibited discrimination based on race, color, religion, sex, or national origin, was passed with the march's assistance.

In 1964 following years of remarkable achievements and triumphs, Dr. King received a Nobel Prize. Getting the medal proved that the best way to achieve equality and peace was via nonviolence. Dr. King became the youngest recipient of the Nobel Peace Prize in history at the age of 35. He contributed his award money to support the Civil Rights Movement.

Dr. King was in Tennessee supporting a strike by sanitation workers when he was assassinated. Dr. King was shot at the Lorraine Motel at 6:05 p.m. on Thursday, April 4, 1968. After being taken to a hospital, he passed away in an hour. On April 7, President Lyndon Johnson declared a national day of mourning. Over 100,000 people attended King's funeral in Atlanta two days later.

ACADEMICS



ACT/SAT

The ACT/SAT are exams that most colleges and universities use for admission into their institution. The purpose of these entrance exams is to test for college readiness and provide colleges with a common data point that will help decide on admission when the scores are being compared with other applicants. High schools will provide students with the test for free the first time, but after that, it does cost money. The SAT costs \$64.50 with the writing section, and without the writing section, the SAT costs \$47.50. The ACT costs \$67.50 with the writing section and \$50.50 without the writing section.


Both tests are meant for 11th and 12th graders and are only offered on certain dates throughout the school year. Many colleges don't require these entrance exams anymore, but it helps applicants stand out if they can provide the college admissions team with a good score. The SAT/ACT scores are also big factor in awarding merit scholarships and awards, so it is important to try your best. This year's ACT test will be given on Tuesday, February 27th for all juniors, and the SAT will be given on March 5th. The two tests are very different and knowing these differences will allow you to select the test that best matches your academic and career goals.

AP LANG

Ms. McAfee is the teacher of AP English Language and Composition at Blacksburg High School this year. This course drives the expansion and revision of evidence-based critical and argumentative writing, the rhetorical analysis of nonfiction texts, and the selections writers make as they write. Students learn to support arguments by analyzing and compiling evidence from various sources. An AP English Language and Composition course develops reading and writing skills that students need for future courses. Curiosity, responsiveness, and critical thinking are what students need to be guided through this course.

The framework this course includes is big ideas, enduring understandings, and course skills. Since this course is an AP course, there are high expectations; however, it is a class that can earn you college credit if you pass the AP exam, and it will prepare you for the next step into college. If this sounds interesting to you, make sure to sign up for it next year.

MATH 110

This semester, one of our own will be teaching a new college course at Blacksburg High School. Math teacher Mrs. Haynes has been granted permission to teach Math 110 to students after putting in a lot of hard work and determination. Blacksburg High School offers other college classes like ENG 101 and 102, COL 103, and PSY 201, but a math course has never been offered. Mrs. Haynes believed that Blacksburg High students should be able to take the subject at their own school.

Thanks to the additional college and high school credit as well as the new knowledge, this course is a fantastic way to advance in future math courses. This 15-week course began on January 8 and ends on April 25. As a result, it ends about a month earlier than other high school courses. Tuesdays and Thursdays are when the class meets, but you are welcome to come any other day of the week to make up missed work and receive additional assistance.

There isn't as much work as in a typical high school course because there are days in between lessons to finish assignments and there are only two lessons a week. Complex numbers, quadratic equations, graphs and functions, rational and polynomial functions, exponential and logarithmic functions, systems of linear equations and inequalities, matrices, and determinants are among the topics covered in the course. The class is open to students who have completed their math course requirements or who need to take one more math course. TRIO TALENT SEARCH

The TRIO Talent Search Program is a federally funded program that promotes college access to working-class families who would otherwise not have access to certain services. Services offered are those that prepare a student for a college education, such as college tours, tutoring services, SAT/ACT fee waivers, college application fee waivers, financial aid workshops, and many more helpful resources.

The only schools that are eligible to join are Blacksburg Middle and High School, Gaffney Middle and High School, Ewing Middle School, and Copeland Academy. To be eligible for the TRIO Talent Search, a student must be enrolled at a participating middle or high school, be a first-generation college student, or currently live in an economically disadvantaged household, which will be determined by TRIO. Applications are available online, through the guidance office, or at the TRIO Talent Search office, located in room 203 of the CAMIT Building on the Cherokee County campus. Once finished, send your application to the Talent Search Program at Spartanburg Community College at the Cherokee Campus, return it to the guidance office, or submit it online. Staff from TRIO will get in touch with you to go over the next steps in the application process and to discuss your eligibility after your application has been submitted. NEW TARDY POLICY

Starting this semester, Blacksburg High School is implementing a new tardy policy for the new semester. This policy came from the Superintendent, Dr. Dana Fall. This policy is similar in ways to the previous policy. However, there have been a few changes. On tardy numbers three and six, students will be given a warning, but on the seventh tardy and so on, students will be given a day of OSS. Every nine weeks, the policy will start over, and a student's tardies will reset and have six chances until they get OSS. The next time the policy resets is March 13th. No parent notes will be accepted for being tardy to school, but doctor notes are still accepted. When asked what the purpose of this change was, Mr. Coggins stated, "We are hoping this will allow it to be easier to understand and also help students not get as many tardies."

WAR AROUND THE WORLD


