




WOMEN'S HISTORY MONTH




MEN'S FORMAL WEAR

THURGOOD MARSHALL

Thurgood Marshall was an American civil rights lawyer and jurist who served as an associate justice of the Supreme Court of the United States from 1967 until 1991. Thurgood Marshall became the first African American to be appointed to a Supreme Court justice position when the Senate approved him on August 30, 1967. He was an attorney who fought for civil rights, leading the NAACP Legal Defense and Educational Fund. Marshall was a prominent figure in the movement to end racial segregation in American public schools. He won 29 of the 32 civil rights cases he argued before the Supreme Court. His biggest accomplishment was being the lead lawyer in the Court's landmark 1954 decision in Brown v. Board of Education, which rejected the separate but equal doctrine and held segregation in public education to be unconstitutional. Marshall convinced the Supreme Court that separate but equal educational facilities were fundamentally unfair and unconstitutional through his persuasive arguments and extensive research.

LENT

Lent, the solemn religious observance observed by Christians around the world, holds profound significance in the liturgical calendar. This calendar is observed by Catholics as a series of seasons and feasts observed in the liturgy over a year. It marks a period of spiritual reflection, repentance, and preparation for the celebration of Easter. The origins of Lent can be traced back to the early Christian Church, where it was initially observed as a period of fasting and penance in preparation for Easter. Over the centuries, Lent evolved into forty days, symbolizing Jesus Christ's forty days of fasting in the wilderness. It traditionally begins on Ash Wednesday and concludes on Holy Saturday, the day before Easter Sunday. Central to the observance of Lent are various practices aimed at deepening one's spiritual experience. Fasting, often in the form of abstaining from meat on Fridays, serves as a reminder of Christ's sacrifice and encourages self-discipline. Many Christians also engage in prayer, attending worship services, reading scripture, and participating in acts of charity to cultivate a spirit of compassion and generosity.



RUBY BRIDGES

Ruby Bridges was an American Civil Rights activist. She was born on September 8, 1954, in Tylertown, Mississippi. When Bridges was little, she attended an all-white elementary school, William Frantz Elementary School, in Louisiana. By being the first African American to attend an all-white school, Bridges helped pave the way for Civil Rights activity in the American South. When attending this school, Ruby faced racism every day. Parents left their kids at home, people threw objects, and she was threatened by many just because she was in attendance. It got so bad that Federal Marshals escorted her to school to keep her safe.

As Ruby grew older, she started to figure out what she wanted to do. In 1999, Bridges set in place The Ruby Bridges Foundation to further tolerate and generate change throughout education. In the year 2000, Ruby Bridges was made an honorary deputy marshal at a ceremony in Washington, DC. Ruby Bridges made significant contributions to the African American community and drastically changed the course of history.

MICHAEL JORDAN

African American basketball player Michael Jordan is regarded as one of the all-time greats in sports history, not only in basketball. On February 17, 1963, James R. Jordan and Deloris Jordan welcomed Michael Jeffrey Jordan into the world.
