BUDGET Q & A . . .

Q: How large is our budget gap? A: \$5,132,654

Q: How was this amount determined? A: This sum was determined by subtracting projected Revenues of \$56,496,099 from projected Expenditures of \$61,628,753 (as of 12/18/23).

Q: What other factors contributed to an increase in Expenditures? A: Loss of enrollment, elimination of ESSER funds, decrease in allotted state aid. These will be further explained by the Business Administrator shortly.

Q: How was the GAP addressed? **A**: The budget GAP was addressed through finding additional revenue streams (such as land sale, increased bank interest) as well as reductions in expenditures— elimination of staff, 10% reduction in supply budgets, reduction of some clubs and activities, elimination of some academic programs, (possible) elimination of athletic busing for HMS.

Q: How was staff impacted? **A**: Staff was impacted across the board—including administration, non-tenured teachers, security, secretaries, custodians and maintenance.

Q: When will fall and winter coaching appointments be announced? A: The May BOE

BUDGET Q & A con't

Q: Will classes have increased enrollment? **A**: Yes, some classes will have more students in the coming year though enrollment shouldn't exceed 28 in any particular class. And many classes will have no increase at all.

Q: Will children with IEP's continue to have their needs met?

A: ABSOLUTELY! 100%

Q: Will we close a school in the future? A: We will NOT be closing a school in September, 2024. The earliest we would close a school would be September, 2025 and that would ONLY happen after a full year of conversation with ALL stakeholders, community surveys, continued enrollment decline and budget challenges. VISIBILITY will be paramount and we will partner with all of you before any decision is made.

Q: If additional state-aid is forthcoming, how much would we receive? A: We would receive \$158,740 (2/3 of the 2024-2025 State Aid Loss) We should know either way by mid-May.

Q: Given these cuts, what is the district likely to "look like" in the coming school year? **A:** Let's take a firsthand look . . .





ARP ESSER

The ARP ESSER funding has the same allowable activities as the ESSER I and ESSER Il funds; however an LEA must reserve not less than 20 percent of its total ARP ESSER allocation to address learning loss through the implementation of evidence-based interventions, such as summer learning or summer enrichment, extended day, comprehensive afterschool programs, or a extended school year programs, and ensure that such interventions respond to students' academic, social, and emotional needs and address the disproportionate impact of COVID-19 on underrepresented student subgroups.

LEAs may use their ARP ESSER funding on the following allowable activities:

- Purchasing supplies to sanitize and clean the facilities
- Purchasing educational technology (including hardware, software, and connectivity) for students
- Planning and implementing activities related to summer learning and supplemental afterschool programs
- Addressing learning loss among students
- Inspection, testing, maintenance, repair, replacement, and upgrade projects to improve the indoor air quality in school facilities



Carbon Monoxide Detectors NJAC 5:70-4.3(a), NJAC 5:70-4.9(d) and NJAC 5:70-4.19

 New Jersey became the sixth state to require schools to install carbon monoxide (CO) alarms in the immediate vicinity of all fuel-burning appliances. Carbon monoxide is an odorless, colorless and tasteless gas that is a product of combustion and the leading cause of accidental poisoning in the U.S.


Although you replace the batteries, carbon monoxide alarms don't last forever. They have a lifetime of 5 to 7 years. After 5 to 7 years, replace the CO alarm completely. The District must replace these units in 2024-2025.

Looking ahead... Solar Energy



HAZLET TOWNSHIP SCHOOL DISTRICT SOLAR PROJECT

- The Hazlet Township Board of Education entered into a Power Purchase Agreement for the provision of solar power. The solar project included roof top solar panels, ground arrays and parking canopies at three schools. Raritan High School has roof top and parking canopies that will produce 809,000 kilowatts of electricity, Hazlet Middle School has rooftop and ground mounted solar systems that will produce 437,000 kilowatts and the Lillian Drive School's parking canopies will produce 93,000 kilowatts for a grand total of almost 1.4 million kilowatts.
- The current 15 year PPA terminates in June 2025. The District is working with necessary partners to extend the Solar Panels to additional District schools decreasing the future cost of energy to the District and continuing with our commitment to sustainability
