



The APS special education family welcomes new special education teacher, Douglas Suplita.



Curriculum, Instruction, & CTE

It is our goal to build a mentoring program within our schools to help our new folks feel welcomed, supported, and successful. Mrs. Karen Cyrus is serving as the New Teacher Mentoring/Family Engagement for 2023-2024.

Each new teacher to our division has been partnered with a school-based mentor teacher, and each school has one teacher who is serving as a Lead Mentor in order to help streamline effective communication of needs, concerns, highlights, and celebrations. Monthly meetings for new teachers to target timely topics of interest are underway.



Family Engagement has multiple goals, and a priority is targeting school attendance across the division. We know that sometimes school attendance and a family's connection to a school are impacted by the needs that are happening in the home. So, supporting families so they can, in turn, support their students' academic success is critical.

Both New Teacher Mentoring and Family Engagement roles are organic in nature—they will grow and develop as the needs arise and develop. While the roles may appear different, in some ways they naturally connect, as our new teachers are very aware they have needs in their classroom, but may not know the community well enough to know how to connect their students to those avenues of support. It is the desire that both our new teachers and our families feel there are arms reaching out to them from our schools who care.

Youth Registered Apprenticeship

Appomattox County High School has been busy exploring different ways to offer work based learning and career exploration opportunities for youth interested in putting their learned skills to use on a job site. Appomattox County High School has partnered with the VA Department of Labor to offer students youth registered apprenticeships. An apprenticeship "combines on-the-job training, provided by the employer that hires the apprentice, with jobrelated instruction in curricula tied to the attainment of national skills standards," according to the U.S. Department of Labor. Apprentices are paid from the beginning of the apprenticeship while working to earn nationally recognized credentials in their respective fields when the apprenticeship is completed.



Gray Peterson was the winner of the Titan Trophy and the Bill Dudley Leadership Award.


Kevin Fitch won the Titan Atlas Highest Index for weightlifting.
