Parshat V'Zot Habracha

Moshe Rabeinu, the G.O.A.T (Greatest of All Time)

Just after Moshe Rabeinu transitioned power to Yehoshua, Moshe completes his mission in life and dies. We are about to roll the credits on the Chamisha Chumshai Torah. With three pesukim left in the Torah, Hashem closes with this: יְלֵא־קָם (Never again did there arise in Israel a prophet like Moses—whom Hashem singled out, face to face.)

We don't know where Moshe Rabeinu is buried, but we do know that Hashem himself buried him. There are many reasons why Hashem did not want the location known. Rav Samson Rafael Hirsh explains that Hashem did not want it to become a sort of shrine that people would flock to and possibly even worship (C'V). Moshe was so humble, that Hashem knew he wouldn't want that. Another reason pointed out in the gemara (Sotah 14a) is that if people were to pray at his kever to repeal the decree of the destruction of the Beit Hamikdash, it would actually work because Moshe would come to the defense of his people!

I imagine that if Moshe Rabeinu had a kever with a matzeva written by Hashem, the posuk above would be written on it. Simply said, Moshe Rabeinu was the "G.O.A.T.". So, my next thought is if Moshe Rabeinu was and is the greatest of all time, why should anyone try to achieve a similar level of greatness? Enter the Rambam (Teshuva 5:2) to tell us that each and every one of us has the potential to be as great as Moshe Rabeinu. We have to remember, Moshe Rabeinu was not perfect, he sinned, just like we do. In fact, we can do something that he can never achieve, we can visit Eretz Yisrael! But yet, he is still the greatest! He is the greatest because he achieved his full potential.

My Rebbi, Rabbi Dovid Orlofsky tells a story that happened after his father was niftar. As the Rabbi in the family, it was his job to write the matzeva for the headstone. He described the challenge of coming up with something he was happy with. As the deadline approached, his family members asked him, "How long does it take to write a headstone?". His response to them, "It takes a lifetime."

What is your potential? What keeps you from reaching it? After 120 will you be the greatest YOU of all time? With work, dedication and learning from our (and other's) mistakes, you undoubtedly will be.

This week we learned about the ארבעת המינים (Arba'ah Minim) and the significance to the chag. We now know:

- The Etrog reminds us of our hearts and reminds us that we should be kind and caring.
- The Lulav is tall and straight and reminds us of our spine. We need a healthy spine to be able to walk, run and play and do mitzvot.
- The Hadassim are shaped like our eyes and we need our eyes for seeing. We use our eyes to look for an opportunity to perform a mitzvah.
- 4. The Aravot are shaped like the mouth we must always remember the power of the spoken word. We must be careful not to use our words in a wrong way. We want to use our words to make people feel good.

We also discussed the similarities and differences between an *Etrog* and a lemon and we talked about the different "אושפֿזין" that we welcome into the *Succah* each night. We enjoyed making the *Succah* decorations!

After what we hope will be a very enjoyable *Succot*, we will celebrate *Simchat Torah* and the completion of reading the *Torah*. We had a wonderful discussion on what the Torah teaches us and your daughter's thoughts are on the back of the *Simchat Torah* flag we handcrafted. We then look forward to starting the Torah all over again from the beginning – בראשית!

We learned that the Torah teaches us that every person in the world is unique and individual because every person is created בצלם אלוקים. The girls learned that we have a spark of Hashem in all of us and that we have to take care to act in a way that Hashem will always be proud of us. With this in mind we embarked on our "Me" unit. We discussed how we must take care of our bodies and how Hashem made each of us different and yet special. We read the book "But I'm a Little Bird" by Eileen S. Greene, which reinforces this. We also added the ברכה of usual to our daily תפילות www. We will continue with our "Me" unit after the Succot vacation.











Eighth grade has begun their History PowerPoint presentations on Reconstruction after the Civil War!
