

Grass may not be taller than 6" by City Ordinance. Tall grass and/or weeds spreading seeds are declared a nuisance.

HOUSE NUMBERS

Addresses must be clearly visible from the street.

HYDRANTS

Be sure to keep hydrants clear of snow!

NOISE

Lyndhurst Ordinances prohibit noise that disturbs the peace. Noise complaints are given greater consideration before 7am and after 9pm.

PARKING BAN

No parking is permitted on City streets between the hours of 2 a.m. and 6 a.m. or if snowfall exceeds 2".





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Preparing for Winter

As you prepare for the upcoming Winter Season and the Holidays, the Lyndhurst Fire Department has some important notes about safety.

eeping you and your family safe is our Lyndhurst Fire Department's top priority and prevention is key! The winter season brings several safety concerns that can be easily addressed. Potential hazards of carbon monoxide increase exponentially during winter months due to the increased use of furnaces, wood fireplaces, and other carbon monoxide producing appliances. It is important to get your furnace checked by a qualified heating contractor prior to use to ensure the furnace is operating safely and properly. In addition, a qualified chimney sweep should periodically inspect your chimney and fireplace box to ensure that your wood burning fireplace burns cleanly and properly vents through your chimney. Depending on your annual use, the fireplace chimney may need to be cleaned at the beginning of the season as well as mid-season.

Speaking of fireplace fires, the fire department has responded to numerous fires caused by improperly discarded ashes. It is important to clean your fireplace box regularly and ensure your ashes have fully cooled prior to discarding. The ashes should be placed in an approved metal container with a lid that is stored outside away from any combustible materials such as your house, garage, or fence.

Another concern is the use of space heaters. It is estimated that 25,000 fires and 300 deaths are caused by using space heaters every year in the United States. When using a space heater, look for one that










has a tip over safety switch, a thermostat, and some type of protective screen to help prevent burns. Keep combustible items away from the heater and turn the heater off when not in use.

During the holiday season, decorations are great to admire, but they do come with inherent hazards. Any live decorations need to be watered and kept a safe distance from any open flames. Be cautious when using extension cords. Only use a UL approved cord in a safe manner and only for temporary power. Be sure not to overload the extension cord.

Lastly, ensure you have a properly functioning and installed photoelectric smoke detector. A smoke detector should be on every level of your home especially outside your bedrooms. The fire department recommends that carbon monoxide detectors are placed on each floor and have an LED readout of carbon monoxide levels. It is also recommended that the detector has a battery back-up to ensure that it functions even during power outages.

Phones Down - It's the Law!

As of April 4, 2023, it became illegal to use or hold a cell phone or other electronic device in your hand, lap, or other parts of the body while driving on Ohio roads. For the first six months, this new distracted driving law was in effect, law enforcement agencies throughout the state - including the Lyndhurst Police Department - issued warning violations as part of an effort to educate and help motorists adapt to the new law. Effective October 5, 2023, law enforcement began issuing citations for violations of this law.

This new law allows drivers over 18 years old to make or receive phone calls using hands-free technology such as Bluetooth or other integrated systems - speakerphone, earpiece, wireless headset, electronic watch - only as long as they don't hold or support the device or manually enter letters, numbers, or symbols. In most cases, anything more than a single touch or swipe is against the law. If you must physically manipulate your device, you should pull over to a safe location and park your car before handling. Remember, drivers under the age of 18 are still restricted from using their devices in any way, including hands-free features.

With very few exceptions, anything that involves using, holding, or supporting a cell phone or other electronic device while driving is off limits.

Keep in mind - even if you can, that doesn't mean you should. Looking at your cell phone or other electronic device even while stopped at a light can potentially endanger your family, friends, and neighbors. Drivers have a responsibility to watch for people crossing the street or other drivers and bicyclists who haven't yet cleared the intersection. The Lyndhurst Community - residents and the general motoring public alike - are counting on you to pay attention.

Distracted driving is a contributing cause of many accidents in our community. The Lyndhurst Police Department will be proactively enforcing this new law in an effort to reduce these types of crashes and keep our roadways safe for all those who travel them. Please do your part by keeping the phones (or other electronic devices) down while driving. Perhaps turn on the "Do Not Disturb While Driving Mode," or just be a good passenger? For further information, the new distracted driving law can be found in Section 4511.204 of the Ohio Revised Code.

Cybersecurity Awareness - Social Engineering

In today's advanced technology age, the notion of cybersecurity has become as important as looking both ways before crossing the street. Cybersecurity is the protection of computer systems and networks from malicious attacks that may result in unauthorized disclosure of information, theft of, or damage to, hardware, software, or data. It can also serve to prevent the disruption or misdirection of the services that these computer systems provide. As society relies more and more on the "Internet of Things," (computer systems, the internet, wireless networks, Bluetooth, Wi-Fi, and smart devices), it is imperative that we weave cybersecurity awareness into our daily lives.

Social Engineering is when an attacker uses human interactions - social skills - to obtain or compromise information about an organization/individual or their computer systems. Social Engineering is a continuous cycle where an attacker initiates an investigation where they will

identify victims, gather background information (i.e. LinkedIn, Facebook, Instagram, X) and select an attack method (i.e. malware). The attacker will then attempt to "hook" the victim by engaging with them, creating a story, and taking control of the interaction. Once an attacker has gathered enough information about a victim's system, they then implement their chosen attack method, resulting in a disruption of business or siphoning of data. Finally, the attacker will end the interaction, removing all traces of the malware and cover their tracks.

Social Engineering comes in many forms. Some of the most common methods are listed below:

- Phishing (most common)
- Spear Phishing
- Whaling
- Smishing/Vishing
- Baiting
- Piggybacking
- Pretexting
- Honeytraps
- Watering Hole

How to protect yourself from Social Engineering attacks:

- Be suspicious of unsolicited phone calls, visits, or email messages asking about personal, financial, employee, or organizational information.
- Do not send sensitive information over the internet before checking a website's security - use "https" over
- · Install and maintain anti-virus software, firewalls, and email filters.
- · Utilize multi-factor authentication.

What to do if you think you are a victim:

- Immediately change any password(s) that you may have revealed or shared inadvertently.
- · Contact your financial institution(s) if you believe that your accounts have been compromised.
- If you believe sensitive information about your organization was compromised, report to the appropriate personnel.
- · Contact your local authorities as necessary.

Don't think you can be a victim of Social Engineering? Consider this: an attack group launched a social engineering attack that nearly shut down two high profile hospitality chains for close to two weeks. This group gained access to MGM Resorts International by locating an employee on LinkedIn and used the publicly available information to call the help desk and gain access to the employee's account. They were then able to shut down access to ATMs, slot machines, and key card access to guest hotel rooms.

Don't be a victim. Don't allow you or your friends, relatives, or neighbors to be a victim - talk to them about scams. Don't click on unexpected links in emails, pop ups, or text messages. The Amazon related scams will go around during the holidays. **DO NOT SEND crypto-currency or read gift** card numbers to pay for any debt. ... IT IS A SCAM!

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

he South Euclid Lyndhurst Schools continues to experience academic, co-curricular, and student support successes at all grade levels, and for this edition, the district shares some of these important updates across various aspects of campus life.

The South Euclid Lyndhurst Schools has made significant gains in the latest State of Ohio Report Card, at both the district and building levels, continuing growth, and achievement. The information presented below summarizes what the Ohio Department of

Education shared publicly earlier this fall.

The SEL School's overall district rating has been enhanced to 3.5 Stars of a total of 5 possible, improving our overall standing spanning the last several years. At the building levels, impressive achievements have occurred as well. Adrian Elementary School improved its overall building rating to 4.5 stars and improved its Gap Closing metric to 5 stars. Adrian's early literacy scores were 3 out of 5 stars, and its overall Achievement score improved to 4 stars. Sunview Elementary School improved its overall rating to 4.5 stars out of 5 possible and made significant improvement in the Achievement metric. Sunview's early literacy score was 3 stars, and its Gap Closing remained a perfect 5 out of 5 stars. Rowland Elementary School performed extremely well on many of the state metrics as well, earning 3 stars overall, and a Gap Closing metric score of 4 stars out of 5 total.

Greenview Intermediate School elevated its overall rating to 3.5 stars, while Memorial Junior High School earned an overall rating of 3 stars out of 5 total and kept significant emphasis on a strong and consistent Gap Closing score of 4 stars. Charles F. Brush High School showed growth in a number of metrics, including the elevation of its overall building rating of 3.5 stars! Major strides occurred in the Progress metric, which jumped two points to 4 stars. Brush High School improved in the Graduation Rate metric through the continued implementation of Ohio Means Jobs, internships, and other options for students

to meet the four-year graduation requirements. Brush also found success through use of the Rise Up program, implemented last year, and will continue to be used this year. The district continues to benchmark through a tool called **Edmentum**, as an interventions predicter for students.

The results of the State Report Card show the hard work of our dedicated staff members, the diligence of our students, and the support from our families. Thank you all for your tireless efforts for academic success!

Safety and security continue to be an important priority for the SEL Schools, and several initiatives are underway which demonstrate this commitment. A town hall forum on safety and security recently took place hosted by Assistant Superintendents Dom Kaple and Melissa Thompson, in partnership with the South Euclid Lyndhurst Parent Teacher Association, to share an update of recent security enhancements and those which are currently in progress. Assistant Superintendent Kaple summarized such measures as the installation of new locks on the doors throughout the buildings once closed, ID badge entries, and other classroom lockdown measures. The South Euclid Lyndhurst Schools also shared our encouragement for the community to use our Safer Ohio Schools Tip Line to report any safety, security, or bullying concerns at 844-723-3764. Assistant Superintendent Ms. Thompson outlined the importance of having a positive school climate with shared expectations between staff, students, and parents, and went on to update participants about upcoming programs focused on kindness and mental health. She discussed the importance of reporting any bullying behavior or unkindness that takes place among the student body to staff members, who will then provide them with the proper forms, which are turned into the building principal for an investigation to begin. Bullying incidents can also be reported to the Safer Schools Ohio Tip Line.

Strong academic performance, while keeping students and staff safe, has been an early focus for the SEL Schools during the 2023-2024 school year. Thank you, always, for your ongoing support.



ommunity Partnership on Aging is assisting the City of Lyndhurst in the administration of the **2023-2024 Snow Plow program** for older residents in the city. This program offers eligible homeowners a partial reimbursement toward their signed and paid 2023-2024 snow plow contract. Actual reimbursement amount will be determined by the number of approved applicants to the program.

To be eligible for reimbursement, you must be a resident of Lyndhurst age 70 or older, own your home in which you permanently reside, and meet income guidelines (monthly income is \$2,248 or less for a single person household, \$3,040 or less for a two-person household). An applicant is not eligible if there is a planned absence of more than one week during the winter months (Between November 15, 2023 and April 15, 2024) or if there is an able-bodied person living in the home. Once your application has been approved, you will be given instructions on how to submit your paid snowplow invoice to receive partial reimbursement.

If you believe you meet the requirements and are interested in applying for this assistance, please contact CPA at (216) 291-3902 and we will send you the initial application that will start the process.

In early 2024, we are offering the following School of Tech classes:

Android Smart Phone class starts on January 5 for four weeks and will be held at 1 p.m. at the South Euclid-Lyndhurst branch of the Cuyahoga County Public Library.

- A second session of the Android Smart Phone class starts on February 2 for four weeks and will be held at the Mayfield Heights branch of the Cuyahoga County Public Library (time TBD).
- CPA Connects 2 U starts on March 1 for eight weeks. This class is for those who do not own a device (tablet. laptop or desktop computer), have a monthly income of \$2,187 for one person, and live in one of the six CPA cities. Upon completion of the class, graduates receive a new tablet and one year internet service.

Spotted Lanternfly: It's Coming or It May Already Be Here

To Lyndhurst residents: This is the spotted lanternfly (Lycorma delicatula) that has been found in the eastern suburbs of Cuyahoga County in staggering numbers! This pest does not bite or sting!

The Spotted Lanternfly (Lycorma delicatula) is native to China and was first detected in Pennsylvania in September 2014. The spotted lanternfly feeds on a wide range of fruit, ornamental and woody trees, with tree-of-heaven being one of the preferred hosts. Spotted lanternflies are invasive and can be spread long distances by people who move infested material or items containing egg masses.

Cuyahoga County is currently under quarantine, as it was first discovered on the east side near RTA tracks. It is a flying insect and, due to our prevailing winds out of the north and east, it has since spread to our eastern suburbs.

What to Do: Should you find either the adults (see top photo), egg cases or nymphs (see bottom photos), you will need to be prepared to eradicate them! If you find an egg case, the use of a stiff wire brush will destroy the eggs within and should be disposed of into a container of rubbing alcohol. Nymphs (four instars throughout the season) can be shaken or rubbed off the trees (wear gloves) and should be immediately squashed with a well-placed foot! At this time of year, the use of insecticides would be of little use as the adults fly and the eggs are protected within the case.

If you discover an infestation, call a professional tree care company, or your state agricultural agents if you live in a quarantine area (https://agri.ohio.gov/divisions/plant-health/invasive-pests/invasive-insects/slf).





Debt Management

Fifteen year bonds were issued for the Fire Building Improvement Project. As pledged, the City paid down additional principal totaling \$1,000,000 to date; thereby reducing interest charges by \$284,004. This is indicative of strong economic and financial character. Annual debt payments for the City include both short and long term principal and interest totaling \$1,714,436 for the year. The City issued \$1,200,000 in short term Street Improvement notes to be paid in full in 2022. State statutes limit the amount of unvoted general obligation debt the City may issue. At December 31, 2022 the City's outstanding debt was well below the legal limit.



Property Tax

Property Tax in Lyndhurst is administered by Cuyahoga County. The County Fiscal Officer assesses your property on 35% of the appraised market value. This value is updated every three years based on the average sale price of properties sold in the area. Every six years, your property is reappraised by the County. The most recent triennial updated values in 2021 and resulted in an 18% increase to be collected in 2022. The next reappraisal is scheduled for the year 2024. For each one dollar (\$1.00) in property tax paid the County distributed those funds as follows: (See Figure 2.)

The City operates on 10.45 cents for each dollar paid in property tax and provides most of the government services to you including police, fire, EMS, parks, pool and splash park, cultural facilities, street maintenance and repairs, tree maintenance, leaf collection, rubbish collection, public health, and neighborhood preservation.



Revenues

General revenues include both income and property taxes. Income tax is the major source of revenue to the City and accounted for 42.5% of total revenues. Income tax increased 11.1% as a result of a pandemic surge in remote work from home. The state of emergency was lifted in June 2021 and total revenues decreased 2.5% that same year. The most significant change was attributed to programs. Programs include local, state and federal grants. In 2022, the City received more than \$1.4 million in unearned Covid related federal and county funded grants.



Where the Money Goes ...

Expenditures

Expenditures incurred by the City of Lyndhurst, to provide all City services, are shown by function. (See Figure 3.) Police, Fire and EMS are the most important and represent the highest cost of services. The Police Department consists of 29 sworn in full-time officers and the Fire Department consists of 26 full-time firefighter paramedics. In 2022, the Program Expenses for Security of Persons and Property significantly increased as a result of two factors "net pension liability" and "Covid" related federal funding. Net pension liability represents the City's proportionate share of each pension plan's collective actuarial present value. The City has no control over the terms or manner in which the pensions are financed. Covid related federal funding was used in 2022 to support provisions for Safety Services post pandemic. General Government represents numerous Municipal Departments and Court. Basic Utility includes the cost of rubbish, recycling, trees and sewers. Transportation is the cost for streets, sidewalks and snow removal. These costs remained stable as capital improvements were completed for street and sidewalk programs in 2022. Community Environment is the cost to assist in preserving our neighborhoods comprised of planning, building and housing. Leisure Time Activity are the costs associated with community and aquatic centers.

lease do not place any loose leaves at the curb after December 1 as we cannot guarantee the ability to vacuum loose leaves. Once the weather dictates a switch over to snow and ice control equipment all leaves must be placed into brown paper lawn and leaf bags or designated yard waste containers or consider mulching directly in your lawn. ("Yard Waste Only" stickers for containers can be picked up at the Service Department office during working hours).

Our Weekend Rubbish Program's last weekend is November 18/19, we will resume in spring 2024. If you are in need of Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) disposal before next spring's weekend service, bring your HHW to the Service Department garage in the sealed original containers. Stop by our office Monday through Friday from 7 a.m. to 3 p.m. and we will assist you.

Snow is on the way! We would like to remind you that it is recommended you make sure your plow operator is registered with the City and that it is prohibited to park on the street when snow accumulations exceed 2 inches. In order to properly clear the roadway from snow and ice all parked vehicles must be off the roadway. Placing snow into the roadway or across sidewalks is also prohibited, please remind your contracted snowplow drivers. We receive a high volume of calls during the winter because sidewalks are covered putting pedestrians at risk. Your continued cooperation is needed and much appreciated!

From our Court

SLOW DOWN!

During the pandemic, area police departments greatly reduced traffic enforcement in an effort to minimize interaction with the public and slow the spread of the coronavirus. However, area police departments have been gradually increasing traffic enforcement and the number of traffic citations filed with the Court in 2023 are nearing pre-pandemic numbers. While I truly enjoy interacting with my fellow Hillcrest area residents, I prefer to do so outside of the courthouse. So please watch your speed!

In addition to normal traffic enforcement, Mayfield Village and Gates Mills are utilizing traffic cameras to assist in speed enforcement. Mayfield Village started its traffic camera program in January 2022. Mayfield Village utilizes traffic cameras on its stretch of I-271 during morning and afternoon rush hours, Monday through Friday. Fines start at \$150 (up to 19 mph over the speed limit) and go as high as \$300 (driving 30 mph or more above the speed limit).

The Village of Gates Mills initiated its traffic camera program this August. Gates Mills is utilizing stationary cameras eastbound and westbound on Mayfield Road. The eastbound camera is located east of West Hill Drive as drivers approach Chagrin River Road. The westbound camera is located just east of Fox Hill Drive as drivers approach Chagrin River Road. Signs are posted notifying drivers that photo enforcement is in use. Fines start at \$135 (between 10 and 19 mph over the speed limit) and go as high as \$300 (driving 30 mph or more above the speed limit). Gates Mills operates its traffic camera program 24 hours a day.

Traffic enforcement speed cameras are permitted in the State of Ohio. If you receive a traffic camera ticket issued by either Gates Mills or Mayfield Village, you can contest the ticket through the Lyndhurst Municipal Court. Check the back of the ticket or the Court's website (www. lyndhurstmunicipalcourt.org) for directions on how to contest your ticket. No one likes receiving a traffic camera ticket in the mail, so please be mindful of your speed.

PROTECT YOURSELF FROM FRAUD

Local police departments have been investigating an increasing number of fraud complaints related to checks that were altered after being mailed. Individuals are realizing that the check they mailed to pay a utility bill, for example, was altered by changing the payee and the amount on the check. While these victims are typically made whole by their bank, the ordeal is stressful, frustrating, and time consuming. Please consider taking steps to protect yourself from this type of fraud by paying more bills electronically and closely monitoring your bank accounts.

LOCK YOUR CAR DOORS

Local police departments continue to investigate reports of stolen cars and car break-ins right from the owner's driveway during the overnight hours. Please lock your vehicles and keep nothing of value in them.
