Every day, children walk through the doors of Baltimore's schools filled with talent, dreams, and enormous potential. It is City Schools' responsibility to make sure that **ALL children** have a safe place to go every day, where they can learn about the world around them with adults who will engage, enrich, and inspire their experiences and passions. Enrollment in Pre-K/K is the foundation towards ensuring that our children are prepared for success!

To inspire our next generation of leaders, City Schools' strategic direction is prioritizing three areas:

- ► ACADEMICS A well-rounded education across all academic disciplines with a strong focus on foundational literacy & math to equip students with the building blocks to succeed as they advance through City Schools and beyond.
- ▶ WHOLENESS Student growth and enrichment with reach outside of the traditional classroom setting, City Schools students participate in a wide variety of programs to expand their minds, change their perspectives, and enhance their overall school experience.
- ▶ **LEADERSHIP** City Schools honors and values the voice of its students by actively engaging in meaningful, two-way conversations and providing opportunities for students to drive positive change.



DID YOU KNOW STUDENTS LEARN **THROUGH PLAY?**



- In the math center, students will understand numbers, ways of representing numbers. and relationships between numbers. They will recognize, replicate patterns, and make predictions about patterns in the environment. Also, recognize, name, build, draw, describe, compare, and sort two/three dimensional shapes.
- In the science center, students will explore the physical properties of the world by observing and manipulating common objects and materials in the environment. Also, they will explore living things, their life cycles, and their habits.
- In the library center, students will develop pre-reading skills, increase vocabulary, develop storytelling abilities, enhance selfesteem, and strengthen eye muscles by following pictures and words in a book.
- In the computer lab, students will develop team building skills, learn the parts of a computer, develop perseverance seeing a program or task through to completion, develop early reading skills relating word labels to graphics. Also, they will develop and refine small muscle skills clicking the mouse, using the keyboard, and moving the cursor.
- In the block center, students will learn to share and cooperate with others, demonstrate pride in accomplishments and a positive self-concept

- by talking about what they have created. Also, develop problem solving and math skills by comparing sizes, shapes, counting materials, and sequencing blocks from short to tall, and bridging a bridge. Students will develop eyehand coordination by placing blocks in desired patterns, and use large and small muscle skills for grasping, lifting, placing, and balancing blocks.
- ▶ Table games are a good way for students to gain an understanding of math concepts such as counting, sequencing, seriation, and classification; develop cognitive skills such as colors, shapes, size, numbers, space, and quantity. Also, learn to classify, sort, and compare objects by color, size, texture, and shape.
- Music in the classroom allows students to cooperate with others when singing, marching, and playing instruments. Students develop large motor skills by moving to music and participating in other creative movement activities; improve small motor skills through finger plays as well. Students improve balance, coordination, and rhythm through dancing and other movement activities.
- During art, students have the ability to enhance creativity, develop an understanding of cause and effect, observe changes when colors are mixed, and develop small muscle skills





REGISTRATION INFORMATION

Introducing City Schools' NEW Centralized Enrollment Processes for Pre-Kindergarten and Kindergarten.



Congratulations! It's time to enroll your children for pre-K or kindergarten! Children who turn four (4) or five (5) by September 1, 2025 are eligible to apply for schools. This year, families will be able to apply online for up to three (3) traditional, neighborhood schools and receive their placement offer via email.

What are the benefits of this new centralized process?

- ▶ By applying online, families will save time by not having to visit multiple schools.
- ▶ Families do not need to rush to schools on the first day to register their children out of fear that a preferred school will fill up.
- ▶ All families are able to apply and receive their offers at the same time, regardless of priority group status.
- ▶ Offers will still be made based upon MSDE and Board-approved criteria.
- ▶ The process will use a trusted algorithm to make placement decisions— removing any user error that may happen.

Every school in the district has an online school profile that includes contact information, programs, achievement data, pictures, and more. Families can search for schools by location or program availability.

Student Enrollment Management System (SEMS) Parent Portal

Parents and guardians can access the online pre-K and Kindergarten application by visiting www.baltimorecityschools.org/SEMS to set up your Parent Portal Account – this process is quick and easy but will require a valid email address.

Note: Families that participated in this year's middle or high school choice process can use their existing accounts when applying for pre-K or kindergarten.

Completing the Pre-Kindergarten or Kindergarten Application
Parents and guardians can complete the application through the
SEMS Parent Portal by following these steps:

- Create an account.
- 2 Add your students: a) Families of current City Schools students will need to link to their children by clicking on the "Link to my child" button. Note: If you have more than one child enrolled in a City School, you will only need to complete the process once to link to all children. Linking is necessary to ensure your student receives sibling priority, while also minimizing the data entry needed. b) Families of students not currently enrolled in a City School can add a child to their dashboard by clicking on the "Add a child" button.
- 3 If your pre-K or kindergarten applicant does not show up on your dashboard, you will need to add them using the "Add a Child" button.
- 4 Beside your students that are eligible to apply, you will see a link that says, "Apply for Pre-Kindergarten" or "Apply for Kindergarten."
- 5 Enter the necessary information.
- 6 Review your information and submit.

Charter schools will not use the SEMS application. Interested families are encouraged to contact these schools directly for more information about their admission processes and timelines.

No internet access at home? Here are some ways to complete the pre-K and kindergarten application.

Local Library

Visit your local Enoch Pratt Free Library location to access the internet and free Wi-Fi.

School Community

Families are encouraged to visit their neighborhood school communities to utilize school-provided Chromebooks and laptops to complete the pre-K and kindergarten application. Contact the school's enrollment official to learn more about accessibility opportunities for their school's computers.

DOCUMENTS REQUIRED FOR ENROLLMENT

Uploaded Directly to SEMS

- Parent/Guardian photo ID (i.e., passport, driver's license, military ID)
- Child's birth certificate or another governmentissued document (i.e., passport, driver's license, birth registration) verifying your child's identity and birth date
- ≥ 2 proofs of Baltimore City residency dated within the last 60 days (i.e., lease/mortgage statement, utility bill, government correspondence, etc.)
- ≥ 2 proofs of income Pre-k ONLY (i.e., pay stubs, tax return, SNAP letter, cash assistance letter, child support, unemployment, etc.)

Given Directly to School Upon Offer Acceptance

- ▶ Current Immunization Records
- Physical Examination/Maryland Health Inventory
- ▶ Blood Lead Testing Certificate
- ► Individualized Education Program (IEP) or 504 Documents (if applicable)
- ▶ Proof of Custody/Guardianship (if applicable)
- ▶ Medication Plan (if applicable)

Understanding Eligibility for Pre-K

When placing students in pre-K, City Schools considers a family's priority status to enroll children. Although families with age-eligible students are able to submit their applications at the same time, regardless of priority status, a computerized algorithm will make the offer with priority grouping as a consideration factor, in addition to MSDE and Board-approved criteria. Space in pre-K is limited – all families are encouraged to participate and to select up to three schools to increase the chances of your child being placed in one of your desired schools.

PRIORITY 1 CHILDREN

- Are four years old by September 1 –AND–
- Are considered income eligible OR experiencing homelessness OR receive special education services, OR eligible for English language services

PRIORITY 2 CHILDREN

- Are four years old by September 1 BUT–
- Are NOT considered income eligible, NOT experiencing homelessness, NOT receiving special education services, and NOT eligible for English language services

All families are able to apply for pre-K, and receive school placement offers at the same time. *Note: Charter schools have different admission processes and timelines.*

Understanding Income Eligibility

Income eligibility is based upon family size (number of primary household members, including children) and household income. To be eligible for Priority 1 pre-K enrollment, the total annual household income must be less than 300% of the Federal poverty Guidelines. Income includes monthly earnings, Federal Income Tax Return (1040 statement), Current Award letter for Temporary Cash Assistance (TANF) or Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, child support, alimony, Current Approval Letter for W.I.C. or Medical Assistance, food stamps, retirement, Social Security, Proof of Unemployment benefits within last 30 days, Two consecutive pay stubs within the last 30 days. Two (2) proofs of income are required for all pre-kindergarten enrollments, regardless of priority status. Understanding Pre-K Waivers

Children born between **September 2 and September 30, 2021** may apply to begin pre-K one year early if they:

- Qualify as Priority 1 through income eligibility, experiencing homelessness, learning English, or receiving special education services AND
- Demonstrate academic need to warrant an additional year in a pre-K setting

Families who enroll a child using a Pre-K Waiver commit to *two* years in a pre-K setting and will not be eligible to enter kindergarten early. Beginning August 1, 2025, families will be able to download and complete the Pre-K Waiver application from the City School website at www.baltimorecityschools.org/page/pre-k-and-kindergarten-registration. Completed applications and supporting documentation should be emailed to EarlyAdmission@bcps.k12.md.us. The submission deadline for the Pre-K Waiver application is August 15, 2025. Understanding Early Admission Testing

Children who turn 5 or 6 between September 2 and October 15 may apply for early admission to kindergarten or first grade. Beginning March 3, 2025, families will be able to download and complete the Early Admission Testing application form from the website at www.baltimorecityschools.org/page/pre-k-and-kindergarten-registration. Completed applications should be immediately emailed to EarlyAdmission@bcps.k12.md.us along with any supporting documentation. The submission deadline for the Early Admission Testing application form will be April 16, 2025. Please note that testing will not take place until after the 2024–25 school year concludes. Immunizations

All children who attend school must show proof that they have received all state-required immunizations. To find out what immunizations are required to attend pre-k or kindergarten, visit www.baltimorecityschools.org/page/immunizations, or contact your neighborhood school.

Enoch Pratt Free Library: Your Child's First Card

The Enoch Pratt Free Library is a great place to visit with your young child. The library has many programs, services, and resources for families. And, of course, there are lots of books to read together with your child!

When you enroll your child in pre-K or kindergarten, you have the chance to automatically receive a library card, known as the First Card, for your child. This special library card is for children under the age of 6, that can be used to check out children's books from any Enoch Pratt Free Library, and never gets charged late fees.

To receive your child's First Card, make sure to check the "Yes, please give my child a First Card" box on the last page of your Student Enrollment Form. To find your local library branch, visit www.prattlibrary.org/locations or call 410.396.5430.

Judith P. Hoyer Early Learning Hubs (Judy Centers)

Judy Centers provide a central location for early childhood education and family support services for children from birth to kindergarten. They promote school readiness through collaboration with community-based agencies, organizations, and businesses. Most services or assistance a family may need can be provided directly or arranged by the Judy Center on site or nearby, including health care, adult education, identification of special needs and early intervention, childcare, parenting classes, and family literacy.

Get Excited

- Get familiar with your child's bell schedule, uniform colors, and set up a school tour!
- Find other children in your neighborhood and plan playdates.
- Read books about going to school and talk about what makes your child excited.
- Encourage a positive attitude about school.
- · Learn about and join your school's parent committee.

Set Routines

- Follow a bedtime routine to ensure your child is getting enough sleep.
 - Children aged 3 to 5 should be getting 11 to 13 hours of sleep every night!
- · Aim to wake up at the same time every day.
- Make sure your morning routine includes time for getting dressed, eating breakfast, and brushing teeth.
- Be sure to leave home early enough to travel to school and arrive on time.
 - You don't want to miss any learning!

Before the First Day

- Please make sure your school has your child's immunization records, physical examination, and lead certificate.
- Ask the front office about school drop-off and pick-up.
- Share any medical concerns with the school leader and school nurse.
- Talk with your child about their feelings about school.
- Make sure your child knows his or her teacher's name.
 - Use the teacher's name when you are talking with your child at home, so he or she becomes familiar with it.
- Visit your child's school a few times during the summer so that he or she is familiar with the building.
- Say goodbye with a smile before you leave your child. He or she will "read" your emotions. Leave after you, "say see you later!"

Develop Independence

- Be sure your child can dress, zip, button, and snap clothing by him or herself.
- Have your child practice packing and unpacking a backpack and opening containers such as yogurt, juice boxes, and other lunch items.
- Be sure your child knows his or her first and last name.
- Practice goodbyes by role-playing drop-off.

Need additional time?

Parents/guardians that feel their child is not ready to begin Kindergarten may request a Kindergarten Maturity Waiver to delay Kindergarten registration for up to one year. The waiver application can be accessed by visiting www.baltimorecityschools.org/page/pre-k-and-kindergarten-registration. Once completed, applications should be immediately emailed to EarlyAdmission@bcps.k12.md.us along with any supporting documentation.
