

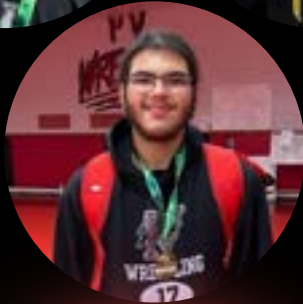
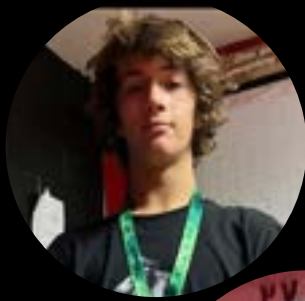

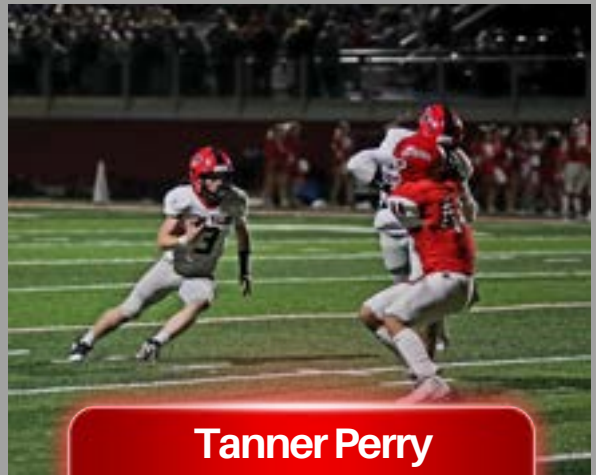
Panthers Close Regular Season With Win Over Purcell - Now Look to Playoffs

The Pauls Valley Panthers travelled to Purcell on Thursday night to take on the Dragons in a must win game to keep their playoff hopes alive. The game was moved to Thursday due to the chances of severe weather for Friday night across the state of Oklahoma. The change of date cost the Panthers a day of preparation for the Dragon's flexbone offense but it did not impact the result as the Panthers would have one of their best defensive halves of the year in Purcell.

The Panthers won the coin toss and elected to start the game of offense and they would start quick. The Panthers would get a quick first down with a Caden Knighten run and a Tanner Perry to Jon Grimmatt pass. The Dragons would be flagged for a facemask on the Grimmatt play and follow that with an offsides on the next play. The combination of the two penalties set the Panthers up at the Dragon 32 yard line after only two plays from scrimmage. A second Knighten run would move the ball inside the 25 yard line and create a second and short for Pauls Valley. On second down, the Panthers would avert disaster as Jon Grimmatt fell on a Knighten fumble and preserved the drive that would eventually lead to points. The Panthers would move inside the Dragon 10 yard line with a Perry scramble to the left that turned into a 12 yard completion to Jorge Fabela. Knighten would cap the drive with a nine yard run that included running through two Dragon would be tacklers and put the Panthers first points on the board. The Panthers would go for two out of the swinging gate formation and it would get positive results. Knighten would take a toss from Perry and then look to pass it back to Perry in the endzone but Purcell would be flagged for interference. The penalty would move the ball one and a half yards closer and Panthers would give Knighten a handoff and he would get the two points.

Purcell's flexbone offense would answer the Panther score. Taking the ball on their own 35 yard line, the Dragons would keep the ball on the ground and move the ball down the field. After the Panthers stuffed the fullback give on first down, the Dragons would turn to the pitch option and move the ball into Panther territory with a 25 yard run. With a Panther penalty tacked on to the end of the run the Dragons would end up inside the Panther 30 in just two plays. Using the pitch option two more times sandwiched around a

a fullback give, the Dragons would be inside the Panthers 10 yard line. After another fullback give would go nowhere, the Dragons would go back to the option and this time the Dragon Quarterback would keep it for the final 10 yards and the Dragons first points. The PAT was good and Panthers lead would be down to one late in the first quarter.

The Panthers second drive of the night would start slow. Perry would be tackled for no gain and a Perry to Maddex Prince screen would not gain the necessary yardage for a first down. The Panthers would look to get the first down through the air but the Dragon coverage would be strong and Perry would turn to his legs. Perry would get nine yards on the scramble and get the Panthers a new set of downs across midfield. The Panthers would come back to Perry as a ball carrier and it would result in a big play. Running the power read, the Perry would keep the ball and cover 28 yards to put the Panthers in the redzone for a second scoring opportunity. Knighten would take the Panthers inside the Dragon 15 yard line and Perry would finish off the drive from there. Perry would run for 14 yards and a touchdown. With the Amaya PAT good, the Panthers were back out front by eight with the score 15-8.

The Panthers would attempt to keep the ball away from the time consuming ground based Dragon offense by kicking an onside kick. The Dragons would field the kick, however, and get good field position as a result. Starting the drive at their own 44 yard line, the Dragons would quickly move into Panther territory using the pitch option to gain 10 yards. The Dragons would attempt to strike

quickly through the air but Panther Cornerback Colby Barrett would break up the Dragon deep ball and prevent the big play. After a fullback carry for no gain and a Dragon penalty that negated a big run for a first down, the Dragons found themselves in a third and long back near midfield. Noah Olguin and Skeet Jolly would be up to the task of stopping the pitch this time and the Dragons would be forced to punt.

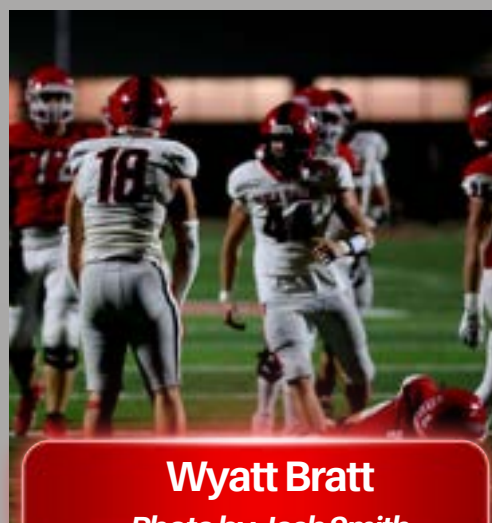

The Panthers third possession would start at their own 20 yard line to open the second quarter. Aided by a Panther holding penalty, the Dragon defense was able to secure their first stop on the night and force the Panthers to punt from deep in their own end. The Dragons were able to get a hand on the punt and it would go out of bounds at the Panther 31 yard line giving Purcell great field position. Purcell would take advantage. Using two quarterback runs and a reverse, the Dragons would move the ball inside the Panther five in just four plays. Inside the five, the Panther defense would stiffen. The Panthers would stop a Purcell quarterback sneak short of the line and defensive lineman Elijah Olguin would tackle the quarterback for a loss on second down. The Panthers would stop the Dragons third down toss play and it would give Purcell fourth and goal. The Dragons would go back to the quarterback sneak and this time it would get the necessary yardage for a second score. The PAT would be good and again the Panthers would have a one point lead at 15-14.

The Panthers fourth possession would start with an incompleteness and two short runs that gave the Panthers a decision on fourth down. Knowing that the ball control offense of Purcell put possessions at a premium, the Panthers elected to go for it on fourth down at their own 40 yard line. Tanner Perry would run to his right and cut back into the heart of the Dragon defense. The Dragons were a

to tackle Perry just short of the line to gain and the Panthers would give the ball back to Purcell in their own territory. Purcell would use three carries to get the ball inside the redzone. Just inside the 20 yard line, the Panther defense would make a play. Panther defensive lineman Wyatt Bratt would rip the ball out of the arms of the Purcell fullback and Elijah Olguin would pounce on the ball to end the Dragon possession and give the ball back to Pauls Valley with under a minute to play in the half.

The Panthers would start with a huge play. Throwing the ball to Caden Knighten out of the backfield on a wheel route, Perry would connect for 33 yards that moved the ball to the fifty yard line. After a spike to stop the clock, the Panthers would again go to the air. Perry would connect to Jorge Fabela but Purcell would make the stop on the receiver screen. On third down, Perry would look deep to Jon Grimmatt but the two could not connect. Not wanting to give Purcell the ball at midfield, the Panthers elected to punt. Purcell was content to take a knee and go into the half with the Panthers out front 15-14.

In the second half, the Panther Defense would shine. After the Dragons opened their first drive of the second half with a 22 yard full back run, the Dragons would go to the air and Purcell was quickly in Panther territory. Panther Outside Linebacker Jon Grimmatt would make the first play of the half and put the Dragons behind the chains. Grimmatt would tackle the Dragon quarterback for a loss on the option and put the ground based offense behind the chains. On second down, the Dragons would fumble the snap and give themselves a third and long to keep the drive alive. The Panthers were able to stop the

Dragons on third down to bring up a fourth and long inside Panther territory. The Dragons elected to go for the conversion and it would lead to the second big play to open the second half. The Dragons would go back to the pitch option that had worked well in the first half but a great half time adjustment by the Panther Coaching Staff gave Grimmatt a chance at his second big play and he made it. Tackling the halfback for a seven yard loss, Grimmatt ended the drive and gave Pauls Valley the ball near midfield.

The Panthers would strike quick with a one play drive to extend the lead. The Panthers would give the ball to Knighten who would cut out the backside of the play and race 54 yards for score. The Amaya PAT would be blocked but the Panthers would have 21-14 lead after one possession each in the third quarter.

The Dragons would start their second drive of the half at the twenty and the Panther defense would force them to grind the ball on the ground to make any yards. It would take the Dragons eight plays, all on the ground, to get to midfield. At that point, the Panther defense would step up. Panthers Noah Olguin and Wyatt Bratt would stuff runs from the Purcell fullback and force a third and long. The Purcell fullback was presented a ball in the pregame for breaking the all-time rushing record for Purcell, but the Panther defense would make his night difficult. He would leave the night with only one carry for double digit yards on the night in being held under 100 yards. The two tackles forced Purcell into a third and long and it would give the Panthers a third chance for a big play. The Dragons would go to the air and Panther Safety Skeet Jolly would break up the catch and prevent the first down. The Dragons would elect to punt and give the ball back to Pauls Valley.

The Purcell defense would mimic their Panther counterparts and they too would step up. After stopping a pair of Panther runs on first and second down, the Dragons would pick off a Perry pass on third down and give Purcell back the ball inside Panther territory at the 30 yard line on the last play of the third quarter.

Purcell would turn to the quarterback run and move the ball inside the Panther 20 yard line on two carries. That would be as close as they could get. The Panthers would stuff a fullback run and then repeat the performance on the pitch option on second down. The Dragon runner chose to attempt to throw the ball on the called option play and it would result in a lineman downfield penalty that put Purcell further behind the chains. After a quarterback run failed to get the first down the Dragons would go to the air twice. Jorge Fabela would break up a Dragon pass and Purcell would be unable to connect on fourth down and the drive would end with no points.

Purcell would get close to forcing a second three and out on the Panthers but a facemask penalty negate a sack and extend the drive. The Panthers would keep the ball on the ground and break a huge run that would have given them a two score lead only to have an illegal formation penalty negate the 54 yard run by Knighten. The penalty was too much for the Panthers to overcome and they would be forced to punt the ball to the Dragons late in the fourth quarter.

The Panther Defense would make three big plays and snuff out the possession. After tackling the Purcell fullback for no gain, the entire Panther defensive line would tackle the Purcell quarterback for a loss and create a third and long for the Dragons. The Panthers would take advantage of the long yardage and send Kash Pickett through A-gap for a seven yard quarterback sack near the Dragon 10 yard line.

Purcell would elect to punt the ball to the Panthers and hope to stop them with time left on the clock. The Panther drive would begin with a huge run from Knighten taking the ball from the Panther 44 to the Dragon 37 yard line. The run would give the Panthers another first down and give them a chance to use what was left on the clock. The Panthers would keep the ball on the ground with Knighten two times and force a third and short that would decide the game. The Panthers kept the ball in Perry's hands and he would get the needed yardage for the first down allowing the Panthers to runout the clock on the 21-14 win over Purcell.

The win helped the Panthers cause to earning a playoff berth but did not secure it completely. In what is the most competitive and difficult district in Class 3A, the Panthers would need some help on Friday night. Plainview and Anadarko would supply that help. Plainview would drive the length of the field and kick a field goal as time expired to win 15-13 and create a three way tie for third. Anadarko prevented North Rock Creek from getting 15 points in their win. The combination gave Pauls Valley a third place finish in the district and a trip to Perkins on Friday.

The Panthers would have 262 yards on just 34 plays on the night against the time eating ground game of Purcell. The Panthers averaged 7.7 yards per play on the night. The Panthers would have 59 yards through the air and 203 yards on the ground. Tanner Perry would finish 5 of 9 through the air for 59 yards and one interception. Caden Knighten would have one catch for 34 yards to lead the Panthers in yardage. Jorge Fabela would have two catches for 10 yards on the night. Jon Grimmatt would have one catch for 10 yards and Maddex Prince would have one catch for five yards.

Caden Knighten would lead the Panthers on the ground with 20 carries for 156 yards and two touchdowns. Tanner Perry would have nine carries for 46 yards and one touchdown.

Defensively, the Panthers would hold the Dragons to 165 yards rushing and just 14 yards through the air. Kash Pickett led the Panthers in tackles with 12 tackles and one quarterback sack. Both Skeet Jolly and Elijah Olguin recorded nine tackles on the night. Noah Olguin would have seven tackles Mason Barahona had six tackles. Jon Grimmatt had three tackles, two for loss, and one quarterback sack.

Panther Wrestling Goes to 2nd Open

Panther Wrestling traveled to Lawton MacArthur on Saturday for their second open tournament of the preseason schedule. The Panther Wrestlers were coming off a strong showing at Putnam City and were looking to keep that momentum going into Lawton MacArthur.

From the high school ranks, the Panthers had several medalist. At 153 lbs., Will Harris brought home a second place finish from Lawton going 2-1 on the day. Harris won his first matches over Colten Marlow of Cache and Jayden Peck of Cache to earn a spot in the semis. There he won over Carter Wall-Portofee of Lawton by a 16-10 decision. Harris would lose his championship match to Clint Longanacre of Chickasha to earn a second place finish.

At 160 lbs., Cody McLaughlin would lose his first match to Cole Beier of Chickasha and then come through the consolation bracket defeating Ladon Cullins of Cache and Landon Beier of Chickasha to earn a spot in the third place match. There he would match up with Cole Beier again and he would defeat McLaughlin again to give the Panther 4th in Lawton.

Elijah Sherwood would bring home one of Pauls Valley's gold medals from Lawton at 178 lbs. Sherwood would open with a fall over Joseph Montgomery of Lawton. He would win over Luis Durant of Lawton Ike by fall in the semis. In the finals Sherwood would win by fall over Hunter Williams of Lawton to earn gold in Lawton.

In the Junior High ranks, Buddy Fitzgerald would be the second Panther to bring home gold from Lawton. Fitzgerald would win his opening matches over Killel Locklen of Lawton Mac and Bryson Merchant over Chickasha. In the semis, Fitzgerald would win by fall over Mason Choate of Marlow to earn a spot in the finals. There he would again win by fall over Micah Russell of Duncan by fall going 4-0 on the day to earn gold.

At 135 lbs. in the Junior High ranks, Josh Capuchino would bring home fourth going 3-2 on the day. Capuchino would lose his first match of the day and then come back to win three matches in a row by fall over wrestlers from Pauls Valley, Lawton, and Chickasha. In the third place match, Capuchino would fall to Brayden Duggins of Lawton to finish fourth.

In the junior high girls ranks, Avery Williams would also bring home gold with wins by fall over Cadence Beavers of Chickasha and Leianna Kalo of Lawton to earn first.

In addition to the medalists, the Panthers would have several wrestlers win matches in Lawton. Josh Lewis would go 1-2 on the day at Lawton with wins over Zach Ryan of Lawton at 147 lbs. Eddie Sullivan would also go 1-2 at 160 lbs. with a win over Jonathan Ellis of Cache. In the junior high division, T.W. Farris would go 2-2 on the day with wins over wrestlers from Chickasha and Lawton. Xavier Hurtado would also 2-2 on the day in the junior high 158 lb. division. Hurtado would collect wins over wrestlers from Cache and Altus.

Aven Butler, Ethan Bradley, Ryder Meeks, and Wyatt Bowerman would also wrestle in Lawton without collecting a win.

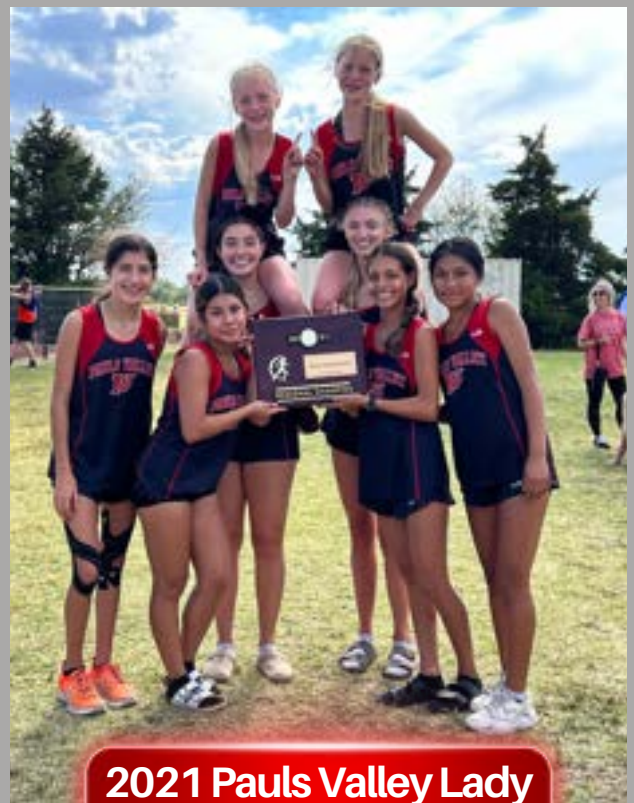
Cross Country Gives an Era of Gold

The Lady Panther Cross Country team closed its 2024 season last week at the OSSAA Class 4A State Championships in Edmond. The level that they competed on has been seen few times in our 125-year history. These past four years will rank amongst the most dominant era any sport has had in red and black. It may be that while we celebrated the wins that we came to expect that we have become numb to how truly exceptional this time has been.

Over the past four years the Lady Panthers ran in 40 cross-country meets across the state of Oklahoma. Those teams won 30 meets. That is a .750 winning percentage over their entire career. Those wins include one OSSAA Class 4A State Championship, one OSSAA Class 4A State Runner-Up finish and three regional championships. The Lady Panthers were seven of seven at the conference championships over their four years at Pauls Valley. They won all four Canadian Valley Conference Championships and all three Arbuckle Conference Championships before it disbanded. The Lady Panthers would finish as runners-up in seven other meets during the four-year span. The Lady Panthers would finish as the champion or runner-up in 37 of 40 meets. That is a percentage of 92.5%. The Lady Panthers would finish as champion or runner-up in 29 of the last 30 meets that they ran. That span includes a 19-meet win streak and 24 total wins including a state championship and a state runner-up.

Those dominant numbers gain greater prominence when you look at the meets that these girls ran in. The Lady Panthers searched out the best competition that they could run against. In addition, in Oklahoma, Class 4A and below runs a two-mile course while 5A and 6A run a 5K course. The Lady Panthers ran several 5A/6A meets including meets at Newcastle, Choctaw, Mustang, and Bethany where they ran against the larger schools on the longer course. It didn't matter. The Lady Panthers would still win. Pauls Valley won three Newcastle meets, Mustang Under the Lights, Choctaw, and Bethany. The Lady Panthers won meets with the great teams from Class A to Class 6A.

In 2021, the Lady Panthers defeated 30 of the 89 state cross-country meet qualifying teams from Class 2A to Class 6A. During that season the Lady Panthers defeated 66 teams throughout the year. Seeing some team's multiple times throughout the year, 49 of those 66 teams were state qualifying teams. That number would increase every year after 2021. In 2022, the Lady Panthers defeated 36 of the 90 teams that qualified for the state cross-country meets from 2A to 6A. Having stepped up a level in competition, the Lady Panthers defeated 81 teams throughout the year. Sixty-four of those 81 teams qualified for the state championships in their respective classes. In 2023 that number would increase again. The 2023 Lady Panthers defeated 47 of the 89 teams that qualified for the state championships in their respective classes. Pauls Valley defeated 81 teams throughout their 2023 season, 56 of those teams were state championship qualifying teams. In 2024, the Lady Panthers defeated 42 of the 89 state qualifying teams from Class 2A to Class 6A. Pauls Valley defeated 74 teams throughout the 2024 season, 47 of those teams were state championship qualifying teams.

The 2024 OSSAA Class 4A State Championships brought to a close the cross-country careers of three Lady Panther athletes who have been some of the most decorated athletes in the 125-year history of Pauls Valley Athletics. Over their four-year careers on the two-mile and 5K courses of Oklahoma, few were able to challenge their ability and even fewer could match their success.

This group of Seniors would be in a class by themselves throughout those five years. The trio of Kenzi Readnour, Keira Readnour, and Isabella Gutierrez would accomplish things that will be hard to match and even harder to replace. Throughout their 40-race career, these three Lady Panthers finished 1-2-3 in 17 different meets including the 2023 OSSAA Class 4A Regional at Waurika. They would accomplish that feat seven times in ten meets in 2024 including six in a row to close the regular season. They would also accomplish the feat five times in a row over the 2023 season. They would finish 1-2 in 24 meets throughout their career including both the 2022 and 2023 OSSAA Class 4A State Championships. Between the three, they won 29 of 40 races individually including 26 in a row from 2022 to 2024. These three had 104 top five finishes out of a possible 117 opportunities. They posted 114 top 10 finishes in 117 opportunities. They would earn medals in 115 of 117 opportunities. Over the span of their 40 race career, this trio of seniors average finish was all 5.5 or better.





Kenzi Readnour

Kenzi Readnour's numbers are staggering. Kenzi ran in forty meets throughout her career. She would win 28 of the 40 meets she ran including the 2023 OSSAA Class 4A State Championship. She had streak of 19 consecutive meet wins over the 2023 and 2024 season. Kenzi would finish as the individual runner-up in nine meets over her career, including the 2022 Class 4A State Championships. Kenzi would never finish outside the top 10 in any race throughout her career. Kenzi won three consecutive Class 4A Regional Meets individually. In addition, she was the three-time Canadian Valley Conference individual champion and two time Arbuckle Conference individual champion. In a sport that assigns points relative to an athlete's finishing position, Kenzi would account for 65 total points throughout her career. Her average finish throughout her 40-race career was 1.65. She finishes as a four-time All-State selection for Cross Country alone.



Isabella Gutierrez

Isabella Gutierrez finished outside the top 10 only one time in her 39-race career. Gutierrez won one meet in her career, but it would be a huge one. She claimed the 2022 Class 4A Individual State Championship on the course at Edmond Santa Fe. Gutierrez would finish as the runner-up in seven meets and third in 18 meets. Gutierrez recorded 34 top five finishes and 38 top 10 finishes in 39 meets. Gutierrez would account for 149 team points over her 39-race career. Her average finish over her career was 3.82. Gutierrez would shine the most at the state championships. Over her four year career Isabella would have a team leading average finish of 3.75 at four state championship meets. Like Kenzi, she also finishes as a four-time All-State Cross-Country athlete.





Keira Readnour

Keira Readnour finished outside the top 10 only twice throughout her 38-race career. Keira finished as the runner-up in 16 meets throughout her career including the 2023 OSSAA Class 4A State Championships. Keira would finish third 11 times throughout her career. Keira recorded 31 top five finishes and 36 top 10 finishes throughout her career. Keira Readnour accounted for 211 points throughout her four year career for an average finish of 5.55. If you take out the 2021 Class 4A State Championship where she ran severely injured, that number drops to 3.67. Keira is a two-time Cross Country All-State athlete.

The Lady Panther Cross Country runners of the last four years have etched themselves into the history of Panther Athletics along side the greatest runners of our past.

The 1950 to 1962 Panthers won three straight State Championships. Like the Lady Panthers, those Panthers had multiple state champions and set school records in all but one event in addition to setting 19 meet records in their three years. They won 19 meets and finished second five times never finishing lower than fifth in any meet.

The 1970 to 1973 Panther Track teams won one state championship and finished third two other times. The Panthers had several state champions, broke several of the 1960-62 Panther records and had a world record holder in the high jump. This group had state champions in the 100,200, 120H, 440 relay and the mile relay during their four years.

The 1979 to 1981 Panthers had a third, a state runner-up, and a state championship in three years. They broke some of the records of the 1970's Panthers and had individual state champions in the 100, 200, 440, and the mile relay.

The 1987 to 1989 Panthers finished with two state runner-up finishes and one third place finish. Just like their predecessors, they had several state champions but would finish under five points from a state championship two times.

Everything that these Lady Panthers did is comparable to those great accomplishments. The one big difference is that this is the first Lady Panther group to write their names into that level of success. We may or may not see this level of success again but it has become the standard of excellence for the Lady Panthers as they have raised the bar for all those that follow in the future.

Frank Reynolds added the extra point after Lindsey scoring again to make it 13-0.

When the team changed goals at the quarter, Durant scored a 67-yard

The Ardmoreite sports editor speaks of the game in these words:

Taking advantage of every break that came their way, playing a whirlwind type of football that carried them through on pure speed alone, Pauls Valley Panthers gave a slightly chesty delegation from Ardmore a 22-12 drubbing in a special Armistice day battle at Pauls Valley Wednesday afternoon before one of the biggest crowds ever witnessing a highschool game in Southern Oklahoma. It was another case of speed and clever playing triumphing over beef and brawn.

The loss tumbled Ardmore off its top perch in the Big Five conference and sent Ada sailing for honors as the only undefeated outfit in the five-school loop.

With a wind that helped in the early periods, and a punch that was nothing short of inspired for second half gains, the Panthers clawed and fought their way to victory over their ancient foes. Every period was theirs after they took advantage of a stiff wind in the first five minutes of play to set them on the scoring road. The lads from upstate did a pretty place kick to score three points with a field goal, Richardson's educated toe tipping the oval through the goal posts. This was in the first quarter.

From that moment on the inspired outfit coached by Ray Thompson played a heads up ball game that led to three touchdowns in as many periods and the much needed victory. Ardmore, although managing to come through for a couple of touchdowns through the good work of two or three players, did a sluggish bit of ball playing for the most part.

Few Teams Take It Easy For Pauls Valley Squad

It's customary in high school football for two-way, skilled performers to take their breathers when the other team has the football. There are exceptions, of course, but the quarterbacks and running backs and fullbacks and receivers usually are more important to their team on offense.

Such is not the case at Pauls Valley, where the defense is first and foremost. The Panthers, under third-year head coach Tim Reynolds are a settled team on defense, but as many as a dozen regulars see action at the skilled positions on offense.

It's a plan that worked to perfection this year as the Panthers won all 18 regular-season games, shut out six opponents and were among the state's leaders in total offense averaging about 270 yards per game. No other team in Class 3A scored more points (315) or allowed fewer (24).

"We've got quite a few skilled people and just about everybody we use on offense plays or starts on defense," said Reynolds, whose District 3A champions open the playoffs by hosting Marlow (3-5) Friday night. "Basically our team relies on defense, so we try to rest as many of our starting defensive players as we can on offense."

"Usually they'll play a half or a third of the time on offense."

The Panthers, who retain the No. 2 spot behind Bristol, also 10-0, in *The Oklahoman's* Class 3A ratings after

Pauls Valley, which was a 2-8 team in 1981 but has gone 3-7 and 6-5 the past two seasons under Reynolds, has shut out five of its last six opponents. Its final four foes — Sulphur, Tuttle, Blanchard and Lindsay — have a combined 27-13 record but were outscored by the Panthers 119-7, with that single TD coming on a punt ruckback at Blanchard.

A missed tackle meant a missed opportunity for Pauls Valley High School Friday night in the first round of the Class 3A playoffs.

And in the postseason, a missed opportunity usually means no next week, which is what Pauls Valley must face after a 20-14 loss to Millwood at Falcon Stadium.

What probably should have been a short Millwood gain, turned into a big Pauls Valley pain in the second quarter and arguably the biggest play of the night.

On the play, Millwood quarterback Jimmie Moore took one step back and fired a bullet to receiver Rashaun Woods near the sideline on a quick out pass. Pauls Valley defender Brandon Henry then overshot Woods, who darted upfield for a 62-yard touchdown.

Woods' touchdown gave Millwood a 7-0 lead at the time — seven points that would come in handy by the time the final gun had sounded.

"I haven't the slightest idea what happened on that play," Woods said. "I just gave a little stutter-step, (Henry) just missed the tackle and I was off to the races."

Now Millwood (8-3) is off to Newcastle (10-1) to face the Racers in the second round. Pauls Valley (7-4) is just plain off.

"That was crucial," Millwood coach Don Willis said of the Moore-to-Woods touchdown. "I think we caught them off guard.

Even so, Pauls Valley again answered back. Henry marched the Panthers 87 yards on six plays, hitting Ryan Caldwell on a 46-yard touchdown pass over the middle to cap the drive.

But the score came with two seconds on the clock.

"You got to give Pauls Valley some credit," Willis said.

Marlow's 9-1 record may be a bit tainted by the fact the Outlaws played only one team with as many as seven victories, but not in Pauls Valley coach Tim Reynolds' eyes. "It doesn't mean anything to us," he said. "We've been able to acquire quite a bit of film on them, seven of the 10 ballgames, and we're very apprehensive about playing them. They're big, real big as far as down people, and they're capable of pretty well controlling the defensive line. And on offense, they just kind of pound on you and pound on you and then they get quite a few big plays on the passing game." The Panthers are 9-1 themselves, setting up a match equal to the McGuinness (9-1)-Bristow (9-1) game. Marlow suffered its only loss last week at Weatherford, while Pauls Valley hasn't been beaten since a 7-6 setback at Purcell the second week of the season.

Pauls Valley Slips By Ardmore, 25-12, In Pennant Clash

PAULS VALLEY, Nov. 14—For the first time in a dozen years Pauls Valley's Panthers slipped past Ardmore here Friday night with a 25-12 win that brought with it the western division football championship of district 4A.

Next Friday, the small but scrappy Panthers will play host to Hugo here to determine a berth in the post-season schoolboy playoffs.

Handicapped by a muddy field and a 10-pound per man weight disadvantage, the Panthers were off with the gun, grabbing two

first period tallies, fumbled away two scoring chances in the second heat and added touchdowns in each of the final frames to ice the triumph.

The first three Pauls Valley scores came on lengthy runs, two of them by 146-pound fullback Jimmy Hart, and both Ardmore scores were set up by fumbles of the slippery ball.

Charles Montgomery, crazy-legged 130-pounder, started the fireworks when he sped through the line on the fourth Pauls Valley play from scrimmage, side-stepped two members of the Ardmore secondary, and raced 68 yards to score before the 3,500 fans had found their seats.

Ardmore's Jerry Nance fumbled the kickoff with Willy Paul retrieving for

Pauls Valley and two plays later Hart broke through tackle and went across the double stripe standing up from the 28-yard line.

Then Don Brim, 147-pound Panther guard who looked like the fifth man in Ardmore's backfield, goaled his only conversion to give the Panthers a 13-0 lead which stood up at intermission.

Two plays after the third period opened it was Ardmore's turn to cash a fumble with Ray Davidson covering Montgomery's bobble on the 50-yard stripe. The Tigers drove to paydirt in eight plays with Nance and Kenneth Hunnicutt carrying the brunt of the attack. Leonard Rich, strapping 133-pounder, plunged for the score from two yards out.

Montgomery raced the next kickoff back 27 yards to the Pauls Valley 32 and that was Hart's cue for another sprint. On the first play from scrimmage, the fleet-footed halfback raced down the middle for 68 yards to score, reversing his field four times to avoid Ardmore tacklers.

Trailing 19-6, Ardmore turned a second fumble into points early in the fourth quarter. Bob Fields, fading back to pass for Pauls Valley was jarred loose from the ball by Ardmore's end Don Ernst and Nance recovered on the Panther 37. Two aerials from Honnicutt to Lambert Hattmensty covered the distance to the ane and Bob Reed went over on a quarterback sneak.

Four plays later, Montgomery cut loose with a 37-yard jaunt that gave Pauls Valley a first down on the Tiger one-foot line, but the Ardmore line stymied the Panthers and after four Ardmore plays failed to pick up a first down, Pauls Valley took over on the Ardmore seven with less than a minute of playing time remaining. Hart faded back and shot a perfect strike to Tommy Shoemaker in the end zone for the final Panther touchdown at the gun.



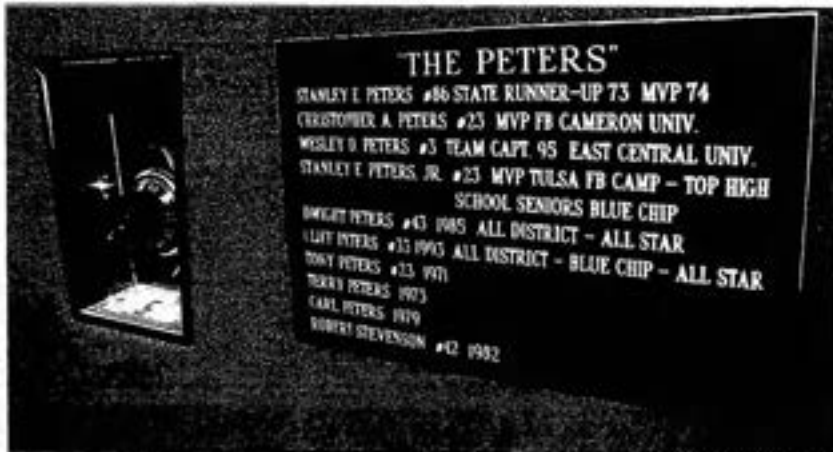
