






Student Council Elections


Student Council elections were held on Tuesday, September 12. The following students were elected to the student body:


VOLLEYBALL





Mr. Finley Knapton returned to the junior class this year after spending a year in Bodø, Norway. He spent a year there with his family while attending public school. He described public school there as "going back to middle school" in the sense that the schooling in Norway doesn't have much authority, as the teachers there aren't allowed to discipline the kids as they are here.

As for the schooling system, middle school goes through grade ten, then after there's three years of high school/college prep. From there, similar to here, the students have the option to go straight to the workforce or to attend university. As for the actual school experience, Knapton says he didn't learn anything beyond the social aspects. When asked about the difference in culture, he stated "Norwegians are much more accepting; you can kind of be whoever you want, and it's strange, coming from a place like here." In terms of economic differences, Knapton explains that in Norway, it seemed as though no one was struggling financially, and everyone is above the poverty line. He says he saw maybe three homeless people in the duration of his stay.

When transitioning from place to place, Knapton said it was hard, but he picked things up quickly, especially socially. It was definitely tough at first because schooling was entirely a popularity contest, much more so than here. If given the opportunity, he would definitely go back, but not for as long because it doesn't feel as much like his home. Knapton is planning to go back after he graduates to attend an outdoor education school as a gap year. He says that in the long run, he would have benefited from all four years of schooling in Norway from an academic standpoint so he could experience a different kind of education, and he could see himself going to college there. College is free for Norwegian citizens, and it is much cheaper even for non-citizens. Knapton says "they feel like an advanced society compared to ours in some ways."

Something unique he shared was that everyone is kind, and if you need help there is always someone there to support you, no matter who you are. The society is especially supportive in the way that they won't let anyone fall through the cracks. Knapton's favorite place to be in Norway was on a piece of land his family has owned for a thousand years. There's a spot off the peninsula there where he would fish and have family cookouts. He says this spot "felt very homey. It's where my mom was born, where my mom's mom was born. I have deep roots in Norway and it just feels natural to be there."
